The Medicine of Immortality

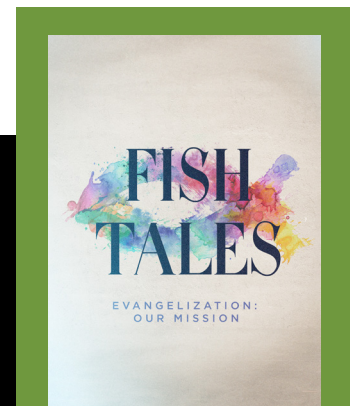
Ignatius of Antioch, in his letter to the Ephesians, refers to the Eucharist as the "Medicine of Immortality" because we are receiving healing for our sins. It is the memorial of Christ's death and Resurrection. In His sacrifice of the cross, He leaves us with the gift of Salvation. John Paul II also referred to it as "The Sacrament of Love," as Jesus mysteriously remains present to us in the tabernacles of our churches, waiting for us to spend time with Him.

Jesus instituted the gift of the Eucharist on the night He was betrayed (Corinthians 11:23); we know

it as Holy Thursday—The Last Supper. He gave it to His disciples and said, "This is my Body, which will be given up for you."

After He took the Chalice, He gave thanks and gave it to His disciples saying, "This is the Chalice of my Blood, the Blood of the new and eternal covenant, which will be poured out for you and for many. Do this in memory of me."

the Social Hall for these individuals and their families following the Mass. Please contact the parish office at (586) 254-4433 for reserved seating.

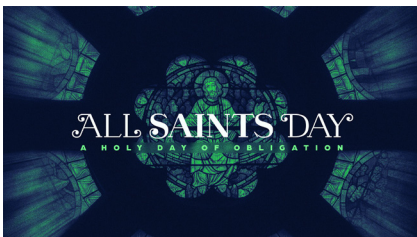

In last week's article I mentioned changing demographics, and their impact on the Catholic Church. As you, likely, know, I usually write an article "from scratch" each week. When writing last week, however, this article popped into my head, so I decided to share it. When I originally read it, I was blown away by the statistics, so I thought that you might be too! Written in St. Louis, MO, on Jan 29, 2023, by Jonah McKeown, and entitled, "Where is Mass attendance highest? One country is the clear leader," I hope that it provides plenty of food for thought for you as well:

A compilation of new data by the Center for Applied Research in the Apostolate (CARA) at Georgetown University sheds light on the countries around the world that have the highest Mass attendance numbers.

CARA researchers used data from the World Values Survey (WVS), a major international study of religious belief that has been conducted for decades, to examine 36 countries with large Catholic populations. Of those countries, the researchers ranked them by the percentage of self-identified Catholics who say they attend Mass weekly or more, excluding weddings, funerals, and baptisms.

According to the data, Nigeria and Kenya have the highest proportion of Catholics who attend Mass weekly or more, with Nigeria as the clear leader. Ninety-four percent of Catholics in

Nigeria say they attend Mass at least weekly. In Kenya, the figure was 73%, and in Lebanon it was 69%.

The level of attendance in Nigeria is notably high given the high number of violent attacks against Christians across the country in recent years. Terrorist incidents inside Catholic churches are not infrequent; notably, in June of last year, gunmen believed to be Islamic extremists opened fire on Catholic worshippers attending Pentecost Mass at St. Francis Xavier Catholic Church in southwestern Nigeria, killing at least 50.

More than half of all Catholics attend weekly or more in the Philippines (56%), Colombia (54%), Poland (52%), and Ecuador (50%). But in 29 of the 36 countries examined, fewer than half of self-identified Catholics attend Sunday Mass. The researchers acknowledged that the use of self-reported Mass attendance numbers could inflate the figures slightly, meaning actual attendance numbers could be, in reality, slightly lower across the board.

The WVS data did not include the U.S., but CARA's polling data indicated that the percentage of Catholics in the United States who attend Mass weekly or more is 17%, even though more than three-quarters of U.S. Catholics consider themselves to be a "religious person."

Continuing down from there, the lowest levels of weekly attendance were observed in Lithuania (16%), Germany (14%), Canada (14%), Latvia

(11%), Switzerland (11%), Brazil (8%), France (8%), and the Netherlands (7%).

"One might assume that the more religious Catholics are in a country, the more likely they are to be frequent Mass attenders," the CARA researchers wrote.

"Yet, there is not a strong correlation between the numbers identifying as a 'religious' Catholic and frequent Mass attendance."

Countries with a higher Gross Domestic Product (GDP) per capita had lower levels of Mass attendance and vice versa, they noted.

"While there seems to be a disconnect between identifying as a religious person and attending Mass weekly there is a third factor that may explain the comparative distribution of both of these attributes. If you've looked closely at the countries you might have noticed some economic clustering," the CARA researchers wrote.

"In this small sample of countries, we can surmise that Catholicism is strongest in what is often called the developing world where GDP per capita are lower, while it appears to be contracting in wealthier 'developed' countries," the researchers concluded.

► Halloween Safety Tips for Adults, Kids, and Pets

Halloween is typically associated with lots of fun things to do like trick or treating, parties, pumpkin carving, and eating candy, but there are some potential dangers families should consider. **When planning your festivities this year, keep these Halloween safety tips in mind:**

- Don't keep candles burning in Jack-o'-lanterns or luminaries. Consider using battery-operated flames.
- Opt for a safer pumpkin "carving" by painting a pumpkin or decorating with stickers, since tools are difficult for "little" hands.
- Look for flame-resistant costumes, wigs, and accessories. Ensure your costume is the proper length and fit to avoid tripping and falling.
- If applying face paint, avoid the eyes and test for skin allergies before using it.
- Use a flashlight, LED light, or apply reflective tape to your costume so you are seen by others, including cars.
- If you wear a mask, test for visibility out of the eye holes and proper breathability.
- If your costume requires a sword or weapon, do not swing it around and keep the pointed part away from yourself and others and make sure it cannot hurt anyone.

Top 4 Halloween Safety Tips for Kids:

1. Do not allow your children to go inside a home to accept candy, unless you accompany them.
2. Inspect candy before eating.

Check the contents of their bags and buckets for choking hazards and make sure candy is properly sealed (throw away anything that's been opened or is not packaged). Wait until you get home to indulge so you can properly inspect each item.

3. Have an allergy-safe Halloween. Review each label for any potentially harmful ingredients like peanuts, tree nuts, dairy, or gluten.
4. Brush your teeth before bed to get rid of excess sugar eaten.

Halloween Safety Tips for Adults:

- Lock your home doors, so your valuables are safe while you're out.
- Ensure your pets are secure in the house if passing out treats to kids.
- Stay in neighborhoods that are familiar to you.
- Go out with other family or other people you know.
- Start early and don't stay out late. Observe the time recommendations for your neighborhood.
- Tell your kids to walk and not run. Since it is dark, it's hard to see people when driving. Look both ways before crossing the street at the corners or crosswalks, and walk on sidewalks, if available.
- Plan your route ahead of time to stay on the same side of the street (versus zigzagging back and forth).
- Keep kids in sight at all times and stay together with your group. Have a designated meeting spot in case you get

split up.

- Only approach homes that have a porch light on (or are obviously accepting trick or treaters).
- Wear shoes that are easy to walk in (e.g., sneakers instead of boots with heels).
- If inclement weather is in the forecast, dress appropriately or consider staying home.
- Hand out individually wrapped candy/treats to prevent the spread of germs.

It seems to me less children are actually going "door to door" trick or treating. **If you chose to do something "different" for your children, here are a few ideas:**

- Host a Halloween party. Invite some of your children's neighborhood, school friends, or relatives to a party at your house.
- Movie night – Watch a scary movie together. Maybe someone in your neighborhood has a projector and would host an outdoor movie night?
- Halloween trunk or treat parade – Coordinate with your neighbors to have the kids dress up and have a parade.
- Yard decoration contest – Organize with your neighbors and compete and vote on who has the scariest house.
- Spooky scavenger hunt – Hide Halloween-themed items in the yard for the family or come up with a neighborhood hunt to various "haunted" spots to get info that leads to a prize!
