

# MUSINGS + MESSAGES

Today is Laetare Sunday-the halfway point in our Lenten journey. The Gospel passage from John contains the familiar John 3:16 verse, which many athletes have tattooed or inscribed in their eye black: "For God so loved the world that he gave his only Son, so that everyone who believes in him might not perish but might have eternal life." However, sometimes people feel that belief is

all that is necessary for eternal life. As we read further in this passage, belief must lead to good works. During the Protestant Reformation in the sixteenth century, a famous saying arose: sola fidei, meaning "faith alone." This was to counter an erroneous belief that one could be saved by doing good works. However, the Catholic position is, and always has been, that our faith

(or belief) must issue forth from good works, and our good works demonstrate our belief. It is not enough to believe in Jesus; we must also live our lives in imitation of him. As we continue our journey through Lent, examine how our fasting, almsgiving, and prayer have been going. Have we put our beliefs into practice? And have our actions reflected our belief in Jesus Christ?

### Where are my choices taking me on my Lenten journey?

Like it or not, we constantly make choices that take us somewhere. It is estimated that the average adult makes upwards of 35,000 remotely conscious decisions every day. These choices all have consequences. They lead us to our destinations, whether we know it or not. In the first reading, we hear about how the choices of God's people slowly turned them away from God. Although He tried to turn them back by sending messengers and prophets, they chose not to listen to them. Instead, they "added infidelity to infidelity," which eventually led to their enemies burning down the temple and dragging them away into captivity in Babylon. Our choices can lead us, little by little, away from God and into the "captivity" of many earthly powers, such as greed, envy, drugs, alcohol, gambling, overeating, shopping, sexual pleasure, etc. All leave us empty and despairing.

Thankfully, God is always steadfast in His choice to never abandon us.

Just as King Cyrus called ancient Israel out of captivity and back to Jerusalem, God calls us back to His light of truth and mercy to begin building the temple of His love anew. However, as Jesus points out in the Gospel, we must choose light over darkness. That's the opportunity of our Lenten journey. To determine the grace of God's love, first, we need to choose to become aware of where our choices have brought us. Can all my works "be clearly seen as done in God," or would I prefer that some of my "works might not be exposed?"

We all have a mix of good, bad, darkness, and light in our choices. No matter how far astray our choices have led us, God's mercy calls us back. As our Lenten reflections make us aware of the darkness and despair that some of our choices have led us into, God begs us to make the critical choice to put our faith in His saving grace. The second reading tells us that "by grace, you have been saved through faith, and this is not from



you; it is the gift of God." Knowing that we cannot save ourselves from darkness and sin, Jesus came and died to take them away. Because of this saving gift of love, we don't have to remain in the emptiness and despair of sin. We can continue in darkness and despair or choose to accept His gift, turn away from our sinful choices, and begin again by living in the grace of Jesus Christ, which will bring us to true Easter joy. But make no mistake, we have to choose.



During adoration, most people will spend time in silent prayer, meditation and contemplation. Listening for His voice seeking insights, inspirations and comfort.


How to get started:

# Walking the Path

Last week. I wrote about the "precepts of the Church." They are a list of five things that all Catholics are to do to remain in communion (in good standing) with the Church. Even as I type these words, I get a cringing feeling. Did you notice that I didn't say "mandate" or "have to do?" It isn't that the precepts aren't mandates. They are. It is that my many years of ministry have taught me that "mandates" just don't "sell well" in today's society. Most often, we are a culture of people who think our adulthood means that we are free to do as we please. That whether it is the Church, or anyone else, doing the talking, we are entirely free to choose to comply, or not, with no negative repercussions, as long as we aren't breaking the law. (I believe that I have written about free-will and moral decision making before. Contact me if you want to hear more.) Today, I just wanted to take a moment to say that these precepts are rooted in what the Church, and most of us, consider to be "universal truths" or "natural law." Getting past the cringe, and recognizing that there are things that we can say that apply to all of us, because of who we are as humans, is our first step. For example, whether church goers, or not, it is fairly safe to say that most of us would agree that life and living things are foundationally good; that humans are built with a desire to be loved; and that there is a higher power that somehow provides a world where there is structure, organization, and support for life. If we can accept those principles, we can connect

the dots between them and the, aforementioned, precepts.

For example, the first precept that requires Mass attendance on Sundays and Holy Days can be seen as beneficial to us as humans because fulfilling this precept allows us to step aside from our usual grind to take time to exhibit gratitude to our Higher Power. So much has been written about the benefits of a grateful heart, but recognizing the enormity of our blessing allows us to grow in our awareness that our world and our life are not accidents, and gratitude can and should be directed to their Creator.

The requirement to confess serious sin at least once per year, is rooted in the fact that we are sensory creatures. We can have knowledge that God forgives sin, but the actual experience of voicing the words, having a prayer of absolution prayed over us, praying a prayer of sorrow ourselves, and completing an act of penance allows us the opportunity to feel that forgiveness in a deeper way. The Church, in her wisdom, wants us to experience that forgiveness, most especially, so we can grow and learn from it in order to avoid it in the future. That desire is FOR US, not for the fulfillment of an arbitrary rule! This experience allows us to live our best life, freeing the burden of guilt that is often part of the human condition.

Reception of the Eucharist and providing for the needs of the Church can be grouped under the

understanding that we are social creatures, and that Jesus saw value in the preservation and growth of the community that he founded—the Church. This community, with its message of Divine Mercy, love for each other, and communal support for one another is Jesus' gift to us. Doing what we can to maintain that gift, and share it with others is life giving for all involved. In a way, the observation of days of fasting and abstinence are connected as well. While they may feel dissimilar, these practices allow us to learn self-control and provide recognition and solidarity with those who suffer unfulfilled needs. (Good for those living in any society.)

So much more can be said, but I've already run long! Suffice it to say, when the Church has a "rule," it isn't there just so some curmudgeon-like bishops can be mean. These "rules," ultimately, allow all in our community to recognize our place and role in this world, in solidarity with our neighbor. They are in place because they allow us to flourish in this life, and in the next! All are rooted in love: God's love for us, and our love for each other, which is Jesus' ultimate message.

# Driver Safety for Seniors

There are more than 41 million licensed drivers age 65 and older on the roads, up from 26 million 20 years ago. As a person ages, changes in vision, hearing, and reflexes may affect driving skills. The risk of being injured or killed in a motor vehicle crash also increases with age.

As we age, physical and mental changes affect the way we drive: **Arthritis**: Joints get stiff, and muscles weaken, which makes it harder to turn your head to look back, turn the steering wheel quickly, or brake safely.

Eye sight: People, things, and movement outside direct line of sight might be harder to see, like street or traffic signs. Night driving might be challenging with the glare from oncoming headlights or street lights. Eye diseases, such as glaucoma, cataracts, macular degeneration, and some medicines may cause vision problems.

**Hearing**: Horns, sirens, or even noises coming from your own car may be more difficult to hear and cause a problem since these sounds warn you when you may need to pull over or get out of the way.

**Reflexes**: The aging process may cause shorter attention spans and reflexes may be slower. Loss of feeling or tingling in fingers and feet, or medical conditions like Parkinson's or a stroke can make it more difficult to steer, or use the foot pedals.

**Medications**: Side effects that cause drowsiness or lightheadedness, may impair the ability to drive safely. Read the information provided with prescriptions to make sure they do not affect your driving.

Some general safe driving tips for seniors:

- Avoid driving at night, on the highway, or in bad weather, if these things concern you. Bad weather like rain, ice, or snow can make it hard for anyone to drive. Wait until the weather is better, call your family/friend, or use an alternative mode of transportation.
- Older drivers may also have problems when yielding the right of way, turning (especially making left turns), changing lanes, passing, and using expressway ramps.
- If you have health problems or medications that might make it unsafe for you to drive, talk with your doctor to make a plan to help you keep driving and decide when it is no longer safe to drive.
  - Take a defensive driving course and refresh your driving skills, such as the course offered by AARP at St. Therese. This course teaches proven driving techniques to keep you safe on the road and you may even qualify for an insurance discount! You will learn facts about the effects of medication on driving, how to reduce driver distractions and maintain the proper distance behind another car, the proper use of safety belts, air bags, anti-lock brakes, techniques for handling left turns, right-ofway, and roundabouts, and new technology found in cars today.

St. Therese of Lisieux will be hosting an AARP Driver Safety Course on March 27, and March 28, 2024 from 9:00 AM-1:00 PM. The cost is \$20 for AARP members and \$25 for non-members.

If you decide it's time to give up driving your car, talk with family/ friends to make transportation arrangements. Check with your local community center for transportation services, Shelby Township Senior Citizens Transportation Bus (586-739-7540), Interfaith Volunteers (586-876-5321), The Area Agency on Aging 1-B (1-800-852-7795), or go to www.aaa1b.org for resources in Macomb County for transportation. There are other options such as Uber and Lyft rides, taxi services, and free or low-cost buses, if you are able to walk safely.


