In what ways am I living out the Gospel?

A general description of Gospel living for me is something like "being a light for others and helping them find the light of Christ within themselves." I do this most obviously and intentionally in writing music for our church and sharing musical prayer, inspirations, and experiences rooted in the messages of Christ's life, love, and commissioning from the holy scriptures. Coincidentally, I write this reflection on the Feast of the Conversion of St. Paul. Today's scriptures challenge us not just to proclaim the Gospel but, rather, to live it-to spread it through actions rooted in love.

Helping with community outreach opportunities, such as Forgotten Harvest, contributing regularly to charities, and assisting at Right to Life events are concrete means by which we can dedicate our time to share Christ's love in our community. On a smaller but no less important scale, Gospel living is also momentto-moment in our interactions with family, friends, neighbors, and colleagues. Sometimes, relationship moments are the challenges that can threaten our Gospel living. To stay focused, I try to live with the following in mind:

- Faith over fear.
- Active and attentive listening. (Listen more, talk less.)
- Forgiveness over hurt.
- Joy over jealousy.

Yes, I sometimes get caught up in my selfishness and fail to "check all boxes" on the list. But being part of a faith community, attending Mass, and receiving the sacraments of Holy Eucharist and Reconciliation gives me strength for Gospel living that I would not otherwise have on my own.

On a more personal note, I am genuinely inspired by the love witnessed and shared in communion at St. Isidore. During Mass, I am often reminded of how God's great love is shared in even the simple and mundane of our daily lives, in both



ordinary and extraordinary moments, and in our being Christ to one another. We all share the Good News by living faithfully in the light of the Lord. Go, team!

Recently, I heard someone say, "church is not the place you go; it's the place you go from."

We go forth to discover a renewed way of living and being in the Holy Spirit.

ART OF WINE DINNER



Lent will soon be upon us; let's make it our goal to go out of our comfort zone, meet the people and pass on our beautiful faith to them.



Walking the Path

When people approach me, they'll often offer their suggestions as to what children should learn in regards to religious formation, what they don't seem to be learning, what they, themselves, never learned, and on, and on. I usually say something about the importance of participation in the life of a faith community, Mass attendance, and that we often forget what we don't use. Having said this, truth be told, I'd love to share the fact that almost all of their list would be superfluous, as far as I am concerned. You can't tell me that someone is less of a Christian if they can't recite the Nicene Creed or the Our Father off the top of their heads. Nor am I convinced that someone who can complete those tasks is automatically a "good" follower of Christ. What I am convinced of, however, is that getting to know Jesus is an integral step in developing a relationship with him. As a matter of fact, I think that's what Church leadership had in mind when they determined the requirements for the celebration of First Eucharist. As you'll see, they don't require a long list of memorized prayers.

First off, Canon Law states that there are three things a child needs to know in order to celebrate First Eucharist (I am paraphrasing): 1. They need to know who Jesus is, about his life, his teachings and his sacrifice for us; 2. They should know that the bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Jesus – they are special and have changed because of the words of Jesus that have been prayed over them, even though they taste the same as regular bread and wine; 3. They need to know the correct rubrics for receiving – the process of how to place their hands, what to say, etcetera. That's it. Three things.

Now, let me put them in order by their ease to accomplish. Obviously, the "how to" receive is a fairly quick thing to convey. It is the easiest task for catechists to accomplish. The most "difficult" task gets relegated to second easiest, simply because it is the task of conveying the reality of the Real Presence in the Eucharist - a mystery so deep and so profound that understanding it has to be broken into parts to be pondered for a lifetime. For a young child, however, knowledge that the sacred species are special, and that Jesus says that they are his body and blood, is all that can be expected. Lastly, the task that can be the most involved, time consuming, and yet the most rewarding is, arguably, the most important as well: teaching about Jesus. After all, our faith rests upon Jesus and his life, death and resurrection.

Further, the understanding that the absolute biggest focus, for any Christian formation gathering, should be Jesus, is nothing new. It follows common sense that time learning about Jesus and his life has to reign supreme in our catechetical settings. Yes, learning about the sacraments, or other "Church things" is important, but they can't be our priority. The Church teaches that everything we do in the life of the Church is to be Christocentric (centered on Christ), especially our teaching, because we can't follow Jesus if we don't know him. We need that knowledge to see that Jesus gained followers because of who he was, what he said and did, and because of the conviction of his followers.

So, what is the answer to the question of. "How much does a child need to know about Jesus?" I can't really tell you. A lot depends on whether this thirty-hour year of instruction is going to be a "one and done" for the family. Are they a family who talks about him? Do they read the bible at home? All I can hope, is if we do our jobs well, that our youngest members, and their elders, will know, love and serve Jesus by following his example of loving and serving others, AND that that knowledge of him and his sacrifice will draw them to worship.

COVID-19 Vaccine Myths and Facts

After dodging COVID for 3.5 years, I ended up contracting it after Thanksgiving! And, I have to say, it caught me off guard since I couldn't recall being around anyone that was visibly sick, and had recently received the latest COVID vaccine. After testing positive for COVID, I was placed on an antiviral and steroid medications and was sick for about a week, but luckily recovered without much issue.

Some people think we are "over" COVID, but we are not, and probably this is something we will have to deal with indefinitely. I know there are people who refuse to take the COVID vaccines, or those who took the initial vaccines and don't want to take anymore, but the current recommendation is that we DO take the vaccines. It's hard to determine if I would have been sicker if I didn't take the vaccines, but in retrospect, I am glad I did, even if I got sick.

So in light of my recent illness, I thought I would review some of the *myths and facts* regarding the COVID-19:

MYTH: The COVID-19 vaccine doesn't work. That is why they keep changing it.

FACT: Data shows that COVID-19 vaccines protect people against severe illness and death due to COVID-19. Like the flu vaccine, scientists work to predict what variant of the COVID-19 virus will be circulating this season and tailor the vaccine to those variants, making the vaccine more relevant to the current season.

MYTH: You don't need the updated COVID-19 vaccine if you've already had two shots.

FACT: Scientists learned that the COVID-19 virus can change over time and the level of protection from older vaccine versions may not be as protective. The best way to protect yourself against severe illness, hospitalization, and death is to remain up to date with the current recommended COVID-19 vaccine.

MYTH: You don't need the COVID-19 vaccine because the pandemic is over.

FACT: The pandemic period may be over, but COVID-19 is here to stay. People are still getting COVID-19 and people over 65 are at a higher risk of getting seriously ill, being hospitalized, and dying of it.

MYTH: You can't get a COVID-19 vaccine with your annual flu shot FACT: You can safely get several vaccines at the same time. Check with your provider which ones you need. They may include influenza, RSV, pneumococcal (pneumonia) and COVID-19.

MYTH: If you've already had COVID-19, you have natural immunity and don't need the updated COVID-19 vaccine. FACT: People who already had COVID-19 and do not stay up to date with updated COVID-19 vaccines after they recover are more likely to get COVID-19 again, than those who remain up to date.

MYTH: I don't want to get the vaccine because it doesn't work and vaccinated people have still gotten it. FACT: COVID-19 vaccination lowers your risk of severe illness and death if you get infected. Compared to people who are up to date with their COVID-19 vaccinations, unvaccinated people are more likely to get COVID-19, be hospitalized, and die.

MYTH: COVID-19 no longer makes people very sick. It is like a cold, so I don't need the latest vaccine. FACT: An increase in the number of people vaccinated against COVID-19 has contributed to lowered hospitalizations rates and deaths, however, significant numbers of people are still dying. Nine out of 10 deaths with COVID-19 happen in people older than 65 years of age. The vaccine significantly reduces the risk of severe illness and death
