

The word of God is "living and effective, sharper than any two-edged sword," as the letter to the Hebrews tells us. But what does that mean? Well, a double-edged sword cuts both ways. Its blade is sharp on both sides and can do a lot of damage. A skilled swordsman, though, can use the blade to

combat the enemy and, at the same time, protect himself.

However, someone not so skilled could hurt himself badly by misusing the sword. So, too, with God's word. We like it when the word is spoken about our enemies, but we become uncomfortable

when it is directed at us. The young man in the Gospel liked following most of the commandments, but when Jesus challenged him to give to the poor, he became sad. This is also true in our lives. Much of scripture is comforting; however, there may be an uncomfortable passage here and there that cuts

What am I willing to give up to grow in Wisdom?

Whenever we want to learn a new skill, we must sacrifice. Athletes must take time to practice individually and with teammates to hone their abilities. As a musician, practicing scales and determining intonation are important if I am to improve. Similarly, chefs need to spend time reading recipes and sampling their dishes, all of which take time and effort. In short, if we want to improve in life, it will involve some sacrifice on our part.

The same is true of wisdom. One becomes wise not by osmosis (simply sitting somewhere and absorbing the atmosphere) but by study, practice, reflection, discussion, and experimentation. Wisdom, like any skill, is acquired by deliberate action.

There are different kinds of wisdom: "book smarts," "street smarts," "reading" people, emotional wisdom, empathetic wisdom, and the like. But

for those of us who are Christian, we want to acquire *God's* wisdom, which involves sacrifices of time and self. We must ask ourselves: What am I willing to give up as a human in order to grow in God's wisdom?

In many ways, we need to give up our own opinions, wants, needs, and desires and literally "die to self" to achieve God's wisdom. His wisdom does not merely come from books or memorizing facts and figures; it involves putting ourselves at the service of God and neighbor so that Christ shines through us.

God's wisdom sometimes calls us to be countercultural—to go against the grain of commonly held beliefs. Occasionally, we are invited to fight for the rights of those whom the world considers "nobodies." God's wisdom challenges us to view the world through the eyes of faith and see potential in others by looking beyond the obvious. Ultimately,



growing in God's wisdom means becoming a person of service and going above and beyond—not just doing the bare minimum.

This week, ask the Lord what you need to give up in order to grow in God's wisdom.

This week, think about some of Jesus' difficult sayings that cause you to have consternation or frustration. Ask yourself what is uncomfortable about

Here are the first three ways that going to Adoration may impact you:

1. You develop a sense of awe and wonder

There is nothing like the atmosphere of a quiet chapel or church, the smell of incense, and the splendor of the monstrance to help you understand the truth of what is happening in Adoration. We are truly before Jesus Christ, His Body, Blood, Soul, and Divinity. The more you sink into that silence in front of the Host, the more you'll realize the only response is awe and wonder at

the greatness of our God.

2. You experience peace in other areas of your life

Jesus said, "Peace I leave with you, my peace I give to you" (John 14:27). The outward peace we can experience in Adoration (the quiet and the stillness) reaches much deeper. It leads to an inner peace that affects all areas of our lives. It doesn't mean everything in our life will be perfect and without suffering, but Christ's peace means we know the storms of life can't shake us.

3. You begin to look outwardly

Jesus told us to "love one another as I have loved you" (John 13:34). Spending time in Adoration connects us to the whole world—after all, we're spending time with the Creator of all things! Spending more time praising and adoring God means you can look beyond your own concerns and see the needs of others in your life and in the world.

Our young people continue to learn about prayer

Starting with The Sign of the Cross, our children are continually praying in class, and encouraged to pray in their everyday lives. Our Confirmation Prep Coordinator, Veronica LaPlant, recently shared the following with her classes:

The sign of the cross is a gesture made by Catholics to profess

their faith in the Trinity and to remember their baptism. It is made by touching the forehead, breast, and shoulders, and is an abbreviated version of the Apostles' Creed.

When we combine this gesture with a vocal prayer, we make two prayers. So, let us recognize the power of what we do when we pray, "In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy

Spirit." It affords us powerful protection against the demons and our weak nature.

October is Breast Awareness Month

National Breast Cancer Awareness Month is a chance to raise awareness about the importance of finding breast cancer early! Breast cancer is one of the most common kinds of cancer in women. After skin cancer, breast cancer is the most common cancer diagnosed in women in the United States. About 1 in 8 women born today in the US will get breast cancer at some point. Although breast cancer occurs primarily in women, men can get it too! Roughly, 1 in 800 men get breast cancer. The good news is, breast cancer survival rates have increased, and the number of deaths associated with the disease is steadily declining due to earlier detection, new treatments and better understanding of the disease. A mammogram can help find breast cancer early when it's easier to treat.

Breast cancer occurs when some breast cells begin to grow abnormally and divide more rapidly than healthy cells forming a lump or a mass. Cells may spread to the lymph nodes or to other parts of the body. Researchers have identified hormonal, lifestyle, and environmental factors that increase the risk of developing cancer, but it is unclear why some people with no risk factors develop cancer, while

others with risk factors don't. About 5-10 percent of breast cancers are linked to gene mutations passed through generations of a family. A number of inherited mutated genes can increase the likelihood of breast cancer, one being the breast cancer gene 1 (BRCA1) and breast cancer gene 2 (BRACA2), both of which significantly increase the risk of breast cancer and ovarian cancer. If you have a strong family history of breast cancer, your doctor may recommend a blood test to help identify specific mutations in BRCA or other genes that are being passed through the family.

Factors associated with an increased risk of breast cancer include being female, increased age, personal history of breast cancer or conditions, family history of breast cancer, inherited genes that increase cancer risk, radiation exposure, obesity, beginning your period at a younger age, beginning menopause at an older age, having your first child at an older age, having never been pregnant, postmenopausal hormone therapy and drinking alcohol.

Signs and symptoms of breast cancer may include a breast lump or thickening that feels different from the surrounding tissue, change in

the size, shape, or appearance of a breast, dimpling of skin, inverted nipple, peeling, scaling, crusting of areas around the nipple, or redness or pitting of the breast skin. A breast cancer risk factor is anything that makes it more likely you will get cancer, but having one or even several, does NOT mean you will develop the disease. Many women who develop the disease have no risk factors, other than being a woman. If you find a lump, or notice other changes in your breast, even if you had a recent mammogram, make an appointment with your doctor as soon as possible!

Changes to your daily life that may help reduce your risk of breast cancer include breast cancer screening, breast self-exams, drinking, if at all, in moderation, exercising, limiting postmenopausal hormone therapy, eating a healthy diet and maintaining a healthy weight.

Talk to your mother, sisters, daughters, and girlfriends to spread the word about the importance of good breast health this month! Early detection is the key to keeping healthy and living a long, blessed life.

The LORD God said, "It is not good that the man should be alone; I will make a suitable partner for him" (Gn 2:18).

Each time I gather with our OCIA catechumens and candidates, I see the profound truth of the LORD's statement. This year's OCIA group truly reflects the vastness and grandeur of God's creation, ranging in age from 10 to 70 with family ties as far away as Massachusetts, Texas, and Bosnia, serving society with skills in culinary arts, pharmaceutical sales, football, and competitive dance. Each one is on a journey to join us as part of the mystical body of Christ! And I agree with the sentiments from this scripture passage; it would not be good for them to journey alone.

To ensure that our soon-to-be Catholic brothers and sisters aren't walking alone, we're forming a group of Parish Sponsors—travel guides, if you will—who will provide friendly faces and a warm welcome by being available to answer questions and point out things of interest to newcomers who are navigating their way in a large, diverse, and active Family of Parishes faith community.

As a Parish Sponsor, we will only ask you to do four things:

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
