Who helps me carry my burdens?

The Gospel seems clear; Jesus wants us to come to him with our burdens. However, I have found in my life that often times is easier said than done. Especially growing up in a culture that promotes independence and self-reliance as cardinal goods. As a young man, I bought into the myth that sharing what was burdening me merely showed weakness and an inability to get along. I put on a show of being successful and happy, but inside I was pretty empty and miserable.

It wasn't until my late 20's, when I began meeting with a small group of faith companions after attending a Cursillo retreat weekend, that I began to learn that sharing your weaknesses and burdens is the only way to truly get along. The men I shared with each Saturday, constantly helped me to lean more and more on Jesus in times of struggle, and to recognize His help in every success. From that time until today, meeting on a regular basis with faith companions, has helped me more and more to turn to Christ, and to Christ in others to lighten my

burdens and find rest for myself. My faith companions have also given me many opportunities to hold up Jesus' mercy and love for them when they share their burdens. Over the years we have grown in our capacity to be Christ for each other, and for others we encounter in our daily lives.

Over the decades, the faith sharing groups I have journeyed with have evolved and changed with the stages of my faith life, but this small community involvement has been a bedrock of my walk with Christ since 1992. Through my brothers and sisters in Christ, I have come to know that I never have to do it alone. Thanks be to God, because I have also learned that I absolutely cannot do it alone. I still have bad days and good days, but my heart is full of the joy and peace that can only come from Jesus.

Yes, Jesus wants us to come to Him with our burdens. Yes, Jesus will give us rest and peace and joy. But, can you admit, as I have, that often times we need companions to help

us do that? Who helps you find your way to Jesus? How have you helped others find their way to Jesus? Let's admit the truth, "We all need God and Community."

Walking the Path

I was writing, last week, about some ways to enrich your faith by learning something new or finding inspiration from scripture. Two suggestions were offered: Fr. Mike Schmitz's "Bible in a Year" and his "Catechism in a Year." I stand by my suggestions, and if you were to ask either of our Catechism discussion groups, I'd bet they would agree! (If you want to learn more about either of these groups, feel free to contact me.) Shifting gears a bit this week, I'd like to discuss the value of a Christian-based book club. While such groups are easy to start, you can bet that people will always have an opinion about the criteria for picking books.

There are those who will assert that the only books that should be featured in a Catholic book club are overtly religious texts. Their contention would be that books about the lives of saints, discussing sacraments, or other aspects of theological or Christological texts, should be the only ones included in the lineup. (I know; I've received hate mail to back up my assertion!) To be sure, there IS value in reading these types of texts. If you enjoy history, or deep philosophical thought, you are on your way toward enjoying this type of club.

I, on the other hand, have found a great deal of value in reading and discussing books that contain some sort of moral issue or value system featured as part of the book, yet they might be fictional stories or any other type of literature. Let's face it, that is almost any book! I have found this type of book to be of great value due to its approachability. Most folks enjoy reading a book that introduces ideas and concepts in a way that is enjoyable and not overly complicated. Most people don't choose to suffer any more than they have to! An optional book club isn't going to have any members if all of the chosen books make people's heads hurt or bore them beyond compare! In my experience, what keeps a book club going is having texts whose plots are driven by serious moral decisions or the aftermath of poor decision making, societal ills, or even their opposite! These subjects can be rich soil for things that really matter to a Christian. Just like the parables of Jesus' day, these stories of everyday life, where meaning can be found in the most common situations, allow the reader to dive into deeper issues that often bring great insight.

I am happy to say that the Archdiocese of Detroit (AOD) has joined me in my assertion! Over the past year, I have noticed that they have released several book lists that include a wide variety of genres. Having said all of this, I think we, at St. Therese, are going to follow the lead of the AOD! We have a group that meets once per month, most often on the third Thursday of the month at 10 AM. If there is enough demand, we can open up the possibility of an evening group as well. Our current members have worked together to come up with a great lineup of books, well into the future. Our book for September 21, 2023 is Jodi Picoult's Small Great Things. Please consider joining us! Also know that our reading list will be available on our parish website. St. Therese of Lisieux's Parish Response Plan to Emergency Situations

A few weeks ago, Father Kasza referenced, in his Musings and Messages article, our St. Therese of Lisieux Emergency Preparedness Plan. For those of you who are not aware, St. Therese of Lisieux has an emergency plan to address adverse types of situations that could occur in our community and church.

Just to give you a little background on this, on October 18, 2018, the Shelby Township Police Department was asked to conduct a safety and security assessment of our church and the grounds and made recommendations based on that assessment. As a result of that assessment, St. Therese of Lisieux addressed each of those concerns and implemented a number of new or improved safety and security measures to ensure our church and grounds' safety.

After completion of the safety and security assessment and its implementation of improvements, in August of 2019, St. Therese of Lisieux developed the Parish Response to Emergency Situations (PRES) plan at the recommendation of the Archdiocese of Detroit. This plan addresses additional emergency situations that could occur in our church or community such as severe weather conditions, fire and smoke emergencies, medical emergencies, preventative and active shooter situations, bomb threats, and evacuation plans. At a later date, a plan was developed to address pandemics, since this situation was evolving.

Staff, volunteers, different ministries, and parishioners were educated in the Emergency Plan once it was finalized, but since we also thought it is important for our parishioners and community to know about our plans in an emergency situation, an abbreviated version of the plan was placed on our St. Therese of Lisieux website. Abbreviated copies of the plan are also available in red folders

in the Medical Emergency Supplies alcove in the Gathering Space, in the Social Hall on the wall, and in the Usher's Room. The complete emergency plan manual is located in a white binder in the Parish Office, and in Father Kasza's and Marilyn Cito's offices. It is only natural for us to think that none of these situations would ever occur, but unfortunately, that is not true! That's why it is important to be knowledgeable about what to do in emergency situations.
