LOGO

Every element of the logo has meaning. It begins with a flower as an obvious direct tie to our patron saint. At the center of this is what is at the center of our faith, Christ, represented through the cross. We find Christ at the altar within our building and encounter him through the Eucharist. That is why this cross is placed within the outline of our church building. The yellow portions represent both the flower petals and also light rays which radiate from Christ.

COLORS

The greens represent nature in the same that St. Therese is known for flowers. This is

also reflected in the beautiful nature that surrounds the parish. The yellows represent light (Christ), joy, and charity, which has always been at the heart of our parish identity.

FONTS

Our main title font is an ornamental rounded serif font which compliments that tie to nature within the logo. It is paired with a modern bold sans-serif which is also shared by other churches in our Family of Parishes to reflect our ties and commitment to collaboration.

▶ Walking the Path

I am still coming down from the “high” of having Chris Stefanick here at St. Therese, but probably not because he is pretty famous in Catholic circles. My excitement, instead, is rooted in the fact that he includes some of his personal story in all of his talks... and, as Catholics, we don't hear enough of that kind of faith sharing. I'll say more on that in a moment, but for now I want to share my reason for getting joy from his sharing. For me, it is the real life testimony that means the most when I am hearing about someone's journey of faith. I want to hear their struggles and the things that they tried in order



to overcome those struggles. I want to hear about the messiness of their relationships with family, coworkers, and friends. Their sharing lets me know that I'm not alone, and that the thoughts and feelings that I have aren't unusual. As they are talking, I am thinking, "Amen! Me too!" When that happens, it means that I am building a closer connection with that person, and I grow from that encounter. In that relationship and growth, I can find support, new insights, and renewal of faith. Like water on parched land, it refreshes, but remember, too, if that land that is

too dry, it essentially sheds the water... unless that water keeps coming! Fortunately, for us, God is always there to provide, but given that reality, we still have to ask ourselves about what we are doing to make sure that we are open to that refreshment. As Stefanick reminded us, one major way is through relationships with others. Specifically, it is in those relationships where we can be ourselves and where we can share our heartfelt concerns, challenges, and triumphs. The thing is, most people don't have those kinds of relationships, except, possibly, with a partner. For some folks, even their

partner doesn't fall into that category.

So, what is the remedy for a parched soul?

While most of us keep to ourselves, and refrain from discussing anything more than surface talk. Stefanick encouraged all of us to form a small group of believers with whom we can share and develop the bonds of friendship. This group becomes our safe space to share how we really are- faith included. I know, it is tough. What is it about us, Catholics especially, that keeps us from forming these types of groups? It is probably a fear of vulnerability,

but also the fact that, for many of us, we were taught that "private matters" are to remain private. I'm going to challenge you, however, to step out of your comfort zone. Consider joining us on Thursday evenings, beginning in January, for "The Search." It is a video-based program that should help to "prime the pump," and get that "water" of God's grace flowing. - More information is coming soon. In the meantime, I suggest that you challenge yourself by being open with someone you love. Peace, and God's grace to you.

THE PARABLE of the Mustard

Seed is brief in words but very picturesque. Matthew 13:31-32 reads: "The kingdom of heaven is like a grain of mustard seed that a man took and sowed in his field. 32. It is the smallest of all seeds, but when it has grown it is larger than all the garden plants and becomes a tree, so that the birds of the air come and make nests in its branches."

Last week, the REBOOT event became this parable narrative for St. Therese of Lisieux parish when hundreds of mustard seeds began to grow. Allow me to be more specific with this reflection:

Selection of the Mustard Seed - There are thousands of garden, flower, fruit and vegetable seeds to choose from but the Evangelization team selected Chris Stefanick for guidance and growth.

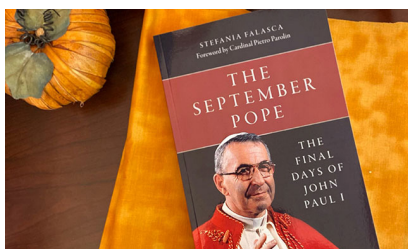

► REBOOT and the Parable of the Mustard Seed (cont'd)

Planting of the Mustard Seed-

Our Lord asked his disciples to spread the Good Word about the Kingdom of Heaven. The members of the Evangelization Team became the “sowers” of the mustard seed and enlisted dozens of volunteers within St. Therese, our Family of Parishes, and their relatives and friends to plant. Like Jesus’ disciples, this team of sowers were: Mike Aprile, Randy Berd, Patti Connors, Michelle & Chris Mistretta, Monique Sgro, Lisa Suida, Karen Tubolino and our two St. Isidore representatives Beth Beebe and Sue Rebits. They conversed through countless meetings, Zoom calls, text messaging and phone conversations to bring REBOOT to life.

The Mustard Seed begins to sprout

- A mustard seed is considered one of the smallest but will grow over ten feet high as a tree. As seeds become sprouts upon taking root, attending to its care is vital. At St. Therese, our hospitality volunteers, ministry fair leaders, ushers and office staff participated in this growth. Countless hours and numerous challenges were presented but the goal was to have a bountiful

crop that would exceed all expectations. The goal was met.

Not all mustard seeds remain in the soil

- Some seeds are blown by the winds, others are thrown into the weeds, and some may land on rocks or clay soil. Usually, these seeds are left behind with no hope for growth. Recognizing another interpretation of this parable - nurture every mustard seed - the Evangelization team decided to enlist the help of our parishioners to invite people who do not attend Mass on a regular basis. These parish “ambassadors” sold nearly 600 of the 800 tickets. Let us pray that these 800 individuals will grow into strong trees of faith. They’ve been planted in soil affirmed by the Lord and tended by the parishioners of St. Therese. A special “thank you” to Rebecca Poupard who personally sold nearly 100 tickets.

The seed will grow into a tree

- All plants, flowers, fruits and vegetables have different growth patterns. Together, as planters, tenders of the soil, harvesters, we want every mustard seed to blossom and fulfill its purpose especially those persons who



attended REBOOT. May they also become ambassadors and attract relatives, friends and colleagues back to the church and like the parable - “so that birds come and nest in its branches.”

Chris Stefanick encouraged us to grow in faith and the understanding that our Lord is always with us - we are never abandoned. Therefore, we will continue to tend the soil of evangelization and like the mustard seed, grow with the assistance of others.

Again, a huge thank you to everyone! Our “harvest” will begin in January with the launching of a seven-week series titled “The Search” - a program developed by Chris Stefanick. Details will be forthcoming!
