Today's Gospel passage is a continuation of the Road to Emmaus account, in which Jesus met two disciples traveling out of Jerusalem back to their hometown on Easter Sunday afternoon. The two disciples have just rushed back to Jerusalem to let the others know that they have seen Jesus, and he appears to all the disciples gathered there. Luke wants to underscore the fact that Jesus is risen from the dead. He has not been resuscitated but is truly resurrected. His appearance is different, yet familiar. He is neither a ghost nor an apparition; instead, he is truly human, albeit in a glorified, resurrected state.

However, Luke wants to emphasize another reality: Jesus was and is a known entity. His presence and activity were foretold in scripture. The prophets knew of his coming. They knew of his suffering and death. Moreover, they knew

## The Eucharist transforms, heals, strengthens...

Did you know we are a part of the saving sacrificial gift for the world? The gifts we bring to the altar are not the only gifts! When we come together to worship at Mass, we, the faithful, offer ourselves up as a sacrifice! We are called to offer our bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and pleasing to God. This means our bodies are not simply flesh and bones but our very **selves**. We become the spiritual sacrifice!


We were made to live with our God, but unfortunately, the fall in the Garden of Eden required intervention from our creator. We move forward from the beginning of salvation history toward our transformation in Christ to partake in his divinity. As temporal beings, this takes time. As we receive Holy Communion, Jesus can transform us into himself. However, we must be ready to receive, or we cannot fully become what we accept. Our Lord always shows up 100% in the sacramental life of the church, but we might not always be open or ready to receive. This doesn't mean we can never receive, but we might need more time to prepare our hearts.

When we receive Communion, we don't change Christ into ourselves; he transforms us into him! This is why the doctrine of real presence is such a keystone. The host is not simply a symbol of Jesus or a projection of his presence. He is truly, substantially present in body, blood, soul, and divinity!

So, what is this transformation, and what are its effects? I turn to two quotes to help us: the first from Sr. Bernadette Reis, FSP (BustedHalo. com), and the second from James Dobbins (EWTN, "The Eucharist and its Effects").

They say, "The transformation we undergo also mirrors what happens to the bread and wine. The bread and wine are not aware of the transformation taking place. They are simply there, or present, and undergo transformation. All throughout our lives, our bodies are undergoing continual transformations. We are not aware of the transformations taking place, but we know they are taking place because they concretely manifest themselves. In the same way, all that is required is that we be present to Christ and allow him to transform us. We may never be aware of the actual transformation taking place, but we will definitely be aware of the effects of that transformation in our lives."

And of the effects, "...the Eucharist is like the effects of food for our body. Food sustains life, and the Eucharist sustains the life of the soul.



It gives us the grace we need to deny ourselves and to life [sic] for Christ, to live for our life. The more love we have for Christ, the less self-love we have. The more we love God, the more we can resist temptation, and so the Eucharist strengthens us spiritually. Thus, the Eucharist has the effect of bringing to life the virtues in us so that we can live the life of Christ in us. But just as ordinary food can be effected only when properly digested, so too, the Eucharist can only produce its good effects when we are properly disposed to receive it."

Come and encounter Christ at Mass, do it in memory of him, hear his Word, receive his real presence, experience his transformative love, and then share this experience with others. May the Easter season continue to bless you and the risen Lord transform you!



## **Mass with Anointing of the Sick**

Those who are seriously ill are invited to attend a Mass for the sick, including the sacrament of anointing of the sick, on Saturday, Apr. 20, at 11 AM. This sacrament is intended for those who suffer from debilitating illnesses that require professional medical care. If you or a loved one have cancer. heart

disease, diabetes, stroke, or chronic pain, or if you are preparing to have a surgery or procedure that could be life-threatening, you are most welcome to be anointed. People who are also on a decline in life, progressing toward death, should also be anointed. Those who have a serious mental illness such as

schizophrenia, manic depression, or addictions may also consider being anointed. However, if you are simply tired, melancholic, or in relatively good health, you do not need the sacrament. In short, this Mass and sacrament are for people who are in danger of death due to a serious issue if left untreated.



When we practice these four virtues, we engage our intellect, faith, and will to achieve control over our passions and increase our selfmastery. ## How is your Health Literacy?

In talking with an acquaintance about their health recently, I realized they did not know or understand their health issues. Although physically and mentally capable, they relied on others as their "source" for their medical conditions. Being knowledgeable and understanding of your health, being able to communicate that information, and being an advocate for yourself in the medical setting is one aspect of health literacy.

The official definition of health literacy is an individual's ability to "obtain, communicate, process, and understand basic health information and services," according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC).

Lack of health literacy can affect a patient's health and outcomes. This is especially true for older adults. If someone doesn't know or understand what is wrong with them, it's challenging to communicate medical history to healthcare providers. Some people might think health literacy doesn't matter and that it's the doctor's job to make healthcare decisions for you. However, healthcare decisions should be collaborative between the patient and the doctor. You cannot participate in those decisions if you are unknowledgeable about your health.

If a person does not understand how to take their medications, when to go to the emergency room, or how to identify pertinent medical signs and symptoms, this can have serious consequences. People who don't understand health information and instructions are likelier to have worse health outcomes and use services like emergency rooms more often than their primary doctor. When sick or in pain, it can be challenging to communicate with healthcare providers and understand what is being told, even in the best situations.

Health literacy skills are essential for patients to make smart healthcare choices, communicate with their doctor, and provide the information they need to advocate for themselves in a medical setting. During hospitalization, the patient should receive education on their diagnosis, new medications, pertinent signs and symptoms, and when to contact the doctor. If you do not understand how to care for yourself, you **must** talk to your family and healthcare providers to develop a plan.

Many healthcare and hospital systems have educational programs and systems designed to improve patients' health literacies, and pharmacies also provide handouts and consultations with prescriptions. Problems resulting from limited health literacy include misinterpretation of warning labels on prescription drugs, such as "Do Not Chew or Crush" or "Take Medication with Plenty of Water."

At St. Therese, educational health lectures are usually offered on the first Thursday of the month from 12:30 to 1:30 PM, and weekly medical/health topics are included in the church bulletin. So, what steps can you take to improve your health literacy? Read the literature your healthcare provider gives you! Research your illness if you can, but only use reputable resources! If videos are played in the physician waiting room, watch them. Be prepared when going to the doctor's office by writing down questions or concerns before you go. If you don't understand what is being discussed at your appointment, ask the doctor to explain it again. If the healthcare provider is talking too fast or difficult to understand. let them know. If the doctor uses terminology you do not understand, ask them to explain it in "different" or "simpler" terms. Don't be embarrassed or intimated by asking them to reexplain it to you again. Take notes or ask the office staff to write down information for you if you are being given instructions. It is a good idea to repeat the information to the doctor to ensure you understand. If you are hard of hearing, ensure your doctor knows so they can talk loud enough for you to hear. If you have difficulty understanding your doctor, ask a family member or trusted friend to be with you to help listen. Once you are home, ask that person to review the information with you. Remember: you are an advocate for your own care, and if you take the time to educate yourself to the best of your ability, you will enjoy better health outcomes.
