What makes a good partnership? It depends on whom you ask. Some say like-minded people can be good partners; others say those who have opposite personalities (and thereby complement each other) are the best partners to have. But what does scripture teach us about being partners in life and love? At first, God made animals for the man so he would not be alone. While the animals provided companionship, none proved to be suitable as a partner. So, God went back to the drawing board, so to speak, and created a woman. As the man says, "This one is bone of my bones and flesh of my flesh." In other words, a good partner is like us yet complements us. Moreover, a good partner does not always agree with us but instead offers alternative viewpoints that help us clarify our own belief system. How is Christ calling me to honor my commitments more completely?

Driver Safety Program for Seniors

There are more than 41 million licensed drivers age 65 and older on the roads, up from 26 million 20 years ago. As people age, changes to vision, hearing, and reflexes may affect driving skills and the risk of being injured or killed in a motor vehicle crash increases. Physical and mental changes that may affect driving includes:

Arthritis: Joints get stiff, and muscles weaken, which makes it harder to turn your head to look back, turn the steering wheel quickly, or brake safely.

Eye sight: People, things, and movement outside the direct line of sight might be harder to see, like street or traffic signs. Night driving can be challenging with the glare from oncoming headlights or street lights. Eye diseases such as glaucoma, cataracts, and macular degeneration may cause vision problems.

Hearing: Horns, sirens, or noises coming from your own car may be difficult to hear and cause a problem since these sounds warn you when you need to pull over or get out of the way.

Reflexes: The aging process may cause shorter attention spans and reflexes may be slower. Loss of feeling or tingling in fingers and feet, or medical conditions like strokes or Parkinson's can make it difficult to steer or use the foot pedals. **Medications**: Side effects that cause drowsiness or lightheadedness may impair the ability to drive safely. Read the information provided with prescriptions to make sure they do not impact driving.

General safe driving tips for seniors:

- Avoid driving at night, on the highway, or in bad weather if these things concern you.
 Bad weather like rain, ice, or snow make driving difficult for anyone. Wait until the weather is better, call your family/friend, or use an alternative mode of transportation.
- Older drivers may also have problems when yielding the right of way, turning (especially making left turns), changing lanes, passing, and using expressway ramps.
- If you have health problems or medications that might make it unsafe for you to drive, talk with your doctor to develop a plan to help you keep driving and decide when it is no longer safe.
- Take a defensive driving course to refresh your driving skills, such as the AARP course at St. Therese on October 9 & 10. Proven driving techniques are taught to keep you safe on the road. You may even qualify for a car insurance discount! You will learn facts about the effects of medication on driving, how to reduce driver distractions, maintain the proper distance behind another car, the proper

use of safety belts, air bags, and anti-lock brakes, techniques for handling left turns, right-ofway and roundabouts, and new technology found in cars today.

St. Therese of Lisieux will host an AARP Driver Safety Course on October 9 & 10 from 9:00 AM - 1:00 PM.
