In today's Gospel, Jesus reminds us that throughout history, people have been going about their business when suddenly an event happens and they are carried away or die or their circumstances change in an instant. Are we so focused on taking care of our material desires that we fail to focus on what we need for eternal

life? The examples that Jesus uses in today's Gospel show us that people were so intent on making a living that they failed to live. Ultimately, our material possessions are merely wants not needs. We want a nice car; we want a good home; we want to have friends, etc. But what do we really need to be healthy, happy, and holy? When we are secure

in our relationship with the Lord, our needs are satisfied So, are we more focused on things that are merely wants and desires? Or do we put our emphasis on addressing those spiritual needs that will ultimately help us to grow and be satisfied in the Lord?

The symbolism behind the Advent Wreath is beautiful. Christians adopted the tradition of the Advent Wreath, as part of their spiritual preparation for Christmas, around the Middle Ages. As we all know, Christ is "the light that came into this world" to dispel the darkness and to radiate the truth and love of God (John 3:19-21)

The wreath is made of various evergreens, signifying continuous life. Each of the evergreens have a traditional meaning which can be adapted to our faith. The laurel signifies victory over persecution and suffering. Pine, holly and yew signify immortality; and cedar strength and healing. Holly also has a special Christian symbolism: The prickly leaves remind us of the crown of thorns. One of the legends tell us that the cross may have been made of holly. The circle of the wreath, which has no beginning or end, symbolizes the eternity of God, the immortality of the soul and the everlasting life found in Christ. Pine cones, nuts and other decor reminds us of life and resurrection.

The four candles represent the four weeks of Advent. A tradition is that each week represents one thousand years. summing up the 4000 years since Adam and Eve until the coming of Christ. The three purple candles represent, prayer, penance and good

works undertaken at this time. The Rose candle is lit on the third Sunday, Gaudete (meaning Rejoice in Latin) Sunday. The Priest will also wear rose vestments at mass. it is the Sunday of rejoicing that the midpoint of Advent has arrived in our wait for Christmas. The final candle is lit in expectation of hope of the second coming of Christ.

Perhaps your family can continue this beautiful tradition in your own home. After creating the wreath together, take the time to light a candle on each of the four Sundays. Make this a time to pause, and slow down, if only for a few minutes and pray together.

God Bless you and yours during this important season as we celebrate the coming of Christ.

Connecting Point

Advent is a season of joyful anticipation of the coming of Christ, both at the end of time and, during the last two weeks of the season, for his first coming at Christmas. It is a season full of beautiful Scripture passages and such powerful Advent images as:the pregnant Blessed Mother; the lion lying down with the lamb; John the Baptist; the prophet Isaiah: and the instruments of war being changed into instruments of peace. My experience has taught me that, the more we can be attentive to our spiritual life during Advent, the more joyful will be our celebration of the Christmas Season.

There are many wonderful ways to

be more attentive to our spiritual lives over the next four weeks. Those who are able may consider participating in weekday Mass and Eucharistic Adoration, grounding the season firmly in the Eucharist. Families may, find it rewarding to incorporate the Advent Wreath in their prayer life, especially at the evening meal. As this is a time to wait in silence and darkness, we may take more time for silent reflection, perhaps meditating on the scripture readings of the day. The Little Blue Books for Advent, published by the Saginaw Diocese, can help with daily reflections. There are many websites that offer daily reflections. 
There are many events throughout our Family during the month of December. Please take an opportunity to attend as many as you can.

Walking the Path

In one of the classes that I facilitate, a discussion started about the fact that everyone in heaven is a saint, whether they are officially recognized as a saint, or not. That is what a saint is—an individual soul that is in the presence of God after their passing from this life. We, then, talked a bit about the canonization process. I thought that I'd share those steps with you this week:



- 1. A local bishop investigates the candidate's life and writings for evidence of heroic virtue. The information uncovered by the bishop is sent to the Vatican.
- 2. A panel of theologians and the cardinals of the Congregation for Cause of Saints research and evaluate the candidate's life.
- 3. If the panel approves, the pope proclaims that the candidate is venerable, which means that the person is a role model of Catholic virtues. When people refer to them, they are called,

Venerable [name].

4. The next step toward sainthood is beatification. which allows a person to be honored by a particular group or region. In order to beatify a candidate, it must be shown that the person is responsible for a posthumous miracle. Remember, it is God who performs the miracle, but the miracle happened after someone asked this (deceased) person to pray for them. Thus, giving evidence that the deceased person must, certainly, be in communion with God. Martyrs -- those who died for their religious cause


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
-- can be beatified without evidence of a miracle. The person is called "Blessed [name]" at this point.

5. In order for the candidate to be considered a saint, there must be proof of a second posthumous miracle. If there is one, the person is canonized. Finally, they are called "Saint [name].

6. Once a person is a saint, he or she is recommended to the

entire Catholic Church for veneration. Some saints are selected as patron saints, special protectors or guardians over particular occupations, illnesses, churches, countries or causes. For example. St. Isidore of Seville was named as a patron saint of internet users and computer programmers because he is credited with writing the world's first encyclopedia.
