How often do I forgive? For some of us, it may seem like we are always forgiving those who have hurt us. It may even feel as if people are using us as doormats. But, this is **not** what Jesus tells us to do. He is not saying to let people use and abuse you. Rather, he is telling us to

be generous with our forgiveness and not be afraid to forgive multiple times. However, there are limits. We need to learn from our mistakes and our sinful ways. The definition of insanity (or stupidity) is 'doing the same thing incorrectly over and over again and expecting a

different result.' If we are forgiving someone for the same sin, and they are refusing to change or own up to their mistake, who is being foolish? A basic premise contained within forgiveness of another is that there is some expectation of change. Furthermore, in the parable of

► Resist revenge. Embrace forgiveness.

We have all had those days where, while driving along, we are met with trying situations behind the wheel. A few days ago, I was stopped at a light in the right-turn lane, and I was waiting for the green arrow to signal my turn. As the light turned green, I began to let up on the brake and hit the accelerator. I had barely hit the gas when the sound of a horn blared. The driver behind me was impatiently signaling his displeasure with my reflexes, which, by the driver's reckoning, were insufficient. My surprise turned to anger at the impatience of this individual, and I instantly had stirrings of my own response. Thank goodness I pushed my 'pause button' before I acted on that impulse. I forgave this driver in my heart as I completed my turn.

When we feel wronged by others, no matter the situation, it is impossible not to feel hurt. We can feel it; we can think about it. Even so, this week's scripture passages challenge us to reconcile with others. We are invited to forgive from the heart. It is in the heart where we hold on to grudges, and it is from the heart where we forgive the things that hold us captive. There is a line in the Catechism of the Catholic Church that says, "the heart that offers

itself to the Holy Spirit turns injury into compassion and purifies the memory in transforming the hurt into intercession." The Lord wants us to be prayer warriors—not avenging ones. We need lots of prayer when we are weak. We ask the Lord for the strength and courage to seek a new response to those who hurt us so we can reconcile with them. Jesus shows us, by his sacrifice on the cross, that love is stronger than sin. His words of forgiveness become a living reality.

We are all debtors who are unable to pay back the great debt we owe to God, yet he sent his only son to pay our debt. Jesus wants us to feel renewed and rejuvenated by this fact that our debt is paid, but we are also to do the same for others. We cannot help those who flat-out refuse, but we can plant the seed. We can forgive those who hurt us or our community. Jesus reminds us how it is our duty to lovingly guide those who were led astray back to the path of Christ. It is difficult because our hearts can cause us to exclude those individuals and, in some way, may even want to punish them and retaliate. Think of someone who angered or hurt you in the past. It could be your family member, friend, co-worker, boss, or someone on Facebook or Twitter.



Now, pause for a few seconds and take a deep breath in and slowly let it out. Imagine Jesus on the cross, as he provides us with a great example of a heart big enough to forgive all offenses and, in that pause, find peace.

This is our way; this is our struggle; this is our challenge, but thank God we have him on our side to help us along the way of forgiveness and to receive his mercy.

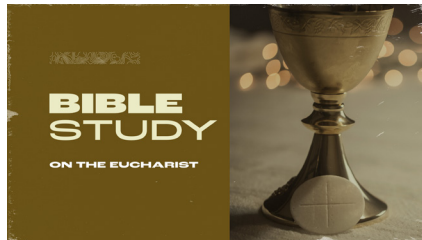

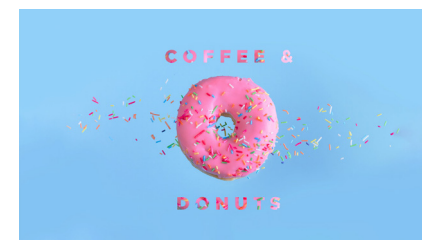


DROP OFF SAT, SEPT 23 - SUN, OCT 1

- Additional beer or wine: \$3

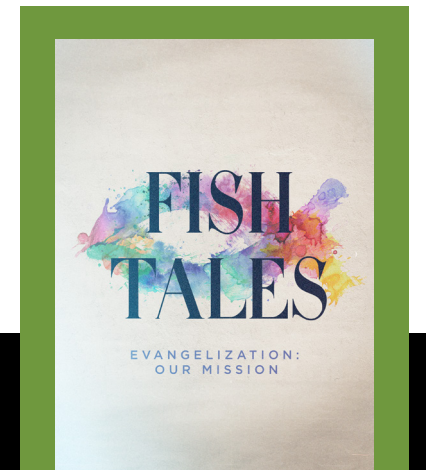

today's Gospel, the first servant who had been forgiven a huge amount should have been more forgiving of the one who owed a lesser amount to him. Inherent in the act of being forgiven is the challenge that the one who has been forgiven is himself/herself more merciful to others because he/she has been shown

mercy. In addition, once you have been forgiven of a particular sin, it should not be repeated. If you have wronged a family member, you should never betray them again. Yes, we need to be generous with our forgiveness of others because we want others to forgive us as well. However, never take advantage of

the forgiveness that you've been given or presume that you can repeat the sin or transgression repeatedly without consequence. Strive to be like the Lord who is slow to anger and rich in compassion.

Jesus, in the Eucharist, reminds us that we are never alone—that he is with us. In our brokenness, sorrows, and frustrations, he is with us. He never leaves us. Jesus wants to walk with us in our journeys toward eternal life.

► Walking the Path

We have talked about the way the Church issues documents before. It is one of those things that can seem a bit strange. To review, what happens is an individual or group (almost always a bishop or group of bishops) will work to write a document that addresses an issue of faith, a theological point, the functioning of the Church, or morality. The content is supposed to shape the way issues are taught and discussed, but they also shape how we function within our parishes. I bring this up for a couple of reasons. First of all, I have been questioned about these types of documents and the power they have. Next, I was watching a YouTube video from Fr. Casey Cole, OFM, and I was struck by what he had to say in one particular video entitled "The Idolatry of the Catholic Church." In a way, his topic is related. Let me explain.

I begin with a mention of how the Church issues documents and what is supposed to happen when they are issued. As I said above, the Church often issues documents that are supposed to firm up some matter of faith, shape some behavior, or address another matter. After being issued, these documents are supposed to be read and acted upon. An example springs to mind. In 1999, just as I was beginning to work on my master's degree, a

document was issued from the US bishops called, "Our Hearts Were Burning Within Us: A Pastoral Plan for Adult Faith Formation in the United States." It was written to convey the importance of adult formation in our communities and to motivate parishes to make formation for adults a priority. The line that jumped out at me when I first read it was, "Adult faith formation, by which people consciously grow in the life of Christ through experience, reflection, prayer, and study, must be "the central task in [this] catechetical enterprise," becoming "the axis around which revolves the catechesis of childhood and adolescence as well as that of old age" (OHWB #5). This assertion that parishes are supposed to make adult formation the most important formation, with formation for others still important, yet not the center of the target, was mind-blowing for me. It shaped much of my studies and ministry. Yet, often, I see that there aren't many offerings for adult formation in most parishes. I've been in ministry for a while; I've never noticed a big bump in offerings or attendance following the issuance of the document. I, now, wonder how many other people even read the document. It doesn't seem likely that many priests, religious, and lay ministers were reading the document, so I doubt the average person in the pew was. The lack of

exposure and implementation can mean that some of the documents, while well-written, don't have a ton of power to enact change. Now, this isn't a critique! We're all busy, and our time is consumed by a million other tasks, but the breakdown of our ability to hear the Church's stance on issues (in this case via reading) means that we often grow a skewed view of what the Church has to say on issues, which brings me to Fr. Casey.

In Fr. Casey's video, he asserts that idolatry is often in the form of putting false parameters around God. He says he has often experienced times when he finds people come to believe that God agrees with their problematic points of view. As I watched the video, all I kept thinking was how the only way that can happen is when someone chooses **not** to listen to the message we hear from Jesus. Just like the aforementioned document falling flat, the scriptures, especially the New Testament, are falling flat for some of us. If we want to change that, we need to unblock our ears, crack open our bibles, and take the time to hear what Jesus has to say. That's our protection from shaping God into our own image.

► Importance of Getting the Flu Vaccine

"What exactly is a vaccine, and why is it important to get it?" A vaccine contains the same germs that cause disease, but have been either killed or weakened so they don't make you sick. A vaccine stimulates your immune system to produce antibodies, exactly like you would if you were exposed to the disease. That's what makes vaccines such powerful medicine. Unlike medicines which "treat or cure" diseases, vaccines **prevent** them.

Flu season starts in October and can go as late as March (and even April), but usually peaks in the U.S. in February. In general, everyone over the age of 6 months should get vaccinated-the earlier the better. Late September is a good time, and even into October and beyond.

People have a number of reasons why they don't get a flu shot. Some say they don't like to get "shots." Others say they don't get the flu vaccine because they believe it can make them sick. You cannot get the flu from the flu shot! Other people just don't think they "need" to get the flu vaccine.

People also say they don't get the flu shot because it is not "100% effective." Although it is true the influenza vaccine

does not provide absolute protection against the flu, it can greatly reduce the severity of your symptoms if you do come down with the flu-and keep you out of the hospital! The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) says, like all vaccines, the one for flu is not perfect, but it cuts the risk of illness by 30-60% in the general population.

Children, older adults, pregnant women, anyone with chronic medical conditions (asthma, diabetes, heart disease, obesity, or a compromised immune system) and healthcare workers are especially vulnerable to getting the flu or having complications such as pneumonia, bronchitis, and sinus and ear infections. Children younger than 2 are especially vulnerable. Children under the age of 6 months are more likely to get complications, but since they are too young to get the flu vaccine, the best idea is to be sure everyone in contact with them is vaccinated.

Adults ages 65 and over are at a greater risk than younger, healthy adults due to weakened immune systems. Typically, older adults account for the most flu-related deaths and more than half of flu-related hospitalizations. Pregnant women,

as well as those who have delivered a baby in the previous 2 weeks, are more likely to have a severe illness than women who are pregnant.

The CDC states anyone who got Guillain-Barre syndrome within 6 weeks of a previous flu vaccination, or anyone with a known and severe life-threatening allergy to any ingredients in a vaccine should not get the vaccine. If you are unsure as to whether you should take the flu vaccine due to a medical issue, talk with your doctor/healthcare provider first.

St. Therese will be hosting a flu-vaccine event, administered by the Visiting Nurse Association (VNA), on Sunday, Oct. 1, 2023 between 9:00 and 11:30 AM in the Social Hall. Many insurance plans pay for the annual vaccination, and older adults covered under Medicare Part B can get the vaccination free with no copay or deductible. If not covered by insurance, the cost of the vaccine is \$45, or \$85 if you would like the "senior flu shot."

Guidance on Growing as a Catholic Family

Are you looking for guidance on how to grow in your faith as a family and instill in your children good Catholic values? Look no further than the booklets in the kiosk in the back of the Gathering Space. This set of booklets, produced by the Catholic Information Service and provided by the Knights of Columbus, is called "Building the Domestic Church." Each family in the parish is a "Domestic Church"-a community of prayer

where parents and children pray with and for each other. The family is the first place we learn the faith itself and about virtue and charity, first in our relationships with one another, and then as our family engages the world.

This set of booklets covers many subjects and provides guidance on building your domestic church. A sample of the titles available are "Lord, Teach Us to Pray" by Fr. Peter

John Cameron, O.P., "The Family in the Modern World" by St. John Paul II, "The Gift of Fatherhood" by Fr. Carter H. Griffin, and "God's Plan for Love and Marriage" by Dr. Edward Sri. There is no cost for these books. Please look them over, select the ones you would like to read, take them home, and learn by their guidance.
