Today's first reading echoes that reading from Isaiah which we heard on Christmas, although they are two different passages. The theme is that of light. ## How can I allow the light that dwells within me to bring about unity?

The opposite of unity is tragically far more pervasive than the alternative in this current day and age of sensationalism, false news, and anyone spewing just about anything they care to say anytime and anywhere. Relational chaos ensues when issues become more important than people.

When it comes to our personal relationships with family and friends (including social media contacts), we do have control in how we react to anything that makes us feel disunified with them.

Jesus was all about relationships. He focused less on conflict and past sins than he did on support and encouragement of those he met, including tax collectors, criminals and the woman at the well. He was more about growing in relationship and moving ahead into unity rather than dwelling on the past. Jesus certainly didn't hold a grudge... even against those who nailed him to a cross.



Pray for wisdom and patience.

When we are faced with an opportunity to bring about unity from relational chaos or disunity, we can pray for the strength, wisdom, and patience of the Holy Spirit to guide us to a peaceful place from where we can begin to communicate.

Professional mediators use many tools that we can employ in our response to bring about unity.

Listening attentively - Good communication involves less talking and more listening (and certainly no screaming). Respond clearly - Avoiding defensiveness by restating what the other person said so they know you have heard and understand them.

Ask the right questions

in respectful kindness to appreciate their whole story. **Show Empathy.** Affirm common/shared feelings, even anger or frustration.

Affirming one another's feelings is a big step in reaching true understanding and unity.

Mediation requires much patience (and many deep breaths) in direct relation to how heated the particular issue is for you. This is why prayer must come first. We are much better at finding unity when we first invite God to be in on the conversation. May prayer, patience and perseverance bring peace and understanding.

## Walking the Path

Today, as I continue our discussion of the meaning of each of the four separate ways we experience Christ's presence in the Mass, we'll discuss Christ's presence in the person of the priest. Hearing this assertion for the first time might be a little jarring. After all, it seems a bit presumptuous and prideful for a mere human to say that he "is Christ," but I assure you, that the understanding of "in persona Christi" is a bit more nuanced than that. The Catechism of the Catholic Church states, "The redemptive sacrifice of Christ is unique, accomplished once for all; yet it is made present in the Eucharistic sacrifice of the



Church. The same is true of the one priesthood of Christ; it is made present through the ministerial priesthood without diminishing the uniqueness of Christ's priesthood: 'Only Christ is the true priest, the others being only his ministers' "(1545). The flawed. human nature of a priest is said to not be a factor in the reception of sacraments. because it is Christ who actually confers them! As Pope Saint John Paul Il teaches, in persona Christi "means more than offering 'in the name of' or 'in the place of'

Christ. In persona means in specific sacramental identification with the eternal High Priest Who is the author and principal subject of this sacrifice of His, a sacrifice in which, in truth, nobody can take His place" (Dominicae Cenae, 8). It is because of this "sacramental identification" that the priest says, "This is My body... This is My blood." In that moment. it is Christ himself who is speaking and offering himself to the Father. Is the mystery deep? Sure. Are the words that we use to describe it up to the task? Not really.

The priest isn't just bringing about a memorial of Christ's sacrifice. When Jesus commanded, "Do this in memory of me," he was asking for his disciples, specifically the apostles, to do exactly as he did. He didn't say, "Remember that I did this." That difference in wording points out the same directness of action and expectation that can be found when Jesus is speaking in Matthew's Gospel. Jesus said, "Amen, I say to you, whatever you bind on earth shall be bound in heaven, and whatever you loose on earth shall be loosed in heaven. Again, [amen,] I say to you, if two of you agree on earth about anything for which they are to pray, it shall be granted to them by my heavenly Father.

For where two or three are gathered together in my name, there am I in the midst of them" (Matt 18:18-20).

Again, just like last week, so much more could be said! If there is any aspect of the liturgy that you'd like to know more about, just let me know. Let me, also, take this opportunity to encourage you to join me in participating in the "Catechism in a Year" discussion that will gather on the second and fourth Wednesday evening (6:30-8:00 PM), or Thursday morning (9:30-11:00 AM) each month. There is still time to join the study. Contact me with any questions that you might have.

# **Building the Domestic Church Kiosk**

Today, the Church describes the family as a "domestic church," saying, "The family is, so to speak, the domestic church. In it parents should, by their word and example, be the first preachers of the faith to their children; they should encourage them in the vocation which is proper to each of them" (Lumen Gentium, 11). Precisely, a domestic church is a Christian family that, strengthened by the graces of the sacrament of matrimony, lives together in a community of prayer; learns about the faith, human virtue and Christian charity; and helps evangelize the world.

If you have been to Mass recently and have lingered in the gathering space for a few moments (indeed, we hope you've stopped in for coffee and donuts or breakfast after Mass) you may have noticed the kiosk sponsored by the Knights of Columbus with a collection of short books/pamphlets entitled "Building the Domestic Church Kiosk." If you haven't, take some time to visit. Each booklet is, in its own way, designed to assist in building and strengthening the domestic church. Take one, take several— they're free. More importantly, take the time to read, reflect, and pray with them.

## Advance Care Planning

Advance care planning involves learning about the types of decisions that might need to be made, thinking about those decisions ahead of time, and then informing your family and healthcare providers. These preferences should be put into an Advance Directive, a legal document that goes into effect only if you are incapacitated and unable to speak for yourself. Having an Advance Directive will direct others as to the type of medical care you want, as well as your desires for "end-of-life" care. You can change this document at any time as your situation or health condition changes.

An Advance Directive also specifies a "Health Care Advocate," which is the person you choose to make your medical decisions, if you are unable to make them yourself. A Health Care Advocate should be an adult family member or a friend (at least 18 years of age) who knows you well and can be trusted to do what is best for you. It should be someone who is available when you need them and can clearly communicate with your healthcare providers about the decisions.

Sometimes decisions must be made about the use of emergency treatments to keep you alive when you are unable to tell the healthcare providers what you want. You should be familiar with what these emergency treatments are and include your preferences in your Advance Directive. You may designate what you want, what you don't want, leave the decision up to your Health Care Advocate, or

even state you are not sure. Some of these treatment options listed in the Advance Directive include the following:

- CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation). CPR is an attempt to restart your heart if you stop breathing or your heart stops beating. This involves doing chest compressions, defibrillation and medicines.
- Using a ventilator as emergency treatment. Ventilators are machines that help you breathe. A tube connected to the ventilator is placed down your throat into the windpipe to deliver air.
- Using artificial nutrition and hydration near the end of life. If you are unable to eat, IV's will be administered and you may be fed through a feeding tube that goes down to your stomach.
- Comfort care at the end of life.
   Comfort care are measures that help relieve suffering while following your wishes. Comfort care includes managing shortness of breath, limiting medical testing, providing

spiritual and emotional counseling, and giving medications for pain, anxiety, and nausea.

Most importantly, advance care planning is having a conversation withyour doctorand your loved ones. Talking to your family or close friends about your wishes will help them understand, support, and follow your preferencesfor your care. Making your wishes knownto your family or close friends beforea crisis will help relieve the heavy burden on others having to makedifficult and emotional choices on your behalf. Sometimes families pursue aggressive treatments for the patientwhen there is no hope to avoid making a tough decision. With an Advance Directive, they are able to carry out your choices so they are not left with guilt over decisions they are forced to make.
