How can I be more peaceful in the way that I respond to others?



We can all agree that the world needs more peace... everywhere. St. Francis believed that peace begins with each one of us. Certain people exude peace and some can even bring out the peacefulness in the rest of us. How can we each be more like peaceful people?

Our response to challenging situations can sometimes be anything but peaceful especially when we allow ourselves to wholly give in to negative emotions such as anger, hatred, jealousy, resentment and also when harboring un-forgiveness.

Think of times when it is most challenging to remain peaceful... conflicts with a spouse, children, other family members, a neighbor or even co-workers.

Fr. Ron offered a solution in a recent homily: "Absorb hatred and choose love."



It made me think of the way a good sponge cleans up a sloppy mess on the counter. If we could just absorb any negative emotions and then squeeze them down the drain allowing us to approach the situation cleanly, peacefully and with love, we are closer to unity and resolution.

In the second reading for this second Sunday of Advent, we are urged to "think in harmony with one another, in harmony with Christ Jesus..." When we sing in a choir, true harmony can only be achieved when we really listen to one another. A great director once said, "Singing in tune requires

80% listening." We listen to the voices of others so that we can be in harmony with them and create beautiful music together.

So whether it's that relative that you dread seeing, or those people who are sitting in your pew (it's really not your pew) when you arrive for Christmas Mass, are we absorbing our negative and listening attentively to create harmony together?

Let's work to be people of peace so that "the wolf shall be a guest of the lamb, and the leopard shall lie down with the kid; the calf and the young lion shall browse together..."

Why We Don't Evangelize

There are many of us, who though we are devout believers, just don't understand that there is a universal call to evangelization. We just don't see evangelization as a personal responsibility. There seems to be a disconnect between what Christians believe and what we do about it. We know nothing is more important than God, yet we have difficulty in actually sharing Him with others. There are many possible reasons for this and in the next few weeks we will look at each of them. Why we don't evangelize...

Reason #1

Today most of us have not given much thought to The Universal Call to Evangelization. We mostly have not been taught about this universal call so we don't know about it or understand it so how can we act on it. In Evangelii Nuntiandi par 14, Pope St. Paul VI says, "Those who have been gathered into the community of salvation can and must communicate and spread it." Pope St. John Paul II stated, "No believer in Christ... can avoid this supreme duty: to proclaim

Christ to all peoples (Redemptoris Missio, par 3). And the Catechism of the Catholic Church says, "The disciple of Christ must not only keep the faith... but also profess it, confidently bear witness to it, and spread it... witness to the faith is necessary for salvation" (1816)



St. Isidore Baby Pantry

What's a Baby Pantry? Well, it's an outreach ministry to provide assistance to low-income parents who need help purchasing necessary items for their young children. To the many families who just cannot afford baby products, we are here to help. Any low-income family on WIC (Women, Infants, Children) who lives in Macomb County may apply to our baby pantry to access assistance for their children under the age of two.

Our baby pantry ministry usually has and provides formula, diapers, wipes, and miscellaneous baby items. For any parents needing assistance with infants/toddlers, our usual hours are on Tuesday and Thursday mornings (9:00-12:00). Pre-scheduled appointments are required.

If you are low-income, have an

infant under the age of two, and are seeking assistance, please follow these directives:

- If you live in Macomb County and have a Macomb County WIC card, call our Baby Pantry office: (586) 488-0355.
- A Baby Pantry staff person will return your call and do a short required interview.
- You must provide proof of residence, a copy of your WIC card and verification of live birth for your child/children.

We are here to help and hope you call us to use our outreach service.

Please share this information with anyone you know who might need this service. If you are low income and need help, call anytime. If no one answers, leave a message. We will return your call. That's our promise to you.

Family Fully Alive

December 26 is the feast day of the Holy Family. Since this sacred day falls on a Monday this year, the Knights of Columbus will honor the Holy Family on Saturday, December 10th and Sunday, December 11th by passing out Holy Cards with prayers to the Holy family and a booklet entitled: *The Family Fully Alive: Building the Domestic Church* in the Gathering Space after each Mass.

The term "domestic church" describes the identity and mission of a Christian family. St. John Chrysostom urged Christian families to "make your home into a church" where "all, even

the smallest ones, feel actively committed to seeking the message of the Word of God and to living it together." It is to their parents that children first look for guidance and explanation; because of this, parents have the responsibility to teach them about what is true. They must share with them not only academic and practical knowledge, but also provide solid religious catechesis centered on the reality of Jesus Christ and opportunities for practicing virtue. The "Family Fully Alive" booklet helps parents do this by providing monthly themes, prayers, reflections, meditations, scripture readings and family projects. They will help build

your domestic church as a place of faith, hope and charity, where each member will grow with grace toward his or her full potential in God. Although the book is written to begin this process during Advent, it can be started at any time of the year.

Please take one of these booklets from one of the Knights as you leave Mass that weekend and use it to transform your family into a "domestic church." Copies will also be available in the kiosk in the Gathering Space for those who cannot attend one of these Masses.

Walking the Path

In one of the classes that I facilitate, a discussion started about the fact that everyone in heaven is a saint, whether they are officially recognized as a saint, or not. That is what a saint is—an individual soul that is in the presence of God after their passing from this life. We, then, talked a bit about the canonization process. I thought that I'd share those steps with you this week:



- 1. A local bishop investigates the candidate's life and writings for evidence of heroic virtue. The information uncovered by the bishop is sent to the Vatican.
- 2. A panel of theologians and the cardinals of the Congregation for Cause of Saints research and evaluate the candidate's life.
- 3. If the panel approves, the pope proclaims that the candidate is venerable, which means that the person is a role model of Catholic virtues. When people refer to them, they are called,

Venerable [name].

4. The next step toward sainthood is beatification. which allows a person to be honored by a particular group or region. In order to beatify a candidate, it must be shown that the person is responsible for a posthumous miracle. Remember, it is God who performs the miracle, but the miracle happened after someone asked this (deceased) person to pray for them. Thus, giving evidence that the deceased person must, certainly, be in communion with God. Martyrs -- those who died for their religious cause

-- can be beatified without evidence of a miracle. The person is called "Blessed [name]" at this point.

5. In order for the candidate to be considered a saint, there must be proof of a second posthumous miracle. If there is one, the person is canonized. Finally, they are called "Saint [name].

6. Once a person is a saint, he or she is recommended to the entire Catholic Church for veneration. Some saints are selected as patron saints, special protectors or guardians over particular occupations, illnesses, churches, countries or causes. For example. St. Isidore of Seville was named as a patron saint of internet users and computer programmers because he is credited with writing the world's first encyclopedia.



RSV

As you have probably heard, the pediatric hospitals across Michigan are at capacity with a record number of severely ill children with Respiratory Syncytial Virus, or RSV, as it is frequently called. RSV is a common respiratory virus that usually causes mild, cold-like symptoms. Most people recover in a week or two, but RSV can be serious, especially for infants, older adults, or people with compromised immune systems due to underlying health conditions. Sometimes the illness is so severe, it can be fatal.

RSV spreads when an infected person coughs or sneezes and the virus droplets get on surfaces, or you have contact with that person. People with RSV are contagious for 3-8 days and are contagious before showing signs of the illness. The illness can be transmitted from someone in the family, or outside of the home.

People infected with RSV usually show symptoms within 4 to 6 days after getting infected. Symptoms of RSV infection usually include runny nose, decrease in appetite, coughing, sneezing, fever, and wheezing. These symptoms usually appear in stages and not all at once. In very young infants with RSV, the only symptoms may be irritability, decreased activity, and breathing difficulties. Most RSV infections go away on their own in a week or two.

In the past, most children normally would have had an RSV infection by the age of two, but with all of the COVID precautions everyone has been practicing over the last few years, it is thought many kids might have never been exposed to the virus before. Repeat infections may occur throughout life, and people of any age can be infected. Infections in healthy children and adults are generally less severe than

among infants and older adults with certain medical conditions.

Steps you can take to help prevent the spread of RSV especially if you have cold-like symptoms include covering your mouth when coughing and sneezing, washing your hands frequently with soap and water, avoiding close contact and touching others, and cleaning frequently touched surfaces.
