One of my dogs, Phoebe, has a terrible time with storms. She pants and becomes terrified. Nothing calms her down. Her mother, Lydia, on the other hand, has lived through a hurricane. She just sleeps through the storms. Nothing bothers her. How do you handle the storms in your life? Do they cause you

anxiety, or are you able to sleep through them?

First, there will always be storms and trouble. We have a choice: we can let the storms master us, or we can master the storms. In other words, we can allow the storms to overwhelm and crush us, as some

have done, or we can choose to fight them. While we may not have the power of Jesus to quell a storm with our voices, we do have the power to overcome its effects.

Second, the storms in our lives shape us. They help us build our character and make us better

In what storm am I struggling to trust Jesus?

Life is often described as a series of storms, each varying in duration and intensity. Trusting Jesus amidst these storms can sometimes feel challenging. One common storm that many struggle with is uncertainty. Uncertainty manifests in several aspects of life: career changes, health issues, financial instability, or relationship turmoil. This storm is characterized by the anxiety and fear of the unknown. It's the feeling of standing at the edge of a cliff, unsure whether you'll find solid ground or a deep abyss below. In these moments, trusting Jesus can seem like an insurmountable task.

In this weekend's Gospel, we see the disciples facing a literal storm on the Sea of Galilee. They were terrified as the waves crashed over their boat, and despite Jesus being with them, their fear overshadowed their faith.

Jesus, however, calmed the storm with a simple command, reminding them—and us—that he is in control, even when the situation seems dire.

The storm of uncertainty challenges our trust in Jesus because it confronts our desire for control and predictability. We like to know what's coming next-to have a plan and a clear path. When that's stripped away, we're left vulnerable, facing the unknown. It's in this vulnerability that Jesus invites us to trust him more deeply. Trusting Jesus in the storm of uncertainty means surrendering our fears and anxieties to him. It means believing that he is in control and that his plans for us are good, even when we can't see the outcome. It involves daily, sometimes moment-by-moment, decisions to lean on his promises rather than our understanding.



The storm of uncertainty can be daunting, but it's also an opportunity for growth. As we learn to trust Jesus more fully, we find peace that exceeds our circumstances. We discover that, even in the darkest times, his presence is our anchor, and his love is our refuge.

people. God has given us the intelligence and strength to work through issues and experiences so that we may become stronger having gone through them.

Third, sometimes a storm is

necessary to prepare for something new. Storms remove the old landscape to allow new growth. Storms uncover things that have long been buried so that people can uncover the riches of the past. While we think of storms as destructive,

sometimes they can be instructive, as well.

This week, think of the storms you've weathered in the past. What did you learn from those experiences?

Top Pick: Eugene Vodolazkhin's Laurus

When a young Russian physician leads his beloved into mortal sin,

he dedicates the rest of his life to atonement—and ignites a fire of madness and miracles that burns from the Volga to Jerusalem, and into the 20th century's own tragedies and triumphs.

Honorable Mention: Tim Powers' The Anubis Gates

Psychological Thriller

Top Pick: Ron Hansen's Mariette in Ecstasy

Ron Hansen's religious thriller is impossible to put down and keeps its mysteries intact to the very end. Set in a convent in upstate New York in the early 20th century, the novel follows a charismatic young novice who appears to be experiencing the stigmata. As her visions escalate, the convent and the surrounding region reach a boiling pitch of jealousy, religious fervor, doubt and desperate longing for clarity—which God does not seem interested in giving.

Honorable Mentions: Susannah Clarke's Piranesi and Mikhail Bulgakov's The Master and Margarita

Murder Mysteries

Top Pick: Dorothy Sayers' The Nine Tailors

When an unknown man is found dead in a bell town in the flooded fenlands of England, no one can say how he died. But Lord Peter scents evil in the wind. This gripping mystery gives a chilling look at the unintended consequences of both sin and justice and will keep you guessing till the last page.

Honorable mention: G.K. Chesterton's Father Brown Mysteries

▶ How To Take Care of Yourself in a Health Emergency If You are Alone

According to the PEW Research Center, 27% of Americans 60 years and older live alone, so it's important to know what to do in case of a health emergency. One of the most common events that happens as we get older is falling; one in four older adults falls each year. If you fall and don't have symptoms of something more serious (like a stroke), take a minute to get your bearings. Don't stand up unless you are sure you can do so safely. If you are having trouble getting up, roll onto your side, push up to a sitting position, and get on your hands and knees. If you are able to crawl toward a piece of sturdy furniture, turn your body so your stronger leg is next to it. Place your hands on the furniture, bend the knee closest to it, put your foot on the floor, and push yourself up. Hopefully, if all else fails, you have a phone nearby to call family, friends, or 911. Purchasing an emergency button/watch might also be a good option.

If you are alone and something suddenly seems wrong with your vision, coordination, or speech, you could be experiencing a stroke.

Symptoms of stroke can include facial drooping, arm weakness (of one or both arms), and slurred speech. If you are experiencing any of these symptoms, call 911 because

time is essential! The sooner you get to the hospital, the better chance of a positive outcome.

Chest pain that lasts more than a few minutes or goes and comes back is another medical emergency. Symptoms can include an uncomfortable/dull pressure, squeezing sensation, nausea, lightheadedness, jaw, shoulder, back, chest, or neck pain, and pain that radiates down your left arm. Do not attempt to drive yourself to the hospital or have someone else drive you. Instead, call 911 and tell them your symptoms. Then, you can call your family to alert them. Chew or place one 325-milligram (or four 81-milligram) baby aspirin under your tongue to get the medicine into your bloodstream quickly—unless you have a contraindication to taking aspirin. Gather your ID, insurance cards, and a list of your medications if you are able to do so without exerting yourself. Unlock the front door and sit down in a comfortable chair near the entrance of your home while taking slow, deep breaths to keep you calm.

Burning yourself with a scalding liquid can also be an emergent situation. If you are able, submerge the burn in cold water. Do not use ice; it can cause more damage to

the skin cells. Apply a burn gel like Alocane or Neosporin Burn Relief Ointment, which can help prevent infection. If the burn is extensive, blisters, and is on your hands or face, consider going to the emergency room. Stinging, blistering, burning, and discomfort on the day after the burn are not unusual. However, if pus or redness develops around the burn area, it might be a sign of an infection and should be treated by a healthcare provider.

Although this list of health emergencies is not comprehensive, these are some of the most common emergencies. It is also important to have an emergency plan in place with your family and friends. In addition, make sure you have an emergency contact; they know the location of important documents, your advance directive, and your healthcare wishes, if necessary.


