

"Were you there when they crucified my Lord? Were you there when they nailed him to the tree? Were you there when they pierced him in the side? Were you there when the sun refused to shine? Were you there when they laid him in the tomb?"

These words from an old African-American spiritual are a kind of anamnesis—remembering the past in the present in order to recognize the future. The events we hear of on Palm Sunday are the culmination of Jesus' ministry. He was born to die. At the very instant of his death, his work was accomplished. All of

creation, from the very beginning to the very end, was redeemed. The affirmation by the centurion, "Truly this man was the Son of God," sums up who Jesus was and is.

We recall past events in the present day to prepare for our future meeting with the Lord. In many

What am I willing to endure to proclaim God's love?

This weekend, the scriptures are filled with urgencies and the importance of proclaiming God's love. The first reading declares, "The Lord GOD has given me a well-trained tongue, that I might know how to speak to the weary a word that will rouse them." We can all name people in our lives who are worn and weary. Visiting with the sick and spending time with an elderly relative are some opportunities to lift the weary. While these activities are not high on the "fun meter" and require taking time out of busy family schedules, making the time to share kind words with someone who is suffering or in a difficult situation can be meaningful, helpful, and uplifting for them.


In Psalm 22:23, we hear, "You who fear the LORD, praise him; all you descendants of Jacob, give glory to him; revere him, all you descendants of Israel!" We all ask God for things we need. But how often do we take the time (at home or Mass) to really praise and thank him for even the simplest things? This acknowledgment helps shift our focus from only wants and needs to the "good stuff" in our lives and helps strengthen our relationship with God.

In the second reading, Philippians 2:11, we hear, "...every tongue confess that Jesus Christ is Lord, to the glory of God the Father." When and how can we do this in our lives? Practically speaking, not everyone can stand on a street corner and shout this out at the top of their lungs. But we can live in ways that give such glory to the Father. During Lent, we fast, give alms, and spend more time in prayer at Mass and at home with family.



Maybe we make it a point to attend the entire Triduum this year, which is a significant proclamation of faith.

In the Palm Sunday Gospel, we hear Peter deny Jesus. He had every good intention but failed under pressure. Can we truly confess Christ as our Lord and Savior in all social situations this year?



senses, we were with the Lord at his crucifixion because our sins and transgressions contributed to God becoming man. There is an old adage: "That which is not assumed is not redeemed." Jesus had to become one of us and endure all that we endure. including death, in order to save us. But the story doesn't end there. The last verse, "Were you there when they rolled the stone away?" recalls that the empty tomb is our destiny. Jesus Christ rose from the dead, unlocking the gates of Paradise for those who have been saved. The resurrection is our future. Eternal life is our goal.

This week, take some time to reflect on the scriptures pertaining to the holiest week of the Church year. Reread the passion account and put yourself in the story. When you hear the words, "Were you there?" remember that you were, are, and, more importantly, will be.

Please join us for this week's events as you are able. The last communal penance service is on Monday at St. John Vianney at 7 PM. Holy Thursday (Mar. 28) has **no morning Mass, adoration, or confession**.

You are invited to the Mass of the Lord's Supper at 7 PM, followed by adoration until midnight. On Good Friday, we will have two opportunities to pray the Stations of the Cross, one Indoor and one outdoor, both at 12:30. These will be followed by the Liturgy of Good Friday at 1:30 PM. This year, we will celebrate Tenebrae (The Service of Shadows),

a series of readings and prayers to commemorate the death of Jesus. It is quite a moving experience, and it will be prayed at 7 PM in the Social Hall. The Food Basket Blessing will occur on Saturday at noon, and the Easter Vigil, at which we welcome our catechumens and elect into the church, begins outside at 8:30 PM. Easter Sunday Masses are at 7:45, 9:45, and 11:45 AM. These will be preceded by 20 minutes of prelude music. Please join us and invite your family and friends to experience Holy Week here at St. Therese.


What is the Easter Triduum?

The Easter Triduum, also known as the Sacred or Paschal Triduum, is a three-day period in the Catholic Church calendar. It begins on the evening of Maundy Thursday and ends with evening prayer on Easter Sunday.

- Holy Thursday: The evening Mass of the Lord's Supper
- **Good Friday**: The celebration of the Lord's passion and Adoration of the Holy Cross
- Holy Saturday: The Easter Vigil in the evening
- Easter Sunday: Vespers (evening prayer) and the celebration of Mass

The Triduum is a time to celebrate Jesus' passion,

death, and resurrection. It marks the most significant events of Holy Week. Challenge yourself or a family member to attend one event during Holy Week this year that is new to you.



Walking the Path

Have you been participating in the "I Am Here Lent Challenge" from the Archdiocese of Detroit? If you have, you probably know that they have used a couple of words recently that don't roll off the tongues of many Catholics: "anamnesis" and "epiclesis." Each describes a moment or portion of the Eucharistic prayer that a priest says at every Mass. It might be better to describe them as the effects of the words said at Mass! Here. I'll take a moment to explain what they mean, hopefully growing your appreciation for what happens during the celebration of the Eucharist.

To begin, "anamnesis" is the word used to describe the fact that, at Mass, we aren't just remembering what happened at the Last Supper. In the liturgy, Christ's sacrifice is presented to us in a way that goes above and beyond "remembering." I have heard it said that his sacrifice is being *re-presented*. How that is written is important. It isn't a typo. The dash in "re-presented" assures that we aren't saying that it is, somehow, a representation of what happened at the Last Supper. Instead, Jesus' sacrifice on the cross is offered upon the altar. Jesus, who offered himself up for our sins, is being made present to us. Body,


blood, soul, and divinity, Jesus is present in the Eucharist. "The Church has always taught that Christ is not re-sacrificed at each Mass, but that we enter into that one moment in history when he was scourged for our offenses and wounded for our sin. Jesus' death defeated evil's strongest consequence, death. Since death is a reality that impacts all people of all times, his victorious suffering stands outside of time. Therefore, at Mass, the veil of time is torn open, and we kneel in the presence of that divine moment, which conquers what appears to be unconquerable" (Thomas Griffin, "Anamnesis and the Key to the Mass," Ascension, 5-12-21).

The next word I mentioned is "epiclesis." That is the calling down of the Holy Spirit upon the offerings of bread and wine. It is when the priest asks the Father to send the Holy Spirit to sanctify (i.e., make holy) these offerings so that they may become the Body and Blood of Jesus. The priest offers his sacrifice and ours—offering them up on our behalf. Yes, it is mostly the bread and wine offered, but what gifts do we bring? They are our prayers, sacrifices, acts of justice and kindness—our lives as believers, in short—that we offer to God on that

altar of sacrifice. As a matter of fact, I know a Catholic church that has two murals in their entryway. Their theme is "Lord, we offer you our work and our play." These murals remind Mass participants that their sacrifices can be, and are, made holy when offered up at Mass. As with all topics, so much more can be said.

It is always my pleasure to dive into topics so I can unpack them for myself and others. Anyone who has taken a class I facilitated knows about my love for theological rabbit holes! There are so many topics, so I'll never run out of things to discover and share. Thank you for indulging me.

I mention this because I've been wondering if this space is better used to provide information about all of the offerings from the Discipleship Formation Department. Rather than hogging all of the space for discussion of topics that pertain to adult learners, I think it might better serve the needs of the parish to open up this space for other contributors. As we move forward, the Formation Office will collectively use this space to share information about the variety of formation programming for learners of all ages. Stay tuned.

Health Benefits of Kindness

The other day while on social media, I couldn't' help notice how many people post kind and compassionate responses, yet in "real" life, kindness doesn't always seem so prevalent. Whether you are driving, standing in line for a cashier, or going through a door, kindness isn't always displayed. I am always pleasantly surprised when I call a company and the clerk is kind and patient with me. But, when you think about it, why should I be surprised? Shouldn't kindness be the norm?

You might say to me, "what about the passing it forward" initiatives like buying a cup of coffee for the person behind you at Starbucks? Although I think that is a kind gesture, kindness is more than an action or behavior. Kindness should be thought as a quality we can cultivate and become with intention. Kind people are typically generous and considerate and do not expect anything in return. Giving kindness is often simple and free and there are wonderful health benefits in return for being kind.

Physiologically, kindness can positively change your brain by boosting levels of serotonin and dopamine which produce feelings of satisfaction, well-being and pleasure.

According to research from Emory University, when you are kind to another person, your brain reward centers light up, as if you were the recipient of the good deed—not the giver. This phenomenon is called the "helper's high."

Witnessing acts of kindness produces oxytocin, which aids in lowering blood pressure and cortisol which is a hormone directly related with stress levels, and improves overall heart-health. Endorphins, your body's natural painkiller, may also be released when you show kindness.

Kindness has been shown to increase self-esteem, empathy and compassion, and improve mood and energy levels. People who give of themselves tend to be healthier and live longer.

Kindness can increase your sense of connectivity with others, decrease loneliness, combat low mood and improve relationships. It also can be contagious, encouraging others to join in with their own generous deeds.

And, don't forget, this also means being kind to yourself! Think of the times we beat up on ourselves for something we did or didn't do. Thinking negatively just promotes more negative thoughts in the brain. Make a concentrated effort to stop those negative thoughts by practicing mindfulness, praying, meditating, or breathing techniques.

Commit to yourself you are going to practice kindness each day. If this is something you know you need to work on, think of this as something to cultivate like planting seeds in your garden. Start small and do something each day. Maybe it is making a concentrated effort to say good morning to your co-workers each day or being helpful and patient when one of them needs help with something? Maybe it is doing something unsolicited for an elderly family member or neighbor? Smile at a stranger. Take a few minutes to think about how you might practice kindness with your family, church, community, co-workers, environment, and yourself! And, if you are a parent, what better life lesson than teaching your children to be compassionate and kind?


