"Lord, it is good that we are here" is Peter's response to the transfiguration experience on Mount Tabor. However, most of us will not have experienced the Transfiguration or any kind of surreal moment in our lives. Most of us live a mundane, ordinary, everyday existence. Let's face it, if they made a TV show about my life, it would probably be cancelled by the second week.

Yet, it is good that we are here wherever "here" is. Because God is there. So each day should be a transformational moment for us in which we try to see God at work. Wherever we are, there should be room for God, as well. Every moment of our lives - every breath we tak - should be an opportunity to encounter God in some way. But do we recognize God in the everyday? Do we make room for God in our "busy" lives? Although our lives may be boring or repetitive, we should try to discover our Mount Tabors within them. #### How can I make a place for God wherever I am?

Perhaps we were taught as children that the church building was a place to encounter God and that we should go there whenever possible. But as we grew older, some of us drifted from the Church for a variety of reasons and haven't darkened the doors of a church building since. You may have done this or know of someone in your circle of family and friends who has not been to a church service of any kind for years, if not decades.

But the church building is not the only place to experience God. Some have found God in creation; others have found God in their service activities. Still, others have found God in music or art. But sadly, some people have chosen NOT to find God. They believe that "God is in the church, but I'm not welcome there, so I'll leave God alone."

As Catholics, we believe that God is present to us in the Mass and especially in the Eucharist. For this reason, we reserve the Blessed Sacrament in the tabernacle. But do we take the time to see God outside of the church building? The truth is, God is everywhere. Do we try to find God when we go to the grocery store, get gas for the car, attend our child's sporting event, or walk the dog? Do we listen to God's voice speak to us through others? Do we challenge ourselves to see God in and around us? Or have we relegated God's place to only the church building?

Today's readings remind us that God is found all around us, but we need to be attentive to his presence by consciously and deliberately making room for God wherever we are. Abram found God in the land of his kinsfolk, in the journey to the new land, and where he eventually settled. The disciples found God on the top of Mount Tabor, as well as down by the Sea of Galilee. Paul found God through his experiences of preaching and even when he was persecuted by others.

God is present and if we allow ourselves the luxury of making room for him, we will be truly blessed. I encourage you during this Lent to make room for God. Allow God to be a part of your daily experiences. Allow God to speak to you through others. Allow God to be a part of your journey in life. And wherever your journey takes you, make a place for God.

When Jesus saw his mother and the disciple there whom he loved, he said to his mother, "Woman, behold, your son." Then he said to the disciple, "Behold, your mother." And from that hour the disciple took her into his home.

John 19:25-27

Why did Jesus address Mary as "woman" on the cross?

Some suggest that it was a term of honor and respect. Others believe that by saying "woman" and not "mother," Jesus shows that Mary is not simply his mother, but who Catholics believe to be the Blessed Mother of us all, given to us as Jesus hung on the cross.

In his most agonizing moments, Jesus gives all of us, as his disciples, the gift of his mother. He entrusts us to each other. We can turn to Mary with confidence, knowing that she loves us as a mother and wants nothing more for us than to remain close to her son. We can be assured of her prayers for us and find comfort in her heart, a heart completely full of love for Jesus.

### Walking the Path

Last week, I wrote about the process of seeing God's presence in our daily lives and discerning God's will for us, as well. As a continuation of our conversation on discernment, I'd like to take a moment to reflect on a great process for making bigger decisions. For many of us, decision-making isn't all that difficult. For others, it can be fraught with worry and self-doubt. It doesn't matter what kind of "decider" you are, each of us can benefit from having a process to use. A process adds structure and surety, which assures a greater level of assurance that your decision is the best that could be made, regardless of the circumstances or outcome.

Here is the process in a nutshell:

 Ask the Holy Spirit for help. Taking our concerns to prayer is always a good idea. Remember if we have a thought that occurs to us, and it is aligned purely with love for others, or truth, you can count on that being the Spirit who is inspiring that thought.

- Think about God's law and the teachings of the Church. If your choice is contrary to the teachings of Jesus, how good could it be?
- Think about what will happen as a result of your choice. Ask yourself, will the consequences be pleasing to God? Will my choice hurt someone else?
- Seek advice from someone you respect and remember that Jesus is with you. If the decision is related to healthcare, ask doctors or other healthcare providers. If it is financial, ask a financial planner. Remember, it

is always good when we bring our faith into our daily lives, and when our daily lives are infused with attitudes and values that are drawn from our faith.

 Ask yourself how your choice will affect your relationships with God and others. To state the obvious, love is always the answer.

As the folks from Loyola Press have shared, "Making moral choices takes into consideration the object of the choice, our intention in making the choice, and the circumstances in which the choice is made. It is never right to make an evil choice in the hope of gaining something good."

Hopefully this process will come to mind the next time you have a big choice to make!
