On this Fourth Sunday of Advent, we hear the second part of Matthew's infancy narrative. The verses that precede today's passage tell of the lineage of Jesus as a way of situating him in the line of King David. The first reading is echoed in the Gospel with the words: "and they shall name him Emmanuel which means "God is with us." This

is the key point of the Advent season: God is with us. Implicit in that statement is the phrase "all the time."

In this last week before the Christmas holiday, take time to reflect on what "God is with us all the time" means in your life. How does God manifest himself to you on a daily basis? Do you

take the time to experience God's presence? Do you see God in creation? Do you see God in others?

For some, the Christmas holidays bring the joy of engagement. If you do become engaged to be married now or in the future, here are some steps that you should take shortly thereafter:

How can I be more peaceful and less stressed?

“Big things.” Those two words together can sound intimidating. “Big things” can make us anxious and even cause us to question ourselves.

Can you imagine how Joseph must have felt? The angel Gabriel came to him and said “Joseph, son of David, do not be afraid to take Mary, your wife, into your home. For it is through the Holy Spirit that this child has been conceived in her.” Mt 1:18-24

When I pray on this, I think of the angel’s request as more of a “calling” to Joseph. The word “calling” comes from the Latin “voc,” or sense of vocation. Joseph was called to be the husband of Mary and to care for the baby Jesus.



The Gospel this fourth week of Advent is very personal to me this year. Not only am I continuing Diaconate formation, but Bernadette and I were “called” to be parents this past year. I can’t imagine how Joseph felt, but I can tell you I sure was anxious and overwhelmed when I found out that the Lord was blessing us with a baby. Bernadette and I prayed and asked God for strength and reassurance.

What are some lessons we can learn from Joseph? First, we can respond to God’s

“calling” in our life. Jesus waits today to step into our hearts and to change us with the beauty of God’s love, kindness, mercy and compassion. Second, we can trust in God to get us through the anxiety. Instead of relying on ourselves to handle “big things” solo, let us be strengthened by talking to God in prayer. Finally, we can be a Christmas gift to others. We can love one another, have faith in one another, believe in one another’s dreams, and support one another through the “big things.”

1. Contact your local parish (that of the bride or groom) to register and to set an appointment with the priest. The couple needs to do this, not the parents. 2. At the first appointment, you will set the date for the wedding, fill out the A form, and go over the steps for marriage preparation. You will need at least 6 months from the initial meeting until the wedding day to complete the various steps. 3. You will need to register for the marriage inventory and the marriage workshop early on. 4. Eventually, you will have to plan the wedding ceremony by choosing readings

and music. If you get these things done early, you will find the preparations less stressful.

The last communal penance service with individual confession is this Tuesday, December 20th at St. Kieran at 7 PM. After that date until the new year, confessions will be by appointment only. We will not have confession on Thursday, December 22nd.

The office will be closed the week between Christmas and New Year. Mass will be celebrated at 8:30 AM Tuesday thru Friday. On Thursday



December 29, we will not have adoration. Instead, adoration will be on Saturday December 31st from 9 AM until 4 PM with Benediction at 4 PM followed by Mass at 4:30 PM to end the calendar year. Have a great week!

► Why We Don't Evangelize

There are many of us, who though we are devout believers, just don't understand that there is a universal call to evangelization. We just don't see evangelization as a personal responsibility. There seems to be a disconnect between what Christians believe and what we do about it. We know nothing is more important than God, yet we have difficulty in actually sharing Him with others. There are many possible reasons for this and in the next few weeks we will look at each of them. Why we don't evangelize...

Reason #4

Maybe we admit we are scared, scared of losing friends or family members, afraid of losing our jobs or of what other people may think of us. You're not alone, evangelization is scary. We have to trust in the Holy Spirit to guide us through our fears. And we need to be wise and strategic. We need to be as wise as serpents and gentle as doves (cf. Matt 10:16). We can start to further the gospel by small loving things we offer to do: give a miraculous medal or holy card to an acquaintance who is suffering in



some way and explain it, offer to pray with someone in need, or perform other spiritual or corporal works of mercy with gentle love. You may be surprised, as I was, about how people respond positively to every small act of kindness. May God bless all your endeavors!

► SENIORS KEEPING PHYSICALLY AND MENTALLY FIT

You have probably heard it time and again, physical activity and keeping your mind active is very important as we age. Numerous studies have shown the health benefits associated with exercise and keeping the mind sharp. Regular physical activity and exercise helps improve the mental and physical health of seniors and helps maintain independence.

Studies have shown maintaining regular physical activity prevents many common diseases such as heart disease and diabetes. Exercise improves our bodies immune functions, which is especially important in seniors who might have compromised immune systems. Even walking can be a powerful tool in preventing disease.

Exercise also has a number of mental health benefits. Exercise produces endorphins, which releases stress and leaves us feeling happy and satisfied. Exercise also helps improve sleep, which is really important since seniors may have insomnia and have a hard time

staying asleep.

Since seniors are at a higher risk of falls, it is important seniors maintain strength and flexibility. Exercising and being active improves balance and coordination and helps reduce the risk of falls. Falls can be a devastating and a life altering event in seniors and may impact the ability to remain independent.

Interacting and socializing with others is also very important in keeping your mind and body healthy and fit. Maintaining strong social ties is important for aging adults to feel a sense of purpose and avoid feelings of loneliness or depression. Find something you like to do and it won't seem like a chore. Consider volunteering in one of our many St. Therese Ministries. This is a great way to socialize with people and keep active. Join a walking group or exercise class. At St. Therese of Lisieux, we offer Stretch and Strength classes on Monday, Wednesday and Fridays at 9:30.

Exercise, meet a friend, go to breakfast with members of the group!

Regular physical activity and improving motor skills will help keep your brain fit! Studies suggest a lower risk of dementia for people who are physically active individuals.

Joining a senior center in your community is another great way to keep your mind and body active. Most centers offer social events, exercise classes, classes to learn new skills, and a variety of other services. On January 5, 2023, Thursday, at 11:00am to 12:00pm, in the St. Therese of Lisieux Social Hall, Amy Drake from the Shelby Township Senior Center will be doing a presentation on all of the wonderful services available to seniors (over the age of 50) in Shelby Township. ► Walking the Path

Since Christmas is coming, I encourage you to take the time to make a game, or challenge, of reading the story of Jesus' birth, the visit by the Wise Men, and Jesus' flight into Egypt. It can be done in one sitting, and is worthwhile on many fronts! Start by reading from Matthew 1:18 to Matthew 2:23. Then read Luke 2:1 through Luke 2:40. If you want extra credit, read Luke 1:5 to Luke 1:18 before reading the other passages from Luke's gospel, or even add in John 1:1-18 as well. The part that makes it a "game" is if you



take the time to compare what you read to your "idea" of what happened at Christ's birth. This activity is also great to do as a family, using two side-by-side lists.

I find that the comparison of scripture to my preconceived notions is always fruitful. It is very easy for us to adopt a stylized, "Hollywood" concept of Christmas, but reading the actual passages from scripture grounds me in the real story of Christ's incarnation. I find, there, no mention of a drummer boy, or how many "wise men" there were, let alone the fact that their visit took place in a "house," at some

point after Jesus' birth. (Note that tradition tells us that there were three wise men, and even names them, but these points are not found in the bible.) While it can be a bit deflating to have some of these ideas dashed, it is very important for all of us to know who Jesus is. After all, our faith is in Jesus. We follow him. Our Church and her sacraments provide us with the means of sharing in God's grace, but we all know that we wouldn't have that Church without Jesus.

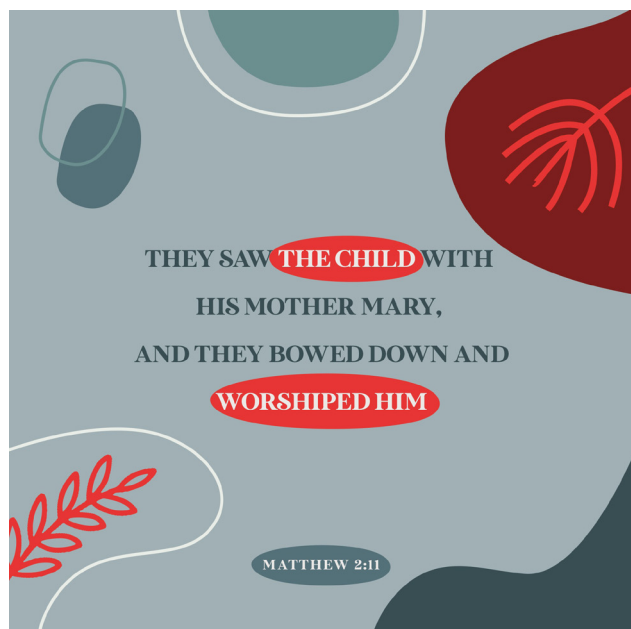

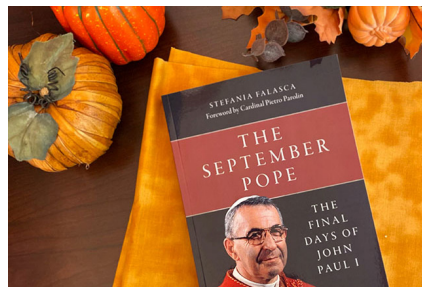

*Solemn Christmas Novena
December 16-24: A tradition at St. Therese of Lisieux to pray for all the intentions of the members of our family of origin, Family of Parishes, and family of God.*

Introduction to the Novena:

We will be praying with the O Antiphons and two symbols, the “Rose of Judah” as an introduction, and “Mary” as a conclusion to complete the nine days.

Explanation: Advent, the season of waiting and longing for the Lord is moving into the final week. The Church presents us with seven

O Antiphons. They are beautiful, poetic expressions of humankind’s yearning for her Savior. Each “O” Antiphon as it expresses our longing, it announces a title of the Messiah from the Hebrew Scripture: O Wisdom, O Lord of Might, O Root of Jesse, O Key of David, O Dayspring, O Desire of Nations, O Emmanuel.

The O Antiphons build to a pleading highpoint imploring the Savior to “COME”. Incredible, as it may sound, the initials of the “O” Antiphons (Emmanuel, O Emmanuel; Rex, O Desire of the Nations; Oriens, O Dayspring;

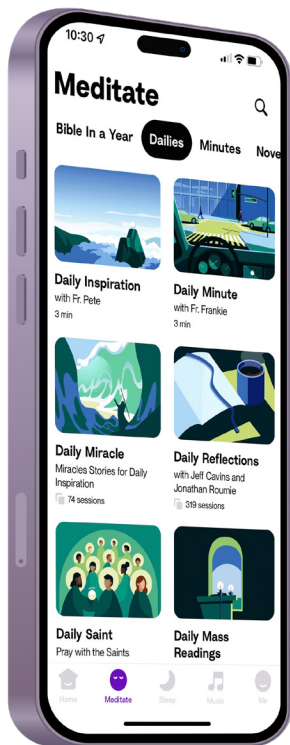
Clavis, O Key of David; Radix, O Root of Jesse; Adonai, O Lord of Might; Sapientia, O Wisdom) taken in reverse order in the original Latin text form an acronym: ERO CRAS translated and interpreted as the responding cry of the Savior to His people as: “Tomorrow, I shall be there.”

Saturday, December 24 at 10:00 AM Conclusion of the Novena - Morning Prayer in Church

4 Simple Ways to Remain Faithful To Prayer During Times Of Chaos



1. Choose a time to pray that works for this week’s schedule. Your life is likely changing from day to day. What works for this week, might not for next. These changes can

wreck routines, including your prayer routine. If morning prayer times were your go-to previously, it might be afternoons that work best now. Set a daily reminder to pray and treat it as you would any other appointment or important phone call. Drop everything for it. Next week, take a look at your schedule and see what needs to change or stay the same.

2. Find a space to pray. Now is a great time to make a prayer corner or prayer table in your home. It doesn’t need to be anything fancy, just a space that is set aside for prayer. Gather a picture of Jesus, a rosary, a candle, and your Bible and place it in your prayer space so that you will always have them available. When possible, get rid of distractions like your laptop or to-do list.

3. Practice social distancing in the home. Well, sort of. If you have kids, a roommate, or a spouse, tell them that you are going to be praying for them and that you would prefer

to do so without interruptions. Encourage children to have their own time of quiet and prayer. Let them know they can come to you after with any questions or thoughts after you’re done praying.

4. Get an accountability partner. This is especially important for those who find that they have a lot of extra time on their hands. It’s easy to just let things go when our life is not as structured. Find someone who will check-in with you each day and remind you to pray and make sure to find some time to pray together as well.

Do you find this list helpful? If so, download the Hallow app for more prayer ideas—including a new “Stuck at Home” playlist. Hallow is a Catholic prayer and meditation app that offers more than 500 audio-guided prayer sessions to help you pray, including the Rosary, Lectio Divina, litanies, Gospel reflections, journaling prompts, music, and the daily Examen.
