MUSINGS + MESSAGES

We are on the downward slope toward Easter. Traditionally, this week is called Passiontide and marks the beginning of the most holy time of the church year. The readings are preparing us to enter into the Passion and death of our Lord. On this fifth Sunday of Lent we hear the story of the raising of Lazarus from the dead, which pre-figures Christ's resurrection

from the tomb. To be precise, Lazarus was raised from the dead, but he died again probably several years later. In Jesus' case, he was resurrected from the dead never to die again. Jesus died once for all.

When Jesus calls Lazarus forth from the tomb, he is restoring Lazarus to his sisters Martha and

Mary. Jesus is also showing that, as the Son of God, he has power over life and death. However, Lazarus was still bound by the burial cloths. Lazarus was still earth-bound until Jesus, through his own passion, death, and resurrection, opened for all of creation the gates of heaven.

Today's reading challenges us

How does the Spirit use me to show God's forgiveness?

But you are not in the flesh; on the contrary, you are in the spirit, if only the Spirit of God dwells in you.

Romans 8:9

There's a lot to unpack in that question above! As I prayed on it, I kept coming back to the main theme of the readings this week: Resurrection Hope. This Fifth Sunday of Lent challenges us to focus our desires on sharing in eternal life with the risen Lord.

But how do we do that? And how do we connect the idea of resurrection with the Spirit and God's forgiveness? Let's start with the word "resurrection;" it comes from the Hebrew word for "to rise up." You can think of "rising up" in a few different ways. There's the literal way to take it and we hear of the rising up of Lazarus in the Gospel. But there are other ways to think about "rising up."

When I was a young boy, I was blessed to get to sit with my Papa out under the carport at his house in Detroit. We would share a Sprite and he would tell me stories about his time behind the wheel. My Papa was a truck driver for Anheuser-Busch for many years. He would tell me about some of the "sticky situations" he would get into on the roadways and always told me "Johnny, you have to rise above and forgive people when they act nutty."

"Rise up" and forgive! God commanded us to forgive one another not seven times, but seven times seventy! But sometimes we may need a "nudge" to help us ask for that forgiveness. Cue the Holy Spirit. It is the Spirit, the Advocate, that resides within us and urges us to "rise up" and forgive like Christ taught us. It's the Spirit that can work through us to show God's forgiveness to others.



We are called to be witnesses and to forgive like Christ forgave. May this Lenten season continue to challenge us to "rise up," listen to the Spirit's nudge, and let the Spirit use us as joyful missionary disciples to spread God's love and forgiveness.

to believe in the power of God. We are invited to profess our faith in the resurrection to new life, as did Martha. We are called to affirm that, with God, all things are possible. Use this week to make spiritual preparation for Holy Week and ask the Lord to free you from whatever

binds you, whether it be sin, addiction, fear, or anxiety. Invite the Lord to free you in order that you may become alive in Christ Jesus.

Holy Week begins next week. We have Mass on Saturday April 1st at 4:30 PM and on Sunday, April 2 at 7:45, 9:45, and 11:45 AM (note the earlier time for the first Mass). Because we will be reading the Passion account, Mass will be a little longer than usual.

Each year at the Easter Vigil, before we hear the Gospel of the Resurrection, we read a passage from Isaiah 55 where the Lord speaks to us:

Giving seed to the one who sows and bread to the one who eats, so shall my word be that goes forth from my mouth; It shall not return to me empty, but shall do what pleases me, achieving the end for which I sent it."

While he hung on the cross, Jesus, Word made flesh, had accomplished everything he needed to. Having taken the full weight of humanity's sins, he's given himself fully. He achieved the end for which he was sent.

The 6th Word - Triumph

Jesus has triumphed. His work is complete. These words are his earthly farewell.

Hearing Loss and Dementia

Eye diseases like macular degeneration, diabetes-related eye disease, or age-related changes in the retina or the back of the eyes (affecting or reducing the visual information that reaches the brain)

can contribute to cognitive and memory problems, or even dementia. Additionally, people with diseases such as cardiovascular disease, type 2 diabetes, and chronic depression are twice as likely to develop cognitive issues when experiencing visual problems.

Research from the National Institute on Aging suggests existing treatments for vision problems could have prevented 100,000 cases of dementia in the United States if some treatment had been received. Data from the University of Michigan Health and Retirement Study (HRS) was utilized, tracking changes in health and economic circumstances for more than 20,000 older-adult volunteers.

Researchers noted how about 1.8% of U.S. dementia cases were associated with visual impairment and, projected by 2050, that number would rise to around 250,000 cases. The study also showed that incidence of vision impairment in older adults was higher for Hispanics, at 11%, compared to 8.3% on average overall for Blacks and non-Hispanic Whites.

Although I was aware of the research that suggests that older people with hearing loss are more likely to develop Alzheimer's disease and dementia. I was unaware of the link between visual impairments and cognitive decline.

Researchers suggest hearing loss causes cognitive decline by the brain getting overworked by trying to understand speech and sound, shrinking from lack of stimulation, or social isolation caused by less stimuli to the brain. Visual-impairment research, though, adds another dimension to why some people develop cognitive decline and Alzheimer's.


So what are the implications for us as we get older? As with anything, it is really important that as we age, we try and stay on top of our health. Practicing preventative health care is probably one of the most important things you can do to stay healthy. This includes scheduling regular checkups with your healthcare provider/doctor. This also includes regular eye and dental exams (at least yearly). Identifying and

correcting vision and hearing problems is underutilized in the world, so it is important we communicate the reason and importance of these regular exams.

In addition to following up with our healthcare providers, it is also essential we take care of our bodies. That means eating healthy, drinking enough water, getting some form of exercise every day (even if it is walking around the block in your neighborhood), and keeping your mind active by continuing to learn, being curious, being optimistic, being reflective through prayer and meditation, and practicing gratitude for our blessings.

Walking the Path

We are entering the last days of Lent. Holy Week is soon to be upon us! As such, we'll be hearing the story of Christ's crucifixion a few times over these next few days. While I know that our wonderful Evangelization Committee has been bringing you articles featuring the "last seven words of Christ," I'd like to take a moment to share some thoughts on one of the most discussed utterances of Jesus: "My God, my God, why hast thou forsaken me?" (Mark 15:34). Among those last "seven words," these, in particular, are the ones that people ask me about most often. While our space won't allow for a "deep dive" on the topic, I hope that what I share causes you to reconsider the idea that Jesus was expressing a moment of weakness and loss of hope, but also that it piques your interest and causes you to seek more information.

To start: We hear so many different theories on how Jesus was feeling at that moment upon the cross, and how that feeling must have been despair. People will say that it was one of Jesus' very "human" moments. What they may not know, however, is that Jesus' words were taken from the opening line of Psalm 22. That psalm contains verses that must have been foremost in Jesus'

mind:

- "I am poured out like water and all my bones are out of joint" (v.14).
- "My strength is dried up like a potsherd, and my tongue cleaves to my jaws; thou dost lay me in the dust of death" (v.15).
- "Dogs are round about me; a company of evildoers encircle me; they have pierced my hands and feet" (v.16).
- "They divide my garments among them, and for my raiment they cast lots" (v.18).

These descriptions of persecution and suffering are followed, however, by words expressing hope for deliverance from that trial:

"But thou, O Lord, be not far off!
O thou my help, hasten to my aid!
Deliver my soul from the sword,
my life from the power of the dog!
Save me from the mouth of the lion,
my afflicted soul from the horns of
the wild oxen! . . . For he has not
despised or abhorred the affliction of
the afflicted; and he has not hid his
face from him, but has heard, when
he cried to him" (vv.19-21, 24).

Going further, the psalm ends with words of praise to God and

thanksgiving for deliverance not yet come:

"All the ends of the earth shall remember and turn to the Lord; and all the families of the nations shall worship before him. . . Posterity shall serve him; men shall tell of the Lord to the coming generation, and proclaim his deliverance to a people yet unborn, that he has wrought it" (vv. 27, 30).

When seen in its entirety, all of a sudden, several points come to mind. First of all, these are words from scripture that are on Jesus' lips, not a random cry of despair. Next, the words of the entire psalm would have been known by Jesus, and he would have known that their focus and point of culmination were praise to God, and a proclamation of deliverance. We'd be shortsighted if we didn't connect the deliverance that was taking place in the very act of Jesus' crucifixion, just as Jesus brought them to mind. Crazy, good! Right?




