"Sir, we would like to see Jesus."
At my father's funeral, a young
Muslim girl wandered into the
church and asked a friend of
mine similar questions: "Is Jesus
here? Where is he?" My friend, a
theologian, wondered how she
should answer. "Well, Jesus is in
the tabernacle; he's in the Word;

he's in the gathered assembly; he is present everywhere." The young girl really believed that, somehow, Jesus himself was in the flesh in that building. And isn't that the way it should be?

When someone wants to see Jesus, shouldn't they see him through us?

Shouldn't the Son of God reflect everything we do and say? Isn't that what we believe as Catholic Christians? If we want people to become Christian, shouldn't we be Christ-like?

Now, perhaps I'm being too dramatic or expecting too much.

What needs to die in my heart to follow him more closely?


In this Sunday's Gospel, Jesus announces his approaching death and says, "...unless a grain of wheat falls to the ground and dies, it remains just a grain of wheat; but if it dies, it produces much fruit." Jesus must die to bring us abundant life. He then goes on to say that we, too, must die to ourselves or give our lives away (i.e., "hate" our lives) to enter that abundant life. So, as Jesus gives his life away, what has to die in our hearts in order for us to follow him more closely?

The refrain in today's Responsorial Psalm (Psalm 51), "Create a clean heart in me, O God," may help us as we reflect on this question. In scripture, the opposite of a "clean"

or "pure" heart is a "divided heart."

A clean heart realizes that God is big and good enough to give our entire hearts to, as Jesus did in giving his life away. Perhaps what needs to die in our hearts is anything that keeps us from giving them to God and his ways.

Death and new life are natural processes. We may even have to die for what is good in our hearts to make more room for God and something better. Our Lenten disciplines, including our Disciples Unleashed Lenten Journal, help us prepare for the new life of Easter.



What Do Easter Food Baskets Contain?

The blessing of Easter food baskets is a custom among the Polish people. On Easter Sunday morning, all share the blessed foods. Items in the basket symbolize our faith:

- Butter: This dairy product is often shaped into a lamb, reminding us of the goodness of Christ that we should have toward all things.
- **Easter Bread**: A round rye loaf topped with a cross, symbolic of Jesus, the Bread of Life.
- Horseradish: Symbolic of the Passion of Christ still in our minds, but sweetened with some sugar because of the Resurrection.
- **Eggs and Pisanki**: Indicate new life and Christ's Resurrection from the Tomb.
- Sausage: A spicy sausage of pork products, indicative of God's favor and generosity.
- Ham: Symbolic of great joy and abundance.



 Cheese: Shaped into a ball, it symbolizes the moderation that Christians should have.

- Holy Water: Holy water is used throughout the year to bless the home, animals, fields, and religious rituals.
- A candle, often marked like the Paschal Candle lit during the Easter Vigil, is also inserted into the basket to represent Christ, the Light of the World.
- Sometimes, a colorful ribbon and sprigs of greenery are attached.

Once the linen cover is drawn over the top, the basket is ready for the blessing.

Walking the Path

Most often, things that happen during my week inspire my articles. This week is no exception. As I write, I am lamenting the fact that there are so many people that have no idea of how we, as Catholics, read and interpret scripture. It seems to be one of those things that many people are happy to turn over to clergy and religious sisters. Often, it is an attitude of leaving it to "official church people," and just having "them" tell us what we need to know. Here's the problem. When we don't know the foundational principles behind how we read the bible, we are open to confusion, and misinformation that impacts our understanding of God (Father, Son and Holy Spirit), our world, and more. As I think about this fact, I am pondering what I'd include in a class for parents who are just starting their families. What are the parts of Catholic Christianity that we all should know?

 First, take time to get comfortable with the fact that The Holy Bible is a book that is, actually, a collection of other "books" that vary widely in their content. I've heard scholars refer

- to it as a "library" of other books, which I think is a great analogy! There are true historical events. like those found in the gospels, but there are also folktales, epic tales, and other literary styles reflected in the writings of Old Testament authors, as well the New. For example: Poetry in the Psalms; Fables in Judges 9:7-15 and Num. 22:26-36; Folklore in the stories of Noah, Abraham, and Moses; the short story of Ruth, and more! As I have said before, read the introductions to learn more about the background of any particular book.
- Read the gospels: Matthew,
 Mark, Luke, and John. The book
 of Acts is important too! There,
 you'll learn about Jesus. Our
 entire faith is based on our faith
 in Jesus, and the gospels are,
 essentially, biographies of Jesus'
 life, death and resurrection.
- Learn the parts of the Mass. If you are comfortable with the Mass, you will be able to fully participate, and know what's going on. To help you, both the Diocese of Wichita and Arlington have videos entitled "The Mass

- Explained." There are other options as well.
- Take time to learn about, and get comfortable with the seven sacraments, especially the Eucharist. There are plenty of good, Catholic, sources on the topic. Check out the videos at bustedhalo.com or through "Aquinas 101" from the Thomistic Institute. If you are comfortable with the sacraments, odds are, you won't end up feeling like a "fish out of water" at any Catholic event.
- the rosary, would be good to learn. Getting familiar with different prayer forms helps to avoid the fish out of water feeling, AND helps us to experience different ways of communicating with God, hopefully finding ways that are fruitful for us.
- Finally, grow comfortable with the idea that faith growth is a lifelong process. Even with degrees in theology and Catholic ministry, I am still learning new things every day! I urge you, dive in and enjoy the water. The well is deep and wide.

Musings + Messages (cont'd)

After all, Jesus was perfect, and we are not. But if we want people to become joyful missionary disciples, shouldn't we be one ourselves? If you want someone to join your social group or club, shouldn't you be a

good representative of it? So, too, it is with our faith. We want to be the best representatives of Jesus so that others want to be like him, as well. This week, ask yourself, "Do people see Jesus in me, or do they ask me to

help them find Jesus?"

Life Line Screenings

At St. Therese of Lisieux Parish on Wednesday, March 27 from 9:00 AM-5:30 PM in the Social Hall, Life Line Screening, a provider of preventive health screenings, will be offering a package of four health screenings which will help identify your risk of stroke, heart disease and other chronic conditions. These screenings go beyond regular checkups to identify dangerous plaque buildup or blockage, which is a major risk factor for stroke and heart disease and provide valuable information about your health that can be shared with your doctor. The screenings include the following tests:

Carotid Artery Screening (Plaque)

which is an ultrasound performed to screen the carotid arteries for buildup of fatty plaque. The carotid arteries are the major blood vessels that provide blood to the brain. There are two carotid arteries, one on each side of the neck. Carotid artery disease causes up to one-third of all strokes. A stroke occurs when something blocks blood flow to the brain, causing injury. This buildup,

called atherosclerosis, is one of the leading causes of stroke.

Peripheral Arterial Disease

Screening includes an Ankle-Brachial Index (ABI) test which is performed using blood pressure cuffs on the arms and legs. Peripheral artery disease is a circulatory condition where the blood vessels are narrowed which reduces the blood flow to the limbs. Peripheral vascular disease is a sign of fatty deposits and calcium building up in the walls of the arteries (atherosclerosis) which can be caused by aging, diabetes, and smoking. It is important to screen for peripheral artery disease since the disease increases the risk of coronary artery disease, heart attack, and stroke.

Abdominal Aortic Aneurysm

(AAA) Screening is an ultrasound is performed to screen the abdominal aorta for the presence of an enlargement or aneurysm. An aortic aneurysm is a balloon-like bulge in the aorta that carries blood from the heart through the chest and torso.

The force of blood pumping can split the layers of the artery wall, allowing blood to leak in between them. An aortic aneurysm can lead to a ruptured aortic artery, which is a serious medical emergency.

Atrial Fibrillation Screening is done by doing a 6-lead electrocardiogram (EKG) which entails placing sensors on the arms and legs to screen for atrial fibrillation. Atrial fibrillation is an abnormal heart rhythm which is characterized by rapid and irregular beating of the atrial chambers of the heart. It often begins as short periods of abnormal beating, which becomes longer or continuous over time. Atrial fibrillation can lead to blood clots, stroke, and heart failure, and other heart-related complications.

These four vital screenings take 60-90 minutes to complete. If you are interested in getting this preventative screening done please register by calling toll free 1-844-591-7160, text the word "circle" to 216-279-1607 or online at https://llsa.social/HC.

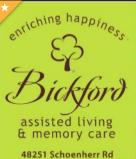
