On this Gaudete (rejoice) Sunday, we hear again a story about John the Baptizer. By this time, Jesus is becoming more famous. People are talking about what he is doing. Of course, John is in prison for insulting King Herod. John prepared the way and he preached the Good News, but did not do any miracles or wondrous deeds. When Jesus comes on

the scene, the Good News is preached and accompanied by the works of the Messiah. Jesus is the one about whom John preached. In turn, Jesus validates John's ministry by pointing out that John the Baptist is the greatest here on earth because of his work of preparing the people to receive the Lord. However, those who hear the Word and

accept Jesus unreservedly and enter into God's Kingdom are even greater than John. Why? Because, although John preached the coming of the Messiah, he did not know the Messiah. Notice the question at the beginning of the passage: "Are you the one who is to come or should we look for another?" John had his doubts. As Christians, we need to accept

# Connecting Point

## How can I be more peaceful and less stressed?

The Third Sunday of Advent is known as the Sunday of Joy in our Advent Season. The color is rose which is meant to symbolize the color on the horizon just before sunrise. As joyous as this Sunday is, knowing that we are almost to Christmas, in our personal lives outside of church, it can easily be a time of stress.

It's a weekend when most Christmas parties fall, where we are trying to wrap up our Christmas shopping, and get everything done for Christmas which is now just two weeks away. It can easily feel like a time when, like our Connecting Point image shows, we feel tangled up in a string of Christmas lights (where half don't even work).

So how do we combat and find peace in the midst of all of this? How can we find peace and be



patient when our Amazon Prime package doesn't arrive on time, when someone misses a deadline, or when we're stuck in unexpected traffic making us late?

We're reminded in our second reading this Sunday to be patient like the farmer who waits for the "precious fruit of the earth." We know that good things come to those who wait but we can sometimes forget how important patience is and the positive affect that showing patience can have in other areas of our life.

In moments of stress and feelings of impatience, use those

opportunities to slow down, breath, and thank God for all the blessings that you have. Your Amazon package is late, but be thankful you are able to afford what is coming in that package. Your coworker misses a deadline, but be thankful you have a job. You're stuck in unexpected traffic, but be thankful that you have a car and are healthy enough to be mobile.

Let's calm this stressful time with the joy of the Lord that we celebrate in two weeks, and the confidence that he will come again. Be patient. Be joyful.

## ► Why We Don't Evangelize

There are many of us, who though we are devout believers, just don't understand that there is a universal call to evangelization. We just don't see evangelization as a personal responsibility. There seems to be a disconnect between what Christians believe and what we do about it. We know nothing is more important than God, yet we have difficulty in actually sharing Him with others. There are many possible reasons for this and in the next few weeks we will look at each of them. Why we don't evangelize...

### Reason #2

Some of us may believe we are not knowledgeable about our faith to be effective evangelizers and

we fear doing more harm than good. Although solid formation in our faith is important in this work, maybe this is an excuse because we are just scared and uncomfortable. But we don't have to be able to answer every question or be ready to address every retort or rejection we may get, we just need to profess what our faith has meant in our lives and that we believe it will lead all men to eternal life. Through our prayers and our loving actions toward our fellow human beings we bare witness to Christ.

### Reason #3

What about fearing we are not holy enough to do this work? We should understand that we are

not enabled to evangelize by our own power or holiness. It is Jesus' power that furthers the gospel. But by our baptism we are called and equipped to be missionaries. Someone said if the apostles waited until they were perfect before starting to share the gospel, it would never have gotten out into the world.



## ► Family Fully Alive

December 26 is the feast day of the Holy Family. Since this sacred day falls on a Monday this year, the Knights of Columbus will honor the Holy Family on Saturday, December 10th and Sunday, December 11th by passing out Holy Cards with prayers to the Holy family and a booklet entitled: *The Family Fully Alive: Building the Domestic Church* in the Gathering Space after each Mass.

The term "domestic church" describes the identity and mission of a Christian family. St. John Chrysostom urged Christian families to "make your home into a church" where "all, even

the smallest ones, feel actively committed to seeking the message of the Word of God and to living it together." It is to their parents that children first look for guidance and explanation; because of this, parents have the responsibility to teach them about what is true.

They must share with them not only academic and practical knowledge, but also provide solid religious catechesis centered on the reality of Jesus Christ and opportunities for practicing virtue. The "*Family Fully Alive*" booklet helps parents do this by providing monthly themes, prayers, reflections, meditations, scripture readings and family projects. They will help build

your domestic church as a place of faith, hope and charity, where each member will grow with grace toward his or her full potential in God. Although the book is written to begin this process during Advent, it can be started at any time of the year.

Please take one of these booklets from one of the Knights as you leave Mass that weekend and use it to transform your family into a "domestic church." Copies will also be available in the kiosk in the Gathering Space for those who cannot attend one of these Masses.

## ► Are You a Caregiver?

I have a friend who is currently the primary caregiver of her elderly, chronically ill mother. Her mom has been declining in health for the last few years, and is now completely dependent on others for care. Although my friend has siblings, as in many instances, the care of her mother falls primarily on her since she lives with her.

Many of us have been in similar situations, caring for a loved one. Sometimes it is our parents, sometimes it is a spouse, or it might be caring for an adult child who is mentally or physically ill. If you have been in that situation, you know how difficult it can be to not only take care of your loved one, but yourself.

Being a primary caregiver for a loved one takes a physical toll on your body, as well as an emotional toll. Although caring for a sick loved one can be very rewarding and fulfilling, it can also be exhausting. Sometimes, because you are tired, you might even find yourself getting angry at the person you are caring for, as well as angry at others, since you are feeling tired, overwhelmed, and trying to do too much.

If you find yourself feeling this way, you need to reach out to someone to help you. Taking care of yourself

is one of the most important things you can do as a caregiver. Make sure you are making time for yourself, eating healthy foods, and being active. It is important that you practice self-care activities on a regular basis. This might include taking a walk, talking or going out with friends or family, going to church, getting some much needed sleep, taking a relaxing bath, praying, meditating, or even going out shopping for yourself. Consider joining a caregiver support group, either in your community or even online. Meeting with other caregivers may also help relieve your sense of isolation and help you share concerns, feelings, stories and ideas.

And, although none of us want to ask for help, if you are the primary caregiver, don't be afraid to ask for it. Sometimes we tend to think no one can care for our loved one the way we do, but it is important to “get over” that feeling and let others help. In addition to siblings, relatives, and friends, you can try reaching out to your church family/ Health Ministry to see if they can help or refer you to someone who can help you. The Health Ministry at St. Therese has a number of resources we can refer you to help with care, equipment, and other services. There are also a number of community services

and organizations such as the Area Agency on Aging 1-B, that can refer you to resources for community programs and services, such as Meals on Wheels, transportation, adult day care, insurance assistance, or caregiver assistance. The Area Agency on Aging 1-B even offers caregivers a workshop that covers everything from self-care to communicating in challenging situations, to helping master caregiving decisions. If you think the AAA 1-B organization might be able to help you, try calling them at 1-800-852-7795 or online at [aaa1b.org](http://aaa1b.org).

Caregiving is not easy for anyone—not for the person providing the care and sometimes not even for the person receiving the care. The person receiving the care may feel guilty the caregiver is giving so much of their time doing this. Being a full time caregiver is hard work. It is also really hard if you work all day and then come home to care for your loved one. There are sacrifices and adjustments for everyone. Not only for the caregiver and the person being taken care of, but for other members in the household whose lives are also affected.

I often feature some fact about the faith or spirituality in my article. Today, I would like to use this space to share a quote by Fr. Ronald Rolheiser. If you haven't heard of him, let me introduce him to you. Fr. Ron is a Canadian priest who has extensive experience in teaching theology and philosophy, as well as writing on the topics of spirituality, theology and practical matters of faith. I find much of his writing to be very thought provoking, and in my mind, anything that causes adults to reflect on their faith is



a good thing! So much of our lives can be lived on autopilot, but that lack of reflection means we haven't had the opportunity to really understand and "own" that belief for ourselves. Taking time to think about faith gives a person the time to say to themselves, "Is this what I really believe?" If you haven't read anything from Fr. Ron, I encourage you to give him a try. In his book, *The Restless Heart: Finding Our Spiritual Home in Times of Loneliness*, Rolheiser says "before being born, each soul is kissed by God and then goes through life always, in some dark way,


remembering that kiss and measuring everything it experiences in relation to that original sweetness. "We understand that it is that inner longing that drives each of us in one way, or the other. Saint Augustine writes in his *Confessions*, "You have made us for yourself, O Lord, and our hearts are restless until they rest in You." Fr. Ron just frames that sentiment in a new way, for our modern ears... and hearts. Blessings on your Advent Season.




