Today's responsorial psalm "Here I am Lord; I come to do your will" is quite familiar to us. Many songs have been written using this text. But this begs the question: Do we really mean what we say? Am I truly ready to do the will of God? Am I open to being vulnerable before God and allowing him to use me as his instrument?

There is a saying from Jeremiah the prophet, "you duped me Lord and I allowed myself to be duped." We often place ourselves at the service of the Lord, but we get more than we bargained for. Serving God means being open to a lot of surprises.

This week's Connecting Point

question helps us to put things into perspective: "How am I called to make the light of Christ known? If I allow the light that is within me to shine, I am exposed, vulnerable, and open. In effect, I put a target on my back because I am now saying that I want to be like Christ and that puts me in danger of scrutiny and criticism.

In the Gospel this week, John the Baptist proclaims Jesus the Christ by saying, "Behold, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world." Jesus in fact fulfills the vision of Isaiah from the first reading, "I will make you a light to the nations, that my salvation may reach to the ends of the earth."

It is wonderful to think of Jesus as the light to the nations and all, but what about you and me. Do we participate in this mission of bringing Christ's light to the ends of the earth? We find the answer to this in our Baptism where we are each anointed as members of Jesus Christ, priest, prophet and king. As members of Christ we have the same calling to be a light of salvation to our end of the earth. This can seem more than a little overwhelming. How can I make the light of Christ known?



Well, the church gives us a blueprint of 14 ways in which we as Catholic Christians make the light of Christ known. They are called the Corporal and Spiritual Works of Mercy:

Corporal Works of Mercy

- 1. Feed the hungry
- 2. Give drink to the thirsty
- 3. Clothe the naked
- 4. Shelter the homeless
- 5. Visit the Sick
- 6. Visit the imprisoned
- 7. Bury the dead


Spiritual Works of Mercy

- 1. Counsel the doubtful
- 2. Instruct the ignorant
- 3. Admonish sinners
- 4. Comfort the afflicted
- 5. Forgive offences
- 6. Bear wrongs patiently
- 7. Pray for the living and the dead

All these works of mercy have one thing in common. They respond with love and mercy to the needs of others. In fact, every time we respond to someone in need with compassion, we make known the light of Christ. Throughout each day, God gives us so many opportunities to do just that by; making lunches for the kids, speaking a kind word to the clerk at the checkout, blessings rather than cursing the person that cuts in front of me, listening to a coworker, giving a hug, or cheering someone up. The list goes on and on of the little ways in which we are called to make the light of Christ known. As Therese of Lisieux advises us, we don't have to do great things we just have to do all the little things with Great Love.

Walking the Path

Today, as I continue our discussion of the meaning of each of the four separate ways we experience Christ's presence in the Mass, we'll discuss Christ's presence in the community that is gathered. This is a fairly straightforward assertion, since it was Jesus who said, "For where two or three are gathered together in my name, I am there among them" (Matthew 18:20 -NRSV). Christ is present in the group of people who gather to offer the Mass. Not only did Jesus promise to be with his followers whenever they gathered in his name, but the people who gather at Mass are members of the Church, the Body



of Christ, his continuing presence in the world! In gathering, we are demonstrating this unity of the body in a symbolic and actual "communion." There are several ways that this unity is stressed in the gathering. When we sing together, when we say prayers together, when we stand together, when we all sit, etc., we reinforce this union. (More on "unity" at Mass, later) It is in "showing up" at Mass that we are acknowledging our place in Christ's body, and stressing that we all matter.

As a matter of fact, it bears mentioning that our church architecture changed after Vatican II, not because there was a lack of skilled workers. as is often said. Instead. the layout, and décor of Catholic churches changed in order to emphasize this unity of the community gathered, and to clearly symbolize the unity that gathering was intended to foster, among other things. Now, when we gather, we aren't just looking at people's backs. We are doing things together as a single, unified Body of Christ. Each part of that body is important, and it is good for us to see those gathered with us. We can see the gifts

and talents of others, acknowledging their presence, and the presence of Christ in them. People aren't just blocking our view of the altar! On the contrary, they are with us in our collective celebration. We are ALL bringing our gifts and talents, and OURSELVES - offering them as part of the sacrifice of the Mass. Joining them with Christ's sacrifice at the altar.

So much more could be said! If there is any aspect of the liturgy that you'd like to know more about, just let me know. Let me, also, take this opportunity to encourage you to join me in participating in the "Catechism in a Year" discussion that will gather on the second and fourth Wednesday evening, or Thursday morning each month. There is still time to join the study. Contact me with any questions that you might have.





The prophets, John the Baptizer, and even Jesus were derided and criticized because of their ministry; why wouldn't it be the same for me? Paul tells the Corinthians to be holy and that is also our calling: To be holy like Christ. And it takes a lifetime to accomplish. If we truly want to be Christ for others and seek to do the will of God, it will involve effort on our part. It won't be easy,
