MUSINGS + MESSAGES

Today's Gospel is one of my favorite passages in the scriptures because it shows Jesus going "Dirty Harry" on the money changers. This is an example of righteous anger. We like to imagine our Lord being perpetually kind and compassionate, but Jesus had his frustrations and moments of

exasperation, too. This is the one time when Jesus allowed his anger to manifest in a very physical manner.

Often, people confess anger as a sin. However, anger is an emotion; no morality is attached to it. Instead, it is what we *do*

with the anger that is either sinful, justified, or righteous. Our feelings and emotions are responses to situations. How we act on those responses determines whether we are sinful or not.

The commandments articulated in the first reading remind us of

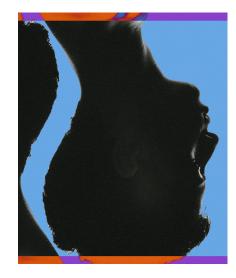
What parts of my human nature need to be flipped?

How many times have we found ourselves bargaining with God?
Bargaining is a natural emotional response and instinct in our culture.
As consumers, we exchange money or influence to get what we want.
This routine makes it easy for us to try and react the same way in prayer with God.

We have all experienced times when we desired stability in finances, health, family, work status, independence, and order in our lives. Our mode of operating with each other to try and secure these things can sometimes lead us astray from God's will for us.

The first reading reminds us of the Ten Commandments our Lord has given to guide us in the right relationship with him. Reminding ourselves of this fact helps us to recall that our relationship with God is covenantal. Often, we bend Jesus' teachings to make him the "Buddy Jesus" of our own choosing rather than the Jesus that God sent! Our bargaining ways do not fit the box we try to put him in, for God doesn't work as we do.

So, we are reminded that, as the Lord flipped tables over in the temple for a return to proper praise and worship with God, we need to flip our human actions to reconnect ourselves to God. Our bodies are temples of the Lord. When we receive him at Mass, we become little tabernacles. As we let him enter under our roofs, do we synergistically work with him to flip our lives? This Lenten season is a great time to reflect on this task to help us grow with Christ and prepare for his return. We can prepare ourselves for God's grace by worshipping at Mass and living the Church's sacramental life by attending the Stations of the Cross, praying, and working with our



community to clear out our temple so his grace may empower us. As Paul wrote in our second reading, we proclaim Christ crucified. This is not a sign of weakness in Jesus or ourselves. We are baptized with the power and strength of our Lord, who conquered death at the cross. It is up to us to flip for Christ!

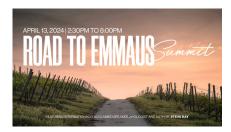

a baseline for our morality. But each commandment can be further expanded and elucidated upon to reflect life in 2024. For example, "You shall not steal" encompasses more than just physically taking someone's property. It also refers to taking people's time and energy, taking someone's passwords or identity, and possibly even ruining someone's reputation (in conjunction with the commandments about not bearing false witness or killing). It also includes cheating on exams or plagiarizing papers.

While we can justify many of our actions and try to explain away our behaviors or responses to situations, ultimately, we are responsible for

what we do and say, and no one else is. I cannot blame another for my actions because I chose to do something.

This week, reflect on the commandments and look at them broadly. Ask yourself, "Have I been faithful to God's will, or have I tried to place the blame on another?"

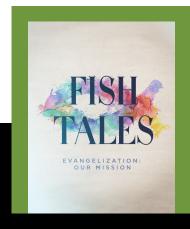

- Giving thanks: The word "grace" comes from the Latin phrasegratiarum actio, which means "act of thanks." Saying grace is a way to give thanks to God.
- **2. Asking for a blessing**: The grace prayer before meals asks God for a blessing.
- **3. Expressing gratitude**: The grace prayer after a meal is a prayer of thanksgiving for the good things God has given and an intercession for those who have helped.
- **4. Remembering that food comes from God**: Saying grace before meals is a way to remember that it was God who provided the meal.

- **5. Protecting food**: The prayer blesses the food with a seal of protection.
- **6. An act of faith**: Reciting the prayers before and after meals is an act of faith pleasing to God.

Challenge yourself to say grace before and after meals throughout Lent.



Walking the Path

Lent, with its focus on prayer, fasting, and almsgiving, can be very meaningful for us as Catholics. It is a time to step back and assess where we are struggling in how we live out our Christian discipleship. Hopefully, after taking time to determine where we are, we will be able to do something that leads to a conversion of heart, a reconciliation of relationship, or whatever we need to do to deepen our relationship with God and others. Those things constitute the big stuff. It's funny, though. For many of us, receiving ashes or palms ranks higher on our Lenten to-do list than apologizing to Uncle Bill for embarrassing him in front of family (for example). Being a passive receptor is much easier than actually **doing** something, especially the difficult things. Loving God and loving thy neighbor are simple, but they aren't easy!

Today, I want to provide you with a slightly different list of the "big" stuff regarding living as a Catholic. It is also a good time of year to see where we stand in their regard. These "big" things are called the Precepts of the Church.

The Precepts are as follows:

 Attendance at Mass on Sundays and Holy Days of Obligation: This one is pretty straightforward. Taking time to praise and thank God for our blessings through worship is

- the starting place for honoring the First Commandment and prioritizing God in our lives.
- Confession of serious sin at least once a year: We can think our sins aren't "serious," but biting words or not making attendance at a child's school event a priority can break someone's spirit, let alone missing Mass for a wishywashy reason. Making an effort to attend the Sacrament of Reconciliation can make a big difference in our spiritual lives and help us restore our relationships.
- **Reception of Holy Communion** at least once a year during the Easter season: Here is another one that doesn't really need an explanation other than that you should be in communion with the Church to receive communion. Did you see the same word twice in that sentence? That means if you haven't been absolved from your sins in Reconciliation, especially the serious ones, you would do well to participate in the sacrament to remove what's blocking you from being in a state of communion with God and the Church.
- Observance of the days of fasting and abstinence: Ash Wednesday and Good Friday require both fasting practices, which means eating one meal and then two smaller meals that

- wouldn't add up to a total of another full meal **and** abstaining from eating meat. Another way to express the idea of fasting is that the amount of food we eat on days of fasting should add up to less than two full meals for the entire day. The other Fridays of Lent only require abstinence from meat.
- Providing for the needs of the Church: Here is another easy one. I know, however, that some folks grumble that it is pretty nervy that the Church "mandates" that people donate to the Church. Here's my take. Yes, that might feel like the gist of it, but "the Church" is made up of the People of God. Christ is our Head, and we all make up the Body of Christ. When we are in union with that Body, it makes sense that we would want to make sure that those who are grieving have the doors of the church open to provide the opportunity to have a funeral service for their loved one. We would want our parish's food pantry to be open to those in need. I could go on. We are the Church, and by our gifts of time, talent, and treasure, we keep the Body functioning, let alone flourishing.

THIRD SUNDAY OF LENT

Hand Arthritis

If you are over the age of 50, Caucasian, female, overweight, had hand injuries, or have relatives with arthritis, there is a good chance you may develop some hand arthritis.

Arthritis is a disease that attacks the tissues of the joints where the two bones meet, as well as the lining of the joint, or cartilage, which covers the ends of the bones. As cartilage breaks down, the ends of the bones become exposed, rub against each other, and wear away. Hand arthritis is common because there are so many joints in the hands.

Osteoarthritis is a degenerative arthritis and the most common type. When this happens, the cartilage breaks down, and the ends of the bones rub together and cause pain, stiffness, and loss of movement. Osteoarthritis commonly affects the wrists, the joint at the base of the thumb, and the middle and top joints of the finger.

Rheumatoid arthritis is a long-term inflammatory disease that causes joint swelling, pain, stiffness, and loss of function. It is an autoimmune disease that destroys the cartilage at the end of the bones and the bone itself. The joints lose their shape as the tendons and ligaments around the bone weaken and stretch. Rheumatoid arthritis affects the small joints of the wrist, hands, and fingers and usually affects the same joints on both sides of the body.

Psoriatic arthritis affects the skin and joints. Fingers become swollen with joint pain and morning stiffness. It is similar to rheumatoid arthritis

but may only involve several fingers.

Symptoms of hand arthritis include dull or burning joint pain after increased use, morning pain, stiffness of hands, or swollen joints. Chronic hand arthritis symptoms may consist of using hands differently, clicking when bending fingers, fingers that don't fully open or close, bony nodules on the middle joint of fingers, or enlarged and abnormally bent finger joints, which may impact performing everyday tasks.

Diagnosis of arthritis can be determined by examination and x-rays showing loss of bone cartilage and formation of bone spurs. A blood test for rheumatoid factor and other markers can help diagnose rheumatoid arthritis.

Treatment will depend on the type of arthritis, stage of the disease, how many joints are affected, age, activity level, and whether the dominant hand is affected. Treatment options include splinting/bracing, medications, injections, therapy, and surgery. Splints/braces support and protect the joint, keep it aligned, and lessen the strain. Consult with your physician or occupational therapist to guide you with the purchase of a brace/splint.

Your healthcare provider may order medications to reduce joint pain and swelling and, in the case of rheumatoid or psoriatic arthritis, help to prevent joint damage. For osteoarthritis, acetaminophen or nonsteroidal anti-inflammatory drugs can relieve symptoms. Speak with your doctor to discuss what

medications are best.

Steroid injections are also used to help reduce inflammation and relieve pain. Injections are administered into the affected joint and can only be repeated a few times since they can weaken tendons and ligaments.

Other treatment options include strengthening and stretching exercises, hot and cold packs, rest, healthy eating, management of diabetes and cholesterol, losing weight (if overweight), quitting smoking, and occupational therapy to instruct on self-help devices to assist with dressing and food preparation.

Surgery may be an option when nonsurgical treatments no longer provide relief, and the cartilage has worn away. Your doctor will determine the type of surgery based on your condition.

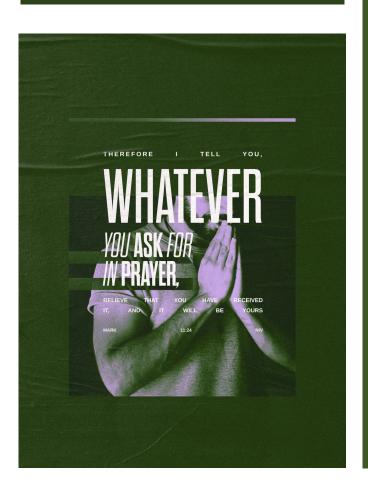

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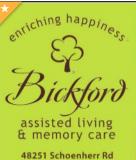
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
