In fact, the Christmas season doesn't officially end until tomorrow, January 9th, the feast of the Baptism of the Lord. However, some communities still keep the tradition of celebrating Christmas until February 2nd,

Candlemas Day, or the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord. In any case, the meaning of Christmas—God becoming flesh and dwelling with us—should be observed every day of the year. God became one of us to show us how to be like God.

Today's celebration is a reminder

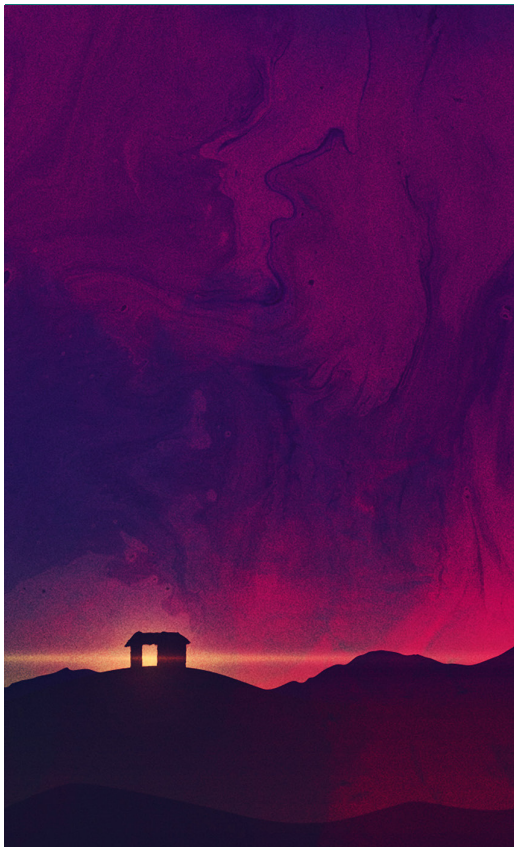
Connecting Point

► Pre-planning Funeral Arrangements

Having a discussion with family members or friends about death and/pre-planning is probably one of the hardest things we will ever do in our lifetime. But yet, when the time comes, having everything planned will make it much easier for our loved ones.

Discussing end-of-life arrangements is emotionally challenging for both parties, but having these conversations sooner than later will leave everyone involved in a more comfortable position in the future. These conversations should take place while we are still healthy and not sick, so there is time to put thought into the decisions that are made.

There is no right or wrong way to have this conversation and sometimes the hardest part is initiating the discussion. One way to start the conversation might be to tell your loved ones you have been thinking about your end-of-life wishes and would like to discuss it with them. If your family and

friends have a hard time with this conversation and do not want to talk about it, it might be helpful to consider sitting down with a funeral director/cemetery representative to help facilitate the conversation.

Once you have had discussion with your family and friends and feel you would like to formalize your end-of-life wishes, you may want to contact a funeral director/cemetery representative to preplan your funeral services. They will help plan your funeral and burial arrangements and make sure when the time comes, family and friends will have peace in knowing that end-of-life wishes will be carried out and that all costs have been covered.

If you decide not to preplan your funeral with a funeral director/cemetery representative, having end-of-life wishes documented is important so your loved ones can refer to it when making arrangements. Recording specific wishes in a planning guide, on paper, or online will be invaluable

in ensuring your wishes are met. To assist St. Therese of Lisieux parishioners, we have prepared a pre-planning funeral package which documents your preferences. These folders are now available in the parish office.

Keeping important, up-to-date documents and keepsakes organized in a known location, and up to date, will help the designated person managing your affairs. Better yet, if you feel comfortable doing so, take the time to review this information with them, so they have a better understanding of what they will need to know when the time comes.

► Walking the Path

If you read my article last week, there, I shared that I will be discussing the meaning of each of the four separate ways to experience Christ's presence in the Mass in my next few articles. We'll discuss them in this order: 1. In the proclamation of the Word; 2. In the community that is gathered; 3. In the person of the priest; 4. In the Real Presence of the Eucharist. We start, now, with how we experience Jesus in the proclamation of the Word, but maybe I better expand that statement to include the Trinity. Let me explain.



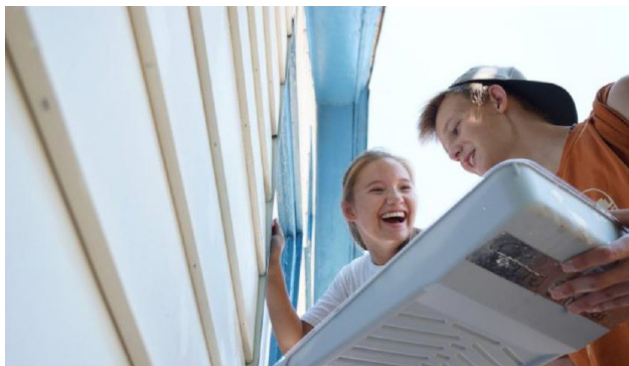
Recently, I took a class where Dr. Robert Fastiggi stressed the unity of the One, True God. He mentioned that God, in God's entirety is present in every sacrament. Even if we humans focus in on one person of the Trinity, like praying to Jesus, for example, it is all three Persons of the Trinity who are present. That reality is important as we discuss Jesus' presence at Mass. The General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM) shares that it is "when the Sacred Scriptures are read in the Church, God himself speaks to his people, and Christ, present in his word, proclaims the

Gospel" (GIRM, no. 29). How can this be? While I could say that it is one of the mysteries of the faith, that statement is a cop-out. How I have come to understand this presence is in a way that cannot fully explain it, but can give us a fraction of the deeper reality by relating it to our lived experience.

I have come to understand God's presence in the reading and hearing of the scriptures at Mass by equating it to the sharing of the foundational stories of a family when they are gathered. Just like hearing the story of an uncle who lived

a tough life “back in the old country” and chose to immigrate to the United States conveys the backstory and reason that a family is gathered together today, the scriptures provide the “backstory” and the “reason” for the people of faith. Further, in hearing the stories of a family, we keep the stories “alive” and we make those long lost relatives present in a way that, at times, can feel palpable. Obviously, this explanation provides a pale comparison between something easy to understand and a much deeper reality. However, I have found it helpful to think about the importance of family stories and that urgency of wanting to know more and to tell those stories to future generations as I hear the scriptures read at Mass. If we think about the stories of our own family, we can easily see why the Jewish people, and then the first Christians, felt the urgency to write down all of those important stories of their history. It is such a blessing to be able to share them during our worship.

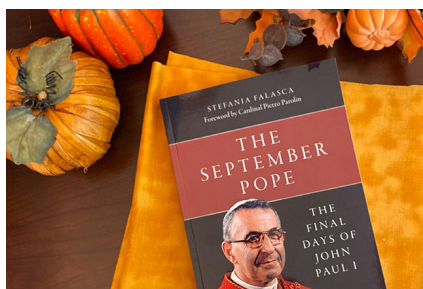

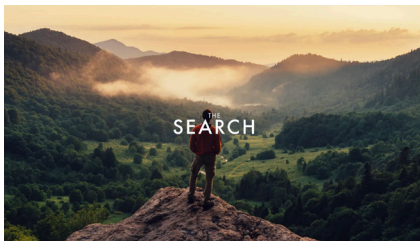
