Last week, we were asked how we respond to Jesus' invitation to "follow me." This week, the psalm reminds us, "If today you hear his voice, harden not your hearts." Yet sometimes, we do harden our hearts, not intentionally, of course, but our hearts have become calloused due to our experiences.

Therefore, when God calls, we are sometimes immune to hearing.

In today's society, we hear many voices that may drown out God's. We hear sports scores and chatter. We listen to the latest celebrity gossip. We may become news junkies. Sometimes, we allow

ourselves to go down the "rabbit holes" of social media. But when it comes to hearing God, we somehow fail to listen because other things have hardened our hearts.

I would use the analogy of plaque build-up in our arteries, which can lead to heart attacks and strokes.

What needs to be driven out of my life?

In this Sunday's Gospel passage, Jesus encounters a man in the synagogue with an unclean spirit that causes him severe suffering. Jesus drives out the unclean spirit, restoring the man to health.

Each of us, in a sense, is possessed by "unclean spirits" or "demons" that cause us suffering. We may be contending with major "demons," such as anger issues or addictions of various kinds, or there may be others, such as sinful behaviors or attitudes like racial prejudice, selfishness, greed, etc. Though we try as hard as we can, it is difficult to rid ourselves of these "demons." We need to turn to the Lord for healing.

In many cases, God heals us through other people. Some demons require professional care or a twelve-step program. Others may require encountering Christ's healing presence in the Sacrament of Reconciliation or Anointing of the Sick. Others may be driven out by allowing a friend or loved one to accompany us in our struggle, experiencing God's presence by opening our hearts to them. A demon that "shackled" me was unresolved grief following the death of my brother, Gary, at age 25. Several years after his death, it negatively affected my behavior. Through the help of professional therapists, the Lord brought me healing. It took a while for me to recognize the issue and then have

the courage to seek help.






40'S & 50'S SMALL GROUP

Thanks for answering the call to assist those in need. The St. Therese of Lisieux Parish family is the most loving, caring, and giving people of God!


Faithful Resolutions: Make a Change

Walking the Path

Okay. I have a confession to make. I have been a lifelong Catholic, raised in a family that was very engaged in their faith community (Thanks, Dad!). Still, even after decades of ministry, I hadn't connected some of the dots between the readings of the Mass and my faith - until, maybe, seven years ago. Yes, Mass participation was something that I valued, and I was happy to serve as a reader, extraordinary minister of the Eucharist, member of the choir, or any other ministry, but I was viewing the readings as standalone snippets and not viewing them as a whole. I saw them as stories about Jesus, but they were, somehow, hermetically sealed, and set apart from real life. Yes, I knew that the gospels featured true stories, that really happened, but there was a "sanitized," feeling about them. As a matter of fact, I recently learned that I'm not alone! The other day, I read an ad from Ascension Press that said, "Sometimes Jesus can feel like more of a concept, than a person for many of us. And, although we can know a lot about him, it's impossible to have a relationship with a concept." I couldn't have said it better! I bring this up, because, as we move from faith in an institution to a personal relationship with Jesus, I think we all recognize that we have to have the ability to, actually, see Jesus as a person. Yes, as the Second Person of the Trinity, but fully human as well. Today, I want to expand on what I shared, last week, about actually

reading the gospels in their entirety. Here, I'll take a moment to share a couple of additional ways to connect with Jesus in order to build that relationship.

First of all, for many of us, the humanity of Jesus can make him seem, almost, like a shadow of a man. Back in the day, for me, Jesus almost glides through the scenes of scripture. Rarely am I thinking about his grumbling stomach, or him having to dodge random goat poop. I know that I can probably blame the religious movies and videos of my youth for that. After all, it hasn't been until recently that Christians have had the opportunity to see far more realistic representations of Jesus' life through movies like Mel Gibson's, "The Passion of the Christ," or TV's "The Chosen." Now, of course, the writers, producers, and directors, etc., use artistic license in their production, so they may not be one hundred percent accurate, but these first steps are, at least, helping to bridge the gap. Taking the opportunity to watch these types of productions can help us in fleshing out our vision of Jesus.

The other way to grow in our understanding of who Jesus was (and is), is to study what we know from an in-depth look at the scriptures. As I said, read the Gospels, but don't stop there. The Book of Acts is a treasure-trove of information about the early

Church, as are the letters of the New Testament. Start by reading them, but you can also participate in formal studies, or read books by Catholic authors that take the time to connect us to Jesus, like Peter Kreeft's, The Man Who Left His Mark: How Mark's Gospel Answers Modern Questions, or Richard Rohr's, The Universal Christ: How a Forgotten Reality Can Change Everything We See, Hope For, and Believe. Honestly, there are too many books to name, by more authors than I can even begin to remember!

Rather than being daunted by the heap of texts that I could choose to read, including the scriptures, I choose to see each page as an opportunity to learn more about Jesus and how he related to his best buds, his mother, and more... to me. The opportunities for growth in understanding are endless, which means that the well won't run dry. What a blessing – one that can quench my spiritual thirst until my last breath.

Diabetes & Prediabetes

Diabetes is a group of diseases that involve problems with the hormone insulin. Diabetes occurs when the pancreas produces little or no insulin or the body does not respond appropriately to insulin.

Diabetes conditions include:

- Prediabetes occurs when blood sugar is higher than it should be but not high enough for your doctor to diagnose diabetes.
 More than a third of people in the United States have it, but most don't know it.
- Type 1 diabetes is also called insulin-dependent diabetes and often begins in childhood. Type 1 diabetes is an autoimmune condition that occurs when the body attacks the pancreas with antibodies. The organ is damaged and doesn't make insulin. Genes might cause this type of diabetes.
- Type 2 diabetes used to be called non-insulin-dependent or adult-onset diabetes (usually after the age of 40). About 90% of people with diabetes have type 2. With type 2 diabetes, the pancreas creates some insulin, but either it's insufficient or your body doesn't use it as it should.
- Gestational Diabetes occurs in middle or late pregnancy because of some form of insulin resistance. Since blood sugar travels through the placenta to

the baby, it is essential to control it during pregnancy to protect the baby.

Common signs and symptoms of diabetes include increased thirst, frequent urination, extreme hunger, unexplained weight loss, fatigue, irritability, blurred vision, slowhealing sores, frequent infections, and ketones in the urine. If you have any of these symptoms, please immediately consult your physician or healthcare provider.

Diagnosis of diabetes is different depending on what type of diabetes you have. Symptoms for type 1 diabetes may come on suddenly, but the other types of diabetes may come on gradually. The American Diabetes Association (ADA) recommends anyone with a body mass index higher than 25 (regardless of age), anyone older than 45, women who have had gestational diabetes, or anyone diagnosed with prediabetes get screened for diabetes.

Diagnostic tests for type 1 and type 2 diabetes and prediabetes include Glycated hemoglobin (A1C) tests, fasting and random blood tests, and oral glucose tests.

Diabetes treatment depends on what type you have. Blood sugar monitoring, insulin or oral medications (again, depending on your type), maintaining a healthy weight, and participating in regular activity are essential factors in managing diabetes. If you have diabetes, commit yourself to managing your disease so you can reduce the risk of serious complications.




