We all listen to voices every day, from conversations with family and friends to those on the radio, television, social media, and even internal voices that penetrate our minds. Sometimes, we may even perceive the promptings of the Holy Spirit in our hearts and minds. As disciples of Christ, we try to be in

tune with the teachings of Jesus and his voice according to scripture. Since we are not always successful, the opportune word is **try**. We sometimes follow the call of other voices that may come through as louder or more seductive. We give in to temptation, as our first parents did in the Garden of Eden. They

were tempted with doubt in the Lord, so they took matters into their own hands, leading to the fall.


We have all experienced voices that try to derail us on our path to Christ-voices of negativity, mistrust, and fear. These afflictions lead us away from the life our Lord wants

for us. Responding to these other voices instead of the Lord's leads us away from him and disrupts our peace. The great accuser does not want us to be close to the Lord; his primary purpose is to separate us from our creator.

Our scripture readings for this weekend focus on those who hear the voice of the Lord, from Samuel to Andrew and Simon Peter, the first disciples of Jesus. Even though they didn't fully understand it, they received a calling from the Lord, obeyed it, and responded in faith. That is the difference between

following God's voice and the evil one that tempts us into sin, offers the easy road, and brings instant gratification. God's voice requires time and patience; this is how we know what voice comes from our Lord. He is not forceful but compassionate. His voice offers support and hope, not negativity and division. Using these criteria to reflect on last year, we can identify the voices around us that influence our leaders and ourselves. We see the consequences of following the voice that accuses us rather than the voice that wants to save us.



Faithful Resolutions: Share Your Catholic Faith with Others

Perhaps you have noticed that more families and friends are no longer consistently attending church, seemingly distancing themselves from God and His church. At the same time, you see the longing for God and the truth. It is up to us to carry on our beautiful faith and pass it on to others. Pope Francis tells us that evangelizing is the Church's number one priority.

Modern Catholics are not usually great about sharing their faith with others, but this can change with the willingness to practice. At first, talking about our faith with others may be uncomfortable. Like anything, the more you practice, the better you get at it. You might initially talk about simple things,

like how Christ and His church bring you joy, happiness, comfort, and community. Then, you might want to invite a friend or relative to attend Mass with you. Another idea is passing on a rosary, prayer card, or medal to someone who needs a prayer, or better yet, offering to pray with them right where you are!



Walking the Path

With the start of a new year, many of us think about the speed at which "time flies." We often hear that events seem to move faster as we age because our memory banks are stuffed full of things rather than the much smaller bundles found in young brains. Simply because there is more to scroll through, time seems faster. Just weeks ago, many news programs and other sources provided their "year in review" or "remembering those we lost" type of programs, providing opportunities to riffle through our treasure troves of memory. As I was reflecting recently, I thought about how many of us experience disappointments or struggles that form less-than-positive memories. All of these occurrences bring me to the consideration that, as people of faith, we often have different understandings of why bad things happen to "good" people. We've talked about God "allowing" some of these negative things due to humanity's free will rather than directly willing them into being himself. That understanding doesn't, however, take away those bad memories or the fact that these events occurred in the first place! To counter that reality, many theologians and spiritual guides direct us to focus on gratitude and positivity instead of the negative. They draw us to a "glass half full" type of spirituality, where we recognize that God only wants

good things for us and has given us so many blessings that our main task is to focus on the good in our memories and each day. We make that shift ourselves by remembering that Jesus taught us to refer to God as Father, and he used the word Abba, meaning "Daddy," to convey the closeness and familial love that a loving, benevolent parent/child relationship provides. It is through Jesus that we learn God is Love. Sitting in the lap of my loving Abba, I can reshape my memories to see the good in them.

For example, I may not have had loving support from one or both of my biological parents, but I can choose to look for others in my life who provided it. When I lament that my living room walls need painting, I can turn that thought into gratitude for having a roof over my head. One key component is to be gentle with ourselves. We know it is okay to be disappointed or saddened by life. but Isaiah (Is 46:4) reminds us of God's words: 'Even to your old age and gray hairs I am he, I am he who will sustain you. I have made you and I will carry you; I will sustain you and I will rescue you." In looking at the flip side of a situation, we can often recognize God's presence and blessing, and even if we can't quite do so, we can still bring that memory into our prayers. There, we can pray to have the ability to simply acknowledge that God was/is there, or in the case of pure evil, that he was present in the aftermath. Once there, beyond the acknowledgment of presence, we can pray to find specific examples of God's presence and grace. Building this skill of spotting God's presence may take a while to develop, but rest assured, the more we do it, the easier it is! Once recognized, knowledge of that presence can be very reassuring.

On another topic, I'll be offering Dr. Brant Pitre's "Lectio: The Case for Jesus: The Biblical and Historical Evidence for Christ" on Tuesday mornings at 9:30 AM, starting Jan. 16. Don't let the thought of homework deter you! Contact me, the Formation department, or the parish office to register. The fee is \$10 to cover the book and other materials—a real bargain.

Transportation Resources for Seniors

The St. Therese of Lisieux Health Ministry receives many calls asking for transportation assistance. Although we cannot help with most of these requests, we can give them resources to call.

- Family and friends. Although we don't like asking family or friends for help, talking with them about transportation is a must if you will no longer be driving. Discussing work schedules will make it easier for everyone when making appointments. If you are reading this and your parent cannot drive, please offer to help them with driving arrangements if you do not already do so.
- Public transportation, such as community buses, might be a low-cost option for independent older people who are in good health:
- Smart Buses: 866-962-5515 / smartbus.org
 - SMART Fixed Route
 bus services provide
 public transportation to
 destinations in Macomb,
 Oakland, and Wayne
 counties. Smart Fixed
 Route buses pick up and
 drop off at designated bus
 stops on the major corridor,
 community, and crosstown
 - SMART Flexible Routes:
 Groesbeck connects
 residents to destinations
 throughout the Groesbeck
 corridor.
 - SMART Connector Service is a reservation, curb-tocurb service operated on

- weekdays between 6 AM and 6 PM. You can travel anywhere within a 10-mile radius of pick-up. A six-day notice is recommended for medical appointments, and a two-day notice for other destinations.
- Community Transit: Local communities partner with SMART to develop and operate Community Transit services to meet the needs of their residents.
- SMART ADA Paratransit
 Service is a reservation,
 curb-to-curb service for
 people with ADA-certified
 disabilities who cannot use
 SMART's Fixed bus service.
- Taxis and private ride-sharing companies such as Uber and Lyft offer rides to individuals for a fare, either a set rate or a fee per mile/minute. While these services are convenient, they can be expensive.
- Volunteer Transportation
 Services and Community
 Volunteer Organizations:
 - Shelby Township Senior
 Citizen Transportation:
 586-739 7540. This service
 operates Monday through
 Friday from 9 AM to 4:30
 PM, serving Shelby Township
 and Utica residents who

 equipped with wheelchair
 lifts. One ticket (\$0.50) is
 required each way and can
 be purchased at the Shelby
 Senior Center, with bulk
 orders available for entire

- treatment schedules.
- MyRide2: 855-697-4332
 / myride2.com. This
 program helps seniors and
 people with disabilities
 in Oakland, Macomb, and
 Wayne find and learn about
 transportation options.
 MyRide2 has a partnership
 with Lyft, and can make
 same-day arrangements for
 you, meaning you do not
 need to use the smartphone
 application.
- Interfaith Volunteer
 Caregivers: 586-757-5551
 / ivcinfo.org: Volunteers
 provide door-to-door
 service, with minimal
 assistance, using their own
 cars.
- Medical Transportation for Older People:
 - Medicaid non-emergency medical transportation may be available for some Medicaid recipients.
 - Some Medicare Advantage plans offer transportation services for health care appointments, but this varies by plan.

Although securing transportation for people who do not drive may take time and effort, it is in the best interest of all involved to look into some of these options before the need arises.




