I find today's Gospel quite fascinating; we see a different side of Jesus. He doesn't readily attend to the woman's request. In fact, he is quite belittling (or even snarky), but he does engage her. Why did he do this? Was Jesus having a bad day? Was he angry? The point is not so much that Jesus was dismissive as it is that the woman was persistent. She didn't give up. She plead her case. Some would say she even stood up to Jesus. The short story is Jesus was not ready to minister to those who were not Jewish. His time had not yet come. However,

in both Isaiah and Paul, it is clear that God calls the Gentiles as much as the Jewish people. When the Canaanite woman presses the issue, Jesus gives in because he knows the Gospel is for everyone.

At the recent World Youth Day in Portugal, Pope Francis reiterated

How can I be an agent of unity?

In this weekend's Gospel, Jesus meets a Canaanite woman who begs him to heal her daughter. At first, Jesus explains that his mission is to save only the house of Israel, but the great faith of the woman overcomes cultural boundaries. Faith transcends all cultures, making the foreign familiar, distances close, and the exclusive inclusive. Our call is to live our Catholic faith with openness, and to bring all people, with respect and without judgment, to be agents of unity in Jesus.

Sitting at the front of the church and looking out at the congregation during Mass is such a joy for me. I see people of all ages, racial and ethnic backgrounds, and a rainbow of diversity. We live in a time that has become increasingly divided, fueled by biased media personalities and political leaders. Yet, we can cast that aside and come together in church because we are all a family in Christ.

This broad spectrum of diversity and inclusion is found even moreso at our 5:30 "Sunday Night Mass," which is why it is my favorite Mass. I see more unfamiliar faces (i.e., probably

not all parishioners) and more diversity. I see people attending in shorts and t-shirts (which is how I prefer to dress) and coming just as they are, which is how Jesus calls us to his table. All of this creates a beautiful energy at this Mass, which is somehow different and even more uplifting. Even after having a full weekend of singing and playing at Masses, the energy of the 5:30 Mass is still truly palpable and invigorating for me.

Embracing inclusivity, and therefore unity, in the Church embodies its core values of love and compassion, while also fostering a stronger, harmonious community. Inclusivity nurtures belonging, allowing for deeper connections and meaningful relationships that provide for spiritual growth. By exemplifying unity, the Church also serves as an example of what creating a more interconnected and compassionate world would look like. Let's actively embrace inclusivity in our Church family and beyond, ensuring that everyone feels truly valued and accepted, and together, we will cultivate a more vibrant and harmonious world.

MON/TUES | GRADES 7-9

Mission is our Confirmation program to help teens move from accepting their parents' faith to learning and confirming what the Catholic faith teaches. 

I'm taking a break from my usual article topics in order to share a bit about our upcoming adult formation opportunities.

On Thursday evenings, beginning on September 21, 2023, and concluding in mid-May, we will be hosting Catholic Biblical School of Michigan (CBSM), from 7-9 PM. The theme of this study is "Encounter Jesus and Join His Mission." This powerful, live teaching from Tom Shaheen, MA. includes an unpacking of the Gospels, Acts, and Paul's Letters, including their importance to our lives today. CBSM studies are a bit more serious than a traditional parish study, but not to the level of a college course. That niche might be just the right place for you! 
that can be completed anytime. Find out more and sign up by Sept 6th at cbsmich. org, our use this QR Code.

Next, On Tuesday mornings from 9:30-11 AM, in honor of the current "Eucharistic Revival," we will be offering a study from the Augustine Institute's "Lectio" series entitled "Eucharist: Discovering the Mass in the Bible." In this study, acclaimed author and teacher Dr. Brant Pitre digs down to the biblical roots of the Eucharist, through its foreshadowing in the miraculous events of the Old Testament, the Gospels, and Apostolic teaching. Here we discuss "The Lamb of God," "The Bread of Life," and "The Body and the Blood of Christ," which are all are phrases we know from the Mass. But, do we understand what they mean in the greater and deeper context of Scripture and Church teaching? We'll discover firsthand how Christ's Body and Blood are integral and wondrous parts of God's plan for our salvation. This 10-session study will begin on Tuesday, Sept 19, 2023. Ulcerative Colitis

For the third time in recent months, a friend or family member told me they have a loved one who has ulcerative colitis. Although I did not think this disease was very common, it is estimated about a million Americans are living with ulcerative colitis, making it the most common form of inflammatory bowel disease. Ulcerative colitis is a disease that causes inflammation and ulcers (sores) in the digestive tract. It affects the innermost lining of the large intestine (colon) and rectum. The exact cause of this disease is unknown. It was previously thought diet and stress caused the disease, but although these may aggravate the disease, researchers now believe it is the result of an overactive immune system that mistakenly attacks your body, causing inflammation and tissue damage. It is also thought heredity may play a part in the disease.

Ulcerative colitis affects both men and women equally, but risk factors include age (often between 15-30 years of age, or over 60), race (Ashkenazi Jewish), eating a high-fat diet, having a close relative with the disease, and use of nonsteroidal, anti-inflammatory drugs, like Advil or Motrin.

Early symptoms may include diarrhea, abdominal cramping, tiredness, nausea, weight loss, and anemia. As the disease progresses, blood or mucus in bowel movements, cramping, fever, skin rashes, mouth sores, joint pain, red and

painful eyes, liver involvement, and loss of nutrients may occur.

Other bowel diseases that may mimic the same symptoms as ulcerative colitis (which only affects the large intestines) include Crohn's disease, which affects other places in the digestive tract, or irritable bowel syndrome, which is a problem with the muscles in the bowels - not inflammation.

Diagnosis of ulcerative colitis is made after testing and exams. It is important to consult your doctor if you think you might have this condition. Blood tests will be done to determine if you are anemic or have an infection, and your stool will be checked for signs of infection. Imaging tests and a colonoscopy or sigmoidoscopy will be performed to visualize the colon, and you will most likely be referred to a gastroenterologist (digestive system specialist).

There is no cure for ulcerative colitis, but treatments can calm the inflammation. Treatment depends on the severity of the disease and the person. Usually, the disease is managed by diet and medications with the goal being remission of the disease. When medications are not working, or complications such as bleeding and abnormal growths are present, surgery may be needed. About 30% of people with ulcerative colitis need surgery during their lifetime, according to

researchers, with about 20% of children needing surgery.

If you have ulcerative colitis, nutrition is important to avoid flare-ups. Trigger foods may be different from person to person, so it is important to keep track of foods that upset your stomach after eating. Foods and drinks high in sugar or fat, carbonated beverages, high-fiber foods, alcohol, salt, and dairy products may be problematic. No one diet works best for ulcerative colitis, and supplemental nutrition and vitamins may be necessary. For children, it is important to ensure they are getting the nutrients they need to grow and maintain health. It is important to consult with a healthcare provider and dietician to develop a personalized diet.

For most people, ulcerative colitis is a chronic condition with periods of flare-ups and periods with no symptoms.

Some people have very few flare-ups while others have many. That is why it is important for people with this disease to try and manage it with their prescribed treatment plan to avoid complications.
