Does it feel like an obstacle course sometimes? Or like we are navigating some kind of quest? We attend Mass together as a Catholic community and then take the Word of God out into the secular world. "Spread the Good News!" "Live as a joyful missionary disciple!" But what happens when a law or a work "rule" is contrary to our Christian

values? Jesus gives us the answer in this week's Gospel.

"Whose image is this and whose inscription?" They replied, "Caesar's." At that he said to them, "Then repay to Caesar what belongs to Caesar and to God what belongs to God" (Mt 22: 15-21).

In the Gospel, Jesus is questioned by the Pharisees about paying taxes to the Roman Emperor. Jesus immediately detects that they are trying to entrap him. The Pharisees ask him, "Is it lawful to pay the census tax to Caesar or not?" Jesus knows if he says "Yes" he will appear to be a Roman sympathizer and will be discredited in the eyes


# The Mystery of the Eucharist

- Additional beer or wine: \$3



of many. However, if he says "No," he will be reported to the authorities for instigating a tax revolt.

What does Jesus do? He teaches two important lessons. First, by stating "to repay to Caesar what belongs to Cesar and to God what belongs to God," he teaches us that political and religious obligations can, at many times, be legitimately met. But what if they conflict? Jesus gives us the answer when he asks what it is that "belongs to God." It is the human person! Our highest obligation in life

is to follow and give ourselves back to our Lord.

It's easier said than done—to live your Catholic beliefs at all times. But that is what we are called and challenged to do. Not just on Sundays, but each and every day. When we are confronted with a situation where it appears our Christian morals are challenged by a law, ask yourself: Will my response/actions be pleasing to the Lord? The world asks for money, but God asks for your heart.

# Walking the Path

In a continuation of our conversation about sacramental readiness, I'd just like to finish up by addressing the confusion I've seen from folks who have lived in a different diocese, or two, around the United States or abroad. They often ask why there are different timetables and procedures regarding the preparation for sacraments. As I said before, a bishop determines the proper age for celebration of sacraments within his (arch)diocese, as long as those standards fall within Canon Law and the rubrics of the rites themselves. The difference, however, lies in the fact that these texts often provide "wiggle room" that allow for different interpretation or different choices for implementation. What?! Wiggle room? Different interpretation? How can that be? Aren't we a Church founded on structure and rules? Doesn't this mean the Church should tighten up those "rules" so we are all in full lockstep? Well... before you get upset, consider our current situation: Currently, we belong to a worldwide Church where there is great disparity in opportunities for formation, distances traveled for Mass, and more. The wiggle room allows a bishop to address the particular needs of the people of his (arch) diocese. Consider, also, the future: It is a future that will pose situations that we aren't used to. Americans residing in the Midwest or Northeast Coast are used to sacraments, pretty much, on demand. Even as we begin to feel the effects of our looming priest shortage, the opportunities for the celebration of sacraments are likely to change. Those changes may

mean that a sacrament may be more dependent on the availability of a presider rather than the age of the recipient. We can't forget, however, that there are places in the world where Mass attendance is booming, and their communities are facing very different growing pains, with Catholic communities where none had been before. Whether facing issues of the present, or the future, it helps to remember that the Church has seen over two-thousand years of ebb and flow.

As I said before, some of the disparity we see is based on a bishop's understanding of his people and their particular circumstances. For example, cultural norms can influence the decisions that are made. If families are accustomed to a very brief courtship, for example, the bishop may feel that a brief marriage preparation process is all that he is able to expect. His experience, with the people of the area, tells him that if he were to implement a six-month process, like we have in our archdiocese, couples would just opt out of a church ceremony. With a desire for couples to have the opportunity and desire to celebrate the Sacrament of Marriage in the Church, he implements a brief preparation process. At other times, the availability of resources and staffing mean that formation is brief or the Sacraments of Initiation are celebrated together (Baptism, Confirmation, and Eucharist). While it might feel like these "practical" situations shouldn't influence the preparation for, and celebration of,

these "spiritual and Godly" events, they have to. They have to because sacraments are conferred upon humans, and humans weren't made to fit into a perfect mold. They have to because we'd rather be able to provide the opportunity for a sacrament, even if that means that the preparation is different than what we deem to be ideal or the ages of the recipients aren't all the same. There is wisdom and grace in allowing for this flexibility.

As for our Church in the future, get ready to see creative solutions for shifting populations and the reality that we can't work our priests like dogs and expect the Church to flourish. Population shifts, including those that see a diminishment in one region and a rise in another, aren't new to the Church, even though they feel new to us. Those shifts mean change, variety, and nimbleness. While holding onto what is non-negotiable, and allowing for creativity and diversity elsewhere, it is helpful to remember that meeting people "where they are" has been modeled for us from the start. Just like Jesus, who went out to the people—eating with them, performing miracles upon them, teaching and praying with themwe are asked to step outside the doors to our buildings and walk with others, embracing the messiness of life. Cookie cutters and shoehorns can't be part of our equipment if we want to accompany people like Jesus did.

# Shingles

Shingles is a disease caused by the varicella-zoster virus—the same virus that causes chickenpox. Anyone who's had chickenpox may develop shingles. After you've had chickenpox, the virus lies inactive in nerve tissue near your spinal cord and brain. Years later, the virus may reactivate as shingles, but not everyone who has had chickenpox will develop shingles. The reason for shingles is unclear. Shingles is more common in people who have weakened immune systems and in older adults, which might be due to a lowered immunity to infections as you grow older. Factors that may increase your chances of getting shingles include being over 50, having certain diseases that weaken your immune system, undergoing cancer treatments, and taking certain medications, such as prednisone.

You cannot get shingles from someone who has shingles. You can get chickenpox from someone who has shingles if you have never had chickenpox or have never received the chickenpox vaccine. If you've had shingles once, you probably won't get it again, but that doesn't mean it can't happen. However, you can take steps to help prevent it or ease it the next time around.

Shingles is a viral infection that causes a painful rash. The rash often appears as a cluster of fluid-filled blisters. Although shingles can occur anywhere on your body, it most often appears as a single strip of blisters that wraps around either the left or right side of your torso. The next most common location is on one side of the forehead or around one eye.

Shingles usually starts out as a tingling pain, followed by a burning feeling, red rash, blistering, and finally with the blistering crusting over. You may also experience a fever, chills, headache, raised dots or redness on the skin, itching, stabbing or shooting pain in a localized area, and general weakness. Typically, a rash develops 1-5 days after you feel numbness or tingling pain. If you have shingles, you are contagious until the last blister has scabbed over, which is usually 10-14 days.

If you develop shingles, it is important to contact your doctor or healthcare provider at the first sign so he/she can decide on a treatment plan which may include ordering an antiviral medication such as acyclovir. These medicines are most effective when taken as soon as possible after the rash appears.

Many people are able to manage the pain with over-the-counter pain medications. Getting treated early can help shingles go away faster and may help you avoid related problems. Shingles on the face can cause hearing or sight problems, including blindness. Early treatment can also help prevent or ease pain, including pain that lasts after the rash is gone, called post-herpetic neuralgia. If left untreated, some complications of shingles can be fatal. Pneumonia, encephalitis, stroke, and bacterial infections can cause your body to go into shock or sepsis.

The Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC) recommends healthy adults 50 years and older get the shingles vaccine whether or not they remember having chickenpox. Even if you have had shingles, the CDC recommends getting the vaccine, since it can help prevent future occurrences of the disease. The shingles vaccine doesn't guarantee that you won't get shingles, but it will reduce the severity of the disease and reduce your risk of post-herpetic neuralgia.

In the United States, Shingrix is the preferred vaccine and was approved by the FDA in 2017. Shingrix is a nonliving vaccine made of a virus component and is given in two doses, with two to six months between doses. Shingrix is approved and recommended for people ages 50 and older, including those who have previously received Zostavax or had shingles. The Shingrix vaccine has proven to be 97% effective in preventing shingles in adults 50-69 years old, and 91% effective in those 70 years and older.

Side effects from getting the shingles vaccine may include a sore arm with mild or moderate pain, redness, and swelling where you received the shot. Some people may feel tired, have muscle pain, headaches, shivering, fever, stomach pain, or nausea. If you do experience any side effects, most go away in 2-3 days.

The vaccine is available in doctor's offices and pharmacies and may be covered by your insurance.
