How wide is your phylactery? First of all, phylacteries are two small, square leather boxes containing slips inscribed with scriptural passages and traditionally worn on the left arm and head by observant Jewish men. The implication behind having larger phylacteries is that the person had a closer relationship with the scriptures. A

modern analogy would be someone carrying around their bible everywhere to be seen for show. Second, is our faith real and active, or is it merely a decoration?

In these last few weeks of the Church year, the scriptures invite us to reflect upon how we present our faith to the world. Do we truly

live our faith, or is it something that is a fashion accessory? I notice a number of people who wear the rosary as a necklace or have it hanging from the rear-view mirror in their car instead of keeping it in their pocket or purse. If the visible presence of the rosary reminds the person to pray, then great. However, if the rosary is regarded as merely a

► What can I do to show humble service this month?

November is the traditional month for praying for our deceased loved ones. We pray for those who were our mentors and guides throughout the years and ask God to give them eternal peace. November is also a time when we give thanks for our blessings and prepare for the upcoming holidays. As the days get shorter and colder, we may withdraw from our routines and become more introspective. I invite you, this November, to resist the temptation to “hibernate” and, instead, think of ways you could be more life-giving.

In our Family of Parishes, several initiatives will be in place during November and beyond. The word “thanksgiving” is made up of two words, “thanks” and “giving.” While we link them together to focus on giving thanks for our blessings, I’d like to encourage you to think of them as two separate, active verbs. We are to engage in thanks for all of our good fortune and for those who have been a treasure to us, but we can also engage in the giving of ourselves to share those blessings with others.

To recall the words from the Prayer of St. Francis: In the very act of giving, we receive. This month, ask, “What can I give in service to others so that I may receive blessings from God?”

One thing we can do is engage in Corporal Works of Mercy: praying for the dead or visiting cemeteries, visiting the sick and imprisoned, donating food to the parish food pantry, delivering meals on wheels, or simply helping a neighbor with some chores around the house. Another way is to participate in parish or civic initiatives such as the Giving Tree, rummage sales, charitable auctions, and the like. In our Family of Parishes, we are sponsoring Kids Coalition Against Hunger, which aims to feed 100,000 people at 35 cents per meal. While most volunteer opportunities are full, we also need your financial support. Our target is \$35,000. You may pick up a postcard in the church Gathering Space, go online to disciplesunleashed.org/kcah, or stop in the parish offices for more information. These are but a few ways to exercise your Catholic faith. Check out the bulletin and website for more suggestions.

As you give thanks for your blessings, in your prayer this week, ask the Lord how you can give back to others by engaging in humble service. What kind of endeavors is God inviting you to participate in this month to live out your Catholic-Christian commitment?

This week, reflect on how you live your faith. Is it only for people to see? Or do you do things to truly give God praise and thanks? Have a great week.

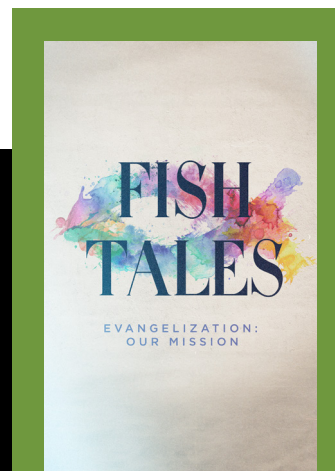
The Three Main Aspects of the Eucharist

► Walking the Path

When I am writing my article, I usually choose a topic that has recently come up in my ministry. This week is no different! As you may know, October is “Respect Life Month” in the Church. Interestingly enough, Fr. Mike Schmitz, in his “Catechism in a Year” study, has just covered the section of *The Catechism of the Catholic Church* that explains the Church’s position on those issues that are impacted by our respect for human life, as well. As background, it is worth noting that Fr. Mike is covering the entire text from section one to section 2865, in order, and not cherry picking sections in any random way, or based on theme. When I saw the coincidence, or should I say “God-incidence,” I figured that God wanted my attention. I was bowled over, however, when I thought about the book that we had just read for book club and its connections to the theme. The book, *Just Mercy*, by Bryan Stevenson, deals with a number of issues, but one of the central themes is the death penalty and many of the injustices that surround it. Three different things all aligning in this way really caught my attention! As such, I figured that I had to respond! Here, I’ll provide a very brief overview of the section of the *Catechism* that relates to the

respect for human life, in a bulleted format.

The Catechism explains the following topics in its section on human dignity:

- History reveals God’s covenant with humankind and man’s murderous violence, so God has always affirmed the sacredness of life.
- Defending yourself or others against an unjust aggressor is permitted.
- Any intentional homicide is a direct violation of the fifth commandment. The death penalty is no longer permitted.
- Abortion is not permitted. Life is to be respected from conception to natural death.
- Euthanasia is morally unacceptable. Those whose lives are diminished or weakened are due special respect.
- Suicide is contrary to moral law, but we need not despair. “By ways known to him alone, God can provide the opportunity for salutary repentance.”
- Respect is to be given to the souls of others. We shouldn’t lead others into sinfulness by our encouragement or example.
- Science and research are good

things, but they must conform to standards that respect human dignity. Each act must be morally upright, not just the outcome.

- All people have a right to bodily integrity, and the Church opposes kidnapping, torture, terrorism, mutilations, and sterilizations (and more) are against moral law.
- Organ donation and autopsies are permitted, yet the bodies of the dead are to be treated with the utmost respect. Cremations are permitted.
- Christians are to seek peace and avoid war at every possible juncture. The strict conditions for “legitimate defense by military force” are to be given rigorous consideration.

Okay. I know that this summary just glosses over huge issues and doesn’t fully address others. Books have been written on each of these topics! What I can say, however, is that it really is a good idea to get a copy of the *Catechism* in order to gain a bit more information on these and other teachings of the Church as a starting place. When the *Catechism* doesn’t answer all of your questions, move on to other sources of reliable information. More on that topic next week!

► Vitamin D Deficiency

With the flu season here, it's more important than ever to ensure you are getting enough vitamin D. As both a nutrient and a hormone, vitamin D helps reduce inflammation and control processes such as immune function, which may improve the body's first line of defense against foreign invaders and deter the development of autoimmunity. Researchers have also been studying the immunity-building benefits of vitamin D in prevention and treatment of respiratory infections. Research is also showing the importance of vitamin D in protecting against other health problems such as type 1 and type 2 diabetes, hypertension, glucose intolerance and multiple sclerosis.

Vitamin D has multiple roles in the body. It assists in promoting healthy bones and teeth, supports the immune, brain, and nervous system, helps regulate insulin levels, and supports lung function and cardiovascular health. Vitamin D is essential for strong bones because it helps the body use calcium from the diet. In adults, vitamin D deficiency can result in softening of the bones, which affects their density. Vitamin D deficiency can also present as osteoporosis which affects over 53 million people in the US.

Known as the sunshine vitamin, vitamin D is produced by the body in response to the skin being exposed to sunlight. Vitamin D also occurs naturally in foods such as fish, fish oil, liver oils, egg yolks, beef liver, and fortified dairy and grain products. Because some people do not get

enough sun exposure or eat enough foods high in vitamin D, a significant number of the population may have a vitamin D deficiency.

There are a number of factors or conditions that predispose you to a vitamin D deficiency and include following a strict vegan diet, limited sun exposure, being homebound, dark skin, obesity, and people with a kidney or digestive tract conditions where vitamin D cannot be absorbed. Symptoms of vitamin D deficiency include bone or joint pain, muscle cramps, weakness, or mood changes. Some people will not have any symptoms. But, even without symptoms, too little vitamin D can pose health risks. Low blood levels of vitamin D has been associated with increased risk of cardiovascular disease, cognitive impairment in older adults, severe asthma in children, and even cancer.

The good news is that there is an accurate way to measure the vitamin D in your body. If you have not had a vitamin D blood test, talk to your doctor or healthcare provider and ask if you should be tested. If your vitamin D is low, your physician may recommend taking a vitamin D supplement. Although supplements are available, it is always best to obtain any vitamins and minerals through natural sources, whenever possible.

Guidelines from the Institute of Medicine increased the recommended dietary allowance of vitamin D to 600 international units (IU) for everyone ages 1-70 and

raised it to 800 IU for adults older than 70 to optimize bone health. The safe upper limit was raised to 4,000 IU, but doctors may prescribe more to correct a vitamin D deficiency. Sensible sun exposure on bare skin for 5-10 minutes, 2-3 times per week, allows most people to produce sufficient vitamin D in nice weather. However, since we live in Michigan, this is not possible in the winter, so we may need to rely on a diet higher in vitamin D and supplements. As always, talking to your physician or healthcare provider about this, and other concerns is always recommended.

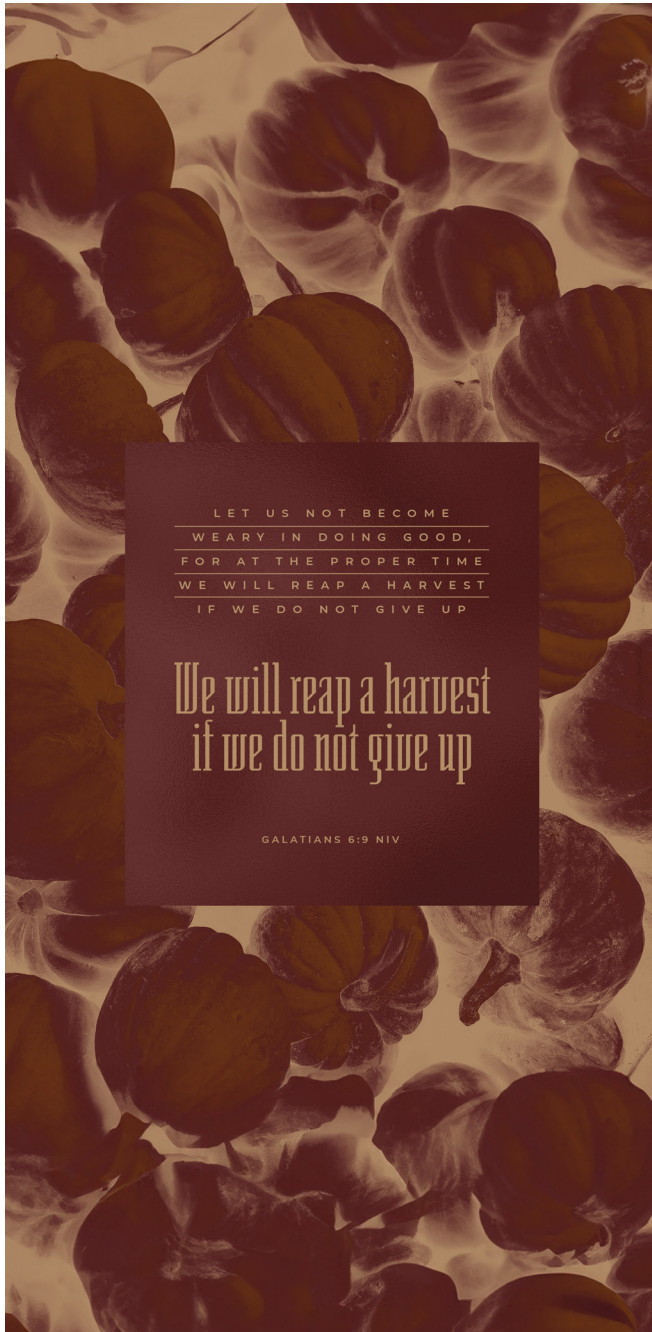
