ways are not our ways, nor are His thoughts our thoughts. God looks at life from a different perspective. This week's readings invite us to do the same. We tend to look at the world (and the Church) through human and secular lenses. We see life in terms of a balance sheet,

and, sometimes, we place a dollar amount on life itself. But God sees life another way.

God looks at the world and people to see their inner beauty and perspectives. Value is not placed on what they can do or

Resist resentment. Embrace gratitude.

How often do you feel resentful that someone got something you thought you deserved more? Perhaps it was a job promotion. Maybe it was a part in the school play. It could even have been that your sibling got a bigger slice of pie for dessert than you did. Sometimes, the resentment is justified: you were the better candidate; you worked harder; your parents played favorites when you were growing up. But, if you wallow in the resentment, you will never be free.

I know many people who can't get over some slight that happened 40 years ago. And it has held them back from enjoying life. There is the perennial question: "Why do bad things happen to good people?" It was posed in story form in the Book of Job and has been written about ever since. Harold Kushner wrote a book, When Bad Things Happen to Good People, which has become a classic in the genre. The issue becomes the need to move beyond the hurt, the resentment, and the pain and learn from the experience in order to embrace gratitude.

But, how does one do this? First, it's not easy. You need to be deliberate in making a change. You choose to remain hurt, angry, or resentful. Someone else can say or do something that affects you, but, ultimately, you are responsible for

your feelings. Second, acknowledge the resentment. Talk it out. Take it out on the golf course or in the batting cage. But then, let it go. Listen to the song "Let It Go" from Frozen. I'm sure the first workers were angry because they got the same wage for working 8 hours as did the landowner, who only put in an hour's toil. But, if they remain stuck in their anger, they will never be productive workers. They need to learn to move on. Third, once you've moved on, do not bring up the past. The past is in the past. You cannot change it. No amount of rumination or conversation will change the outcome. Eventually, people get tired of hearing your story of how you were hurt. They don't care. They don't care.

I learned a phrase a long time ago: "This is it, nobody's coming, nobody cares." When you are hurt, you hurt alone. People will sympathize, and even empathize, but you have to deal with your own pain and learn to heal yourself. You have to take a positive attitude and say, "With God's help, I can be free from this resentment." Start by finding the good or the positive in every person and every situation. Sometimes it's not easy, but look for it. Ask God to help you find it if you're having trouble. Keep on reinforcing yourself with positive energy. Surround yourself with people who make you laugh. Do things that



give you energy and excitement. Remove people from your life who don't build you up or challenge you to do better. Above all. PRAY: Positive thoughts and people; Remove negative people and energy; Always put God first; You are the only one who can take steps toward healing.

In every situation, resist the temptation to wallow in self-pity and resentment. Rather, embrace gratitude in your life. Be grateful for those people, situations, experiences, and things that help you to grow, be positive, and get closer to God.

produce; rather, value is inherent in who or what they are. A flower has value because it is a flower. A cow has value because it is a cow, not because it can provide milk or beef. As humans, we sometimes equate a person's value by what they can do

for us: "What can that person make?" or "How can that person entertain or play sports?"

God sees the inner soul of a person and places value on him or her because he or she is a child of God. In your reflection this week, ask yourself if you truly try to look beyond a person's gifts and talents to see their inner beauty as a child of God.

I AM HERE

He waits for us, no matter how many times we ignore Him or turn away. His greatest desire is for us to know Him, waiting there as long as it takes for us to turn around and realize our God loves us to the point of sharing His Body and Blood to heal our souls.

Growing up as a cradle Catholic, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament was by no means unfamiliar territory. We would often spend our Thursday afternoons in front of Jesus. Regretfully, this wasn't an experience I necessarily enjoyed or embraced. Like many Catholics, I had become so fixated on the rules we believed and the prayers we practiced that I had missed the point of our faith-a deep, personal, living relationship with Our Lord. With that piece lacking, adoration time wasn't really fruitful. It was something to check off the list. Something to do because I was told, not because I personally desired it myself.

This deeply changed once I started to truly know Jesus. I finally realized that Jesus had been patiently waiting for me to let Him know me. Adoration became transformed. While in college I discovered a little adoration chapel and I'd steal time there. Whether it was ten minutes before or after classes, or maybe some time in between, walking into that chapel revealed an indescribable peace and calmness, something I'd never found anywhere else. This was not a normal peace or calm, rather it was an



unearthly, "God is truly present in this place" calm.

To this day, the wondrous reality of what the Eucharist is blows my mind. It's God; the King of the Universe; the healer of my heart; existence itself. It's God's Body and Blood and He's waited for all eternity for me and for you to come talk to Him. How can you not let that transform you?

It's in adoration, at the feet of Jesus, that we let ourselves be transformed. I used to think I needed to be saying or reading so many words to make it meaningful. But no, you just show up. Whatever burdens you carry with you, you walk in and sit at the feet of Jesus and let Him love you. There doesn't need to be a single word said. His love transcends words. You just look at Him and He looks back at you. And you let yourself be transformed by the most life-giving love.

Walking the Path

What's love got to do with it?

Formation programs are gearing up, and families are seeking sacraments for their children. Young adults, and not-so-young adults, are seeking preparation to celebrate sacraments, as well. Each of these individuals is usually looking for one, or both, of these things: a connection to a community of faith and/or the filling of a void in their lives. Here, we'll take a look at both of these reasons for reaching out and the root of both: a desire to experience love.

The first reason for seeking sacraments, especially the sacraments of initiation (i.e., Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist), is to foster a connection to a community of faith. Young people often bring a fiancé to the OCIA program (formerly called RCIA) to have them initiated into the Church so they can be united in raising future children in the Church. They also know how important their participation is to their future spouse, and that their participation is likely to foster the love in their relationship, which is highly motivating. Parents bring

their children because they want them to be able to participate in the sacraments, allowing them full expression of their faith and participation in the life of the parish. Beyond that, individuals often come to know that active participation in a faith community has the potential to foster friendships and a sense of belonging that can continue to grow throughout an individual's lifetime. Active parishioners often say their church feels like "home," and the members like "family."

The other main reason for seeking formation and sacraments is to fill a void. It is a void that is often rooted in unanswered questions about the meaning of life and the floundering feeling of being a ship without a shore. St. Augustine said it best: "My heart is restless until it rests in thee." In a world that is often devoid of any real meaning, people are looking for the anchoring principles that Jesus can give. What's Jesus' main message? It is to love others as he has loved us. It is a message that is simple, but not easy. Good formation is focused on Jesus and his message for our lives, such that they help

us to find firm ground for moving forward as his disciples. The "frosting on the cake" is when individuals come to know the experience of God's grace through celebration of the sacraments. Coming to an appreciation for Jesus' message of love, and the knowledge that God is Love, can be deeply moving, but learning that we are directly connected to God through those grace-filled sacraments is life-giving.

As I said, when people seek formation in the faith, and sacraments, they are usually looking to connect with a community of faith and/or to fill a gap in their lives. What we hope they come away with isn't a head full of facts, but, instead, a heart bursting with love. We hope we have been able to convey that God, who is Being itself, is everywhere, and in everything, such that they are immersed in God's loving presence. That understanding can take us a long way in life...all the way to the day when we see God's face and live.

Pre-Planning Your Funeral Arrangements

Having a discussion with family members or friends about death is probably one of the hardest things we will ever do in our lifetimes, but, when the time comes, having everything pre-planned will make it much easier for our loved ones.

According to the Annual Consumer Awareness and Preferences Study by the National Funeral Director Association, 62.5% of consumers felt it was imperative to communicate their funeral plans and wishes to family members and friends, yet only 21.4% had done so.

Discussing end-of-life arrangements is emotionally challenging for both parties, but having these conversations sooner rather than later will leave everyone involved more comfortable about the future. If possible, these conversations should take place while we are still healthy, so there is time to think about the decisions being made.

There is no right or wrong way to have this conversation, and, sometimes, the hardest part is initiating it. One way to start the conversation might be to tell your loved ones you have been thinking about your end-of-life wishes and would like to discuss with them. If your family has a hard time with this conversation and does not want to talk about it, sitting down with a funeral director to help facilitate the conversation might be helpful. Families may also want to consider attending one of the informal preplanning funeral seminars held at funeral homes and cemeteries in the community.

Once you have discussed with your family and think you would like to formalize your end-of-life wishes, you may want to contact a funeral director to pre-plan your funeral services. They will help plan your funeral and burial arrangements and make sure, when the time comes, your family will have peace in knowing that end-of-life wishes will be carried out and all costs have been covered.

Whether you decide to pre-plan your funeral or not, information for end-of-life wishes should include choices of: burial or cremation, which church and cemetery you would like your services held at, particular songs or readings, types of funeral or memorial services, and whether you want a celebration of your life after the service.

You might also want to include a specific picture and/or information for your obituary, clothes you would like to wear if being laid out, and any other specific instructions. Your wishes can be minimal or very detailed; this is your opportunity to tell others what you would like.

Having end-of-life wishes and keepsakes documented, organized, up-to-date, and in a known location is important so your loved ones can refer to them when making arrangements. St. Therese of Lisieux has prepared a funeral pre-planning folder, which includes documentation to state your preferences. These folders will be available at the lecture, but are always available in the Medical Emergency Supplies alcove in the Gathering Space or in the Parish Office.

On Oct. 5, from 10:30 AM to 12:00 PM, St. Therese will host a Pre-Planning Funeral Arrangement seminar presented by Sullivan Funeral Home after the Rambling Roses meeting, which will end early.
