MUSINGS + MESSAGES

At the beginning of the musical *Godspell* (loosely based on the Gospel of St. Matthew) is the song "Prepare Ye the Way of the Lord" sung by John the Baptist. It is a simple melody with the text being repeated over and over again. But how do we prepare the way of the Lord?

The answer is scattered throughout the three readings we hear today. In the first reading from Isaiah, we are told to give comfort to God's people by reminding them that their guilt is expiated because of God's mercy. The responsorial psalm challenges us to remember that because we have already received salvation from the Lord, we need

to listen to what he proclaims. In other words, we are called to take to heart God's word and put it into practice.

St. Peter calls us to prepare for the Lord by being patient and conducting ourselves in holiness and devotion in order to be found "without spot or blemish" before

Where do I see holiness and devotion in others?

Our second reading at Mass this weekend is from the second letter of St. Peter. In it, he tells us that we should be persons "conducting (ourselves) in holiness and devotion, waiting for and hastening the coming day of God."

I am blessed to be a part of a faith community in which I am surrounded and inspired by people who conduct themselves in holiness and devotion. I see it in loving, compassionate people who live by Gospel values and devote themselves to building a more just and peaceful world.

I see it in parents who bring infants, toddlers, and young children to Mass-a task as difficult as it gets. I see it in those who come to church with walkers, wheelchairs, oxygen tanks, etc. I see devotion and holiness in those who serve us

I also see it in caretakers, teachers, counselors, coaches, scout leaders, first responders, health care workers, hospice workers, smiling store clerks, and those many kind people I encounter every day.

Today's readings remind us that we are not only preparing for Christ's Coming, but we are also called to hasten it! To bring it about! We do so by living holy lives, that is, by living according to Gospel values and devoting ourselves to building the Kingdom of justice and peace.

Good Deeds During Advent

Every year, we are inundated with the commercialism of toys, Santa, cookies, etc., that surrounds us. Involving our children/grandchildren in the weeks of Advent is a most important initiative if we are to teach them that Christmas is, in fact, about the coming of Christ! As we prepare for this important yearly celebration, children can "prepare" in many ways by accomplishing simple, good deeds.

Yes, we are all busy, but here is an idea that won't take much time. Each child cuts out a simply drawn, undecorated Christmas tree shape. Consider keeping the same height and width so the trees are all the same size. Tape them on your refrigerator, door, or any place visible to the family most of the day. Purchase a bag of sticky stars from the dollar store. During the weeks of Advent, each time they accomplish a good deed, they put a star on the tree. Involve the family in discussing more ways to earn stars. Here are a few ideas to think about:

Walking the Path

It can be confusing. Advent is a time of preparation, where we focus on celebrating the anniversary of Jesus' birth on Christmas, though the actual date is unknown. We also focus on the fact that we are waiting for Jesus to come again, at his "Second Coming," so we are remembering the past and looking toward the future. Furthermore, when folks comment that Advent is a time of waiting for Jesus to be born, they are saying that they are waiting for something that has already occurred, which can add to the confusion. Additionally, confusion can come in when someone, usually an atheist or agnostic, jumps in and says, "You know, Druids worshipped Christmas trees, so they don't have ANYTHING to do with Jesus, so it's all a bunch of malarkey." What are we to think? Here it is in a nutshell: Advent is a time to prepare to celebrate the anniversary of Christ's birth and draw closer to him in preparing ourselves for his Second Coming.

As to the first point, Jesus was, and is, a real living being. Yes, he was different from us in that he was fully human and fully divine, but he was of flesh and blood, born into our world. It can be easy to downplay that physicality, yet we know that Jesus was born. He actually lived and died. Very few people, at any time in history and any place in the world, have disputed that. For

believers, celebrating Jesus' birth is a joyful occasion, even though we aren't sure of the exact date. Wait! What? Yep. Like many things in antiquity, official records don't make note of the exact day, but at least three theories exist as to why December 25th was chosen (tune in next week!). One of the theories is due to the pagan sun celebrations that took place around the time of the Winter Solstice. It is said that apostles redirected their focus rather than thwarting the celebrations completely. In converting hearts to Jesus, the message becomes, rather than worshipping the sun, turn your worship to the Son of God. Again, more next week.

Regarding the second point of focus, seeing Advent as a time of preparing ourselves for when Jesus returns is why Advent has always had a bit of a penitential nature—and why you'll notice extra opportunities for the celebration of the Sacrament of Reconciliation this time of year. As we have heard over the past few weeks, we "know not the hour," so Advent provides us with many opportunities to remove obstacles and "ready ourselves" for the time when Jesus comes again. We also heard in last week's gospel, Jesus telling his disciples to "be watchful" and "alert," followed by today's gospel, recalling John the Baptist telling those in the Judean

countryside and Jerusalem that they needed to "prepare the way of the Lord" through "a baptism of repentance for the forgiveness of sins." His call to repentance is still relevant today. Just like those in John's day, who were to prepare to hear Jesus' message, we, too, are to repent of our sins and open our hearts to hear the Word of God.

In conclusion, I understand why confusion around the themes of Advent exists. I know it exists because I was among the confused back in the day! Whether looking back to Jesus' birth or into the future when he comes again, the fact that we have a season that points in two directions can be confusing! Tune in next week for more on choosing December 25th as Jesus' "birthday."

What You Can Do to Prevent Falls

Did you know?

- Falls are the leading cause of both fatal and nonfatal injuries for people aged 65.
- One in four older Americans falls every year.
- Every 15 seconds, an older adult is treated in the emergency room for a fall.
- Every 20 minutes, an older adult dies following a fall.
- Falls are the leading cause of injury and death for older Americans.

Falls can result in hip fractures, broken bones, and head injuries.
Even falls without major injury can cause older adults to become fearful or depressed, making it difficult for them to stay active.

If you are a senior or have an aging parent, grandparent, or friend, helping reduce the risk of falling is one of the best ways to stay healthy and independent as long as possible.

The good news about falls is that most of them can be prevented. The key is knowing what conditions may predispose you to falls and what you can do to strengthen yourself and help with balance issues.

Here are some common factors that can lead to a fall:

Balance and gait: As people age, coordination, flexibility, and balance become affected, so it is essential to stay active. Walk in your neighborhood, mall, or local gym. Walk with a friend or your dog. Consider taking St. Therese of Lisieux's Strength

- and Stretch exercise classes on Mondays, Wednesdays, and Fridays from 9:30 to 10:30 am in the Social Hall. Not only will they help keep you active, but your social life will be enhanced! Yoga and Tai Chi classes will help with balance, as well.
- Vision: In the aging eye, less light reaches the retina—making contrasting edges, tripping hazards, and obstacles harder to see. Things on the floor may be harder to see than in the past. Consider leaving a small light on or using night lights in your home if you need to get up during the middle of the night.
 - **Environment**: Homes must be free from tripping hazards such as rugs and small objects lying around the house. This includes pets who might be lying down next to you or near your feet when walking. Area rugs can be dangerous if not secured to the floor. Use non-skid slippers and shoes that fit well, and make sure the soles do not stick to the floor. Ensure the floor in the house is not wet or slippery. This is especially important in the bathroom. Bathrooms can be very dangerous places! Utilize rugs with rubber backings so they do not slide, non-slip mats in the shower/tub, and grabbars near the shower and toilet. If you are unsteady, make sure someone is with you when showering or bathing. When you are outside, watch for broken or uneven cement or slipperv conditions, especially in the winter. Consider buying boots

- with traction on soles for icy conditions.
- medications: Some medications cause dizziness or lightheadedness. If you are getting up from bed, sit at the side of the bed for a minute or so before standing up. Some medications, such as diuretics and blood pressure drugs, can cause people to become dehydrated, so stay hydrated and be careful when walking to the bathroom. Don't wait until the last minute to rush to the bathroom!
- Chronic conditions: More than 80% of adults have at least one chronic condition. Some of these conditions predispose people to loss of function or inactivity. If you have chronic mobility or back problems, it is important to be especially careful when ambulating. This includes using a walker or cane and not holding onto counters and furniture if you already have mobility issues. If you take multiple medications, ensure your healthcare provider is aware of **all** of them. Read the instructions for your prescriptions, and talk with your healthcare provider about any side effects you may experience.




