The first paragraph of today's first reading from Isaiah is often heard at the Chrism Mass on Holy Thursday. It is connected to the Gospel reading which highlights the unique role of John the Baptizer as the precursor of the Lord. We hear, once again, John's mission as "the voice of one crying out in the desert." John was sent to bring glad tidings to the poor and to announce a year of favor from the Lord. But, we also celebrate another theme this day, that of "joy." The readings and responsorial psalm all speak of rejoicing. The reason for our rejoicing is because our salvation is at hand. We can sing with Mary, in the responsorial psalm, that the Almighty has done great things for us because he has remembered his promise of mercy. The great Magnificat is not just the song of Mary; it is our song. We are reminded of God's blessings and promises to us and how God loves those who are his own. Moreover, we are called to be joyfilled because we recognize God's presence in the world around us.

#### What in my life needs to be re-tested?

This third Sunday of Advent is termed Gaudete Sunday. Gaudete means "rejoice" in Latin. It is only fitting that our second reading today, Paul's letter to the Thessalonians, begins, "Rejoice always! Pray without ceasing!" (1 Thess. 5:16). This week in Mass, we will see rose vestments and the third, rose, candle on the wreath will be lit. Why rose for the third candle? We use this color to indicate a joyful feast day or holiday. This Sunday is all about joy!

Being joyful and counting one's blessings is what it is all about. But sometimes, we have things in our lives that challenge us. We may have a family member or friend that we have disagreed with. Maybe there are financial woes in the family, or maybe it's the heartache of missing a loved one over the holidays. We all have them, and these challenges can really test us. But we can't give up; we need to look at the situation and revisit it or re-test it.

This past Easter Vigil, I celebrated the tenth anniversary of my Baptism. The last ten years have been an amazing, blessed, and humbling journey. From receiving the Sacraments to meeting my wife, being called to Diaconate formation, and being blessed with my boy, Noah, I wouldn't change a thing except one. I remember when I told some of my family and friends that I was going to become Catholic, it caused quite a stir. There were many uncomfortable conversations, and it caused some arguments. A few of my friends even started to distance themselves from me. This time of year always makes me reflect on some of those relationships that have diminished, and in prayer, I ask the Lord if they should be re-tested. I guess my point is that we all have that "something" that we need to sit back and ask the Lord, "Should this be re-tested?"

No matter how we resolve our challenges, it is important to remember that our joy in Christ can remain regardless of them because we know that God is in control of our circumstances. Therefore, we can "rejoice always" and "in all circumstances give thanks" because we have hope in God. On this Gaudete ("Rejoice!") Sunday, reflect on what you are thankful for. This week, try writing down the things in your life that cause you to rejoice. Then, thank God for those blessings.

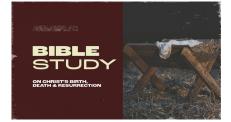

# Advent and The New Evangelization

We have all been challenged to pass on and proclaim the message of our Lord. In these troubled times, it is the job of all of us to bring about an attitude of peace, hope, love and joy, which Christ has for us. It's easy to complain, but peace and love begins with all of us. Evangelizing may be new for some, but it is the responsibility of **all** of us to pass on the Good News. Here are a few beginning steps you can take...

- Pray for people using their name
- Invite someone to come to church with you (you might wish to top it off with breakfast afterwards)

- Be bold and ask the Holy Spirit to guide you
- Meet and greet others where they are in life by listening to them
- Share your story
- Teach something to someone about our Catholic Faith
- Ask for guidance often it's okay to stumble and not know an answer. Let the other party know that you will research the question and get back to them with the answer
- The more you take part in Evangelizing, the easier it will become... you can't become a concert pianist overnight!

## Walking the Path

Last week. I mentioned that we don't actually know the date of Jesus' birth. As I'm sure you know, that isn't all that unusual in the ancient world, where recordkeeping existed but not to the same level we have today. I know that not knowing the actual date can feel a bit disheartening to us, given Jesus' importance in the history of the world, and ultimately, eternal life. Yet it is what it is. As such, this gap in knowledge of Jesus' background has caused a great deal of research, and several theories have come to the fore. Let's take a look at several of them.

First, as I said last week, many scholars have asserted that, in the earliest days of the Church, existing pagan holidays were changed to assert facts about Jesus, and the One, True God. In particular, the Roman Empire's practice of celebrating the rebirth of the Unconquered Sun (Sol Invictus) on December 25th. - A holiday that not only marked the return of longer days after the winter solstice, but also followed another popular Roman festival called the Saturnalia (during which people feasted and exchanged gifts). Another group of big concern to the early evangelists were the Mithraisms whose deity was said to be born on December 25th. The thought is, that disrupting pagan traditions was proving to be very difficult, so the evangelists chose

to transform the pagan holidays in ways that made their theology appropriate. By using the existing symbols, but transforming the prayers and messages so they would reflect true theology, the evangelists wouldn't have to fight the "we have always celebrated at this time of year" type of argument, and still be able to teach the truth of Jesus.

Other scholars baulk at that idea. They believe the real reason for the selection of December 25, is because it is exactly nine months after March 25. the traditional date of Jesus' crucifixion. What? Why would those two days be related? It was because a theological concept had developed, in the early days of the Church, that Jesus was conceived and crucified on the same date, so they set the date of his birth nine months later." Other scholars believe the actual date was in the early spring, placing it closer to Easter, the holiday commemorating his Resurrection. For example, the Roman Christian historian, Sextus Julius Africanus, dated Jesus' conception to March 25 (the same date upon which he held that the world was created), which, after nine months in his mother's womb, would result in a December 25 birth.

Whew! Whatever the reason, the Church arrived at a celebration date of December 25th, and that date hasn't been the same since! This "adopted" date gives us an opportunity to celebrate the fact that God chose to enter the world through a profound gift of love and relationship with us. Taking on humanity at its fullest, while not diminishing his divinity, the Son of God, the third person of the Trinity, was born to walk among us and eventually take our sins to the cross, suffering and dying for our sins. He is a gift like no other, regardless of the date given.



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## Managing Anxiety & Stress During the Holidays

Even though the holiday season brings joy and happiness to many, there are others where the holiday season causes grief, anxiety, depression, and stress. Some of the anxiety people might experience could be due to the loss of a loved one, loneliness, unhappiness, or just "the season." The holiday season is especially hard for people with chronic anxiety or depression. According to the National Institute of Mental Health, 40 million adults (18% of the population) struggle with anxiety. About half of the people with depression also experience anxiety. Thankfully, there are a number of treatment options including therapy and medications which can help relieve anxiety. Yet, only about a third of people seek treatment.

Stress caused by the holidays on the other hand can affect people who are already dealing with depression or anxiety, and people who are not, but are just overwhelmed with all of the activities of the holidays. Some people pride themselves on being "super - moms or dads" and want every holiday detail perfect. But the reality is, this is just not possible with all of the things going on in the world today.

When people experience stress, people's daily lives are often impacted with changes such as your health or the health of your loved ones, difficulty or changes in your sleeping and eating, difficulty concentrating, worsening of chronic medical conditions, or increased use of alcohol, tobacco, or other drugs. Although everyone has their own set of coping skills on how to manage difficult situations, here are some suggestions that might make the holiday season more enjoyable and less stressful for you and your loved ones:

- Take care of your body. Exercise, sleep, eat healthy, and limit alcohol and caffeine. Physical activity will help ease anxiety.
- Pay attention to your breathing. If you are breathing quickly, slow it down. Practice breathing exercises by taking long breaths through your nose, holding it for the count of three, and exhaling slowly.
- Take notice of your surroundings. Take breaks from watching, reading or listening to the news, including social media. Changes to your environment can help reduce anxiety.
- Take care of your soul. Pray.
- Listen to music. Listening to music can lower blood pressure and heart rate.
- Take care of your mind. Learn to meditate and practice mindfulness.
- Take care of your emotional self.
   Make time to unwind. Relax.
- Try and find some laughter in your life. Laughing increases oxygen levels and helps muscles relax.
- Connect with others and talk about your fears and concerns. Talking to someone can offer a new perspective on how you feel. If you feel you cannot talk with a friend or relative, consider reaching out to a priest, counsellor, or healthcare

provider.

- Find an activity or hobby that takes your mind off yourself.
- Consider starting a gratitude journal which will help reduce negative thoughts and help you remember the good things in your life.
- Practice self-care. Try and relax and do something that makes you feel good.
- If you or someone you care about are feeling overwhelmed, sad, depressed, and are having difficulty coping, or feel like harming themselves or others:
  - Call 911
  - Call the Macomb County Community Mental Health Crisis Line call 586-307-9100, 24 hours a day, 7 days a week.
