Fresh from these classes, I volunteered to make a sheet cake for an outreach activity at church. Boy, oh boy, did I decorate that cake! Adorned with a bouquet of roses, lovely lettering, and scalloped piping, I carried it into the Parish Center with great pride. What I encountered there, though, took all the wind out of my sails! The doors were open, and it was obvious where donations were to be left, but there wasn't a single soul around. In anguish, I stood there, lamenting that I didn't even have a pen and paper so I could leave a note with my name on it! How would **anyone** know that this beautiful cake was decorated and donated by... **me**? I knew that God knew, but I really wanted some other form of recognition or praise, as well. disciple, it didn't take me long to find scripture passages that addressed these exact feelings, today's readings included.

In today's Gospel, James and John are trying to figure out what they need to do to get closer to Jesus so they'd be granted the honor and authority of sitting at his right and left sides. Just like so many aspects of discipleship, Jesus turns their preconceived notions upside down as he says, "Whoever wishes to be great among you will be your servant." Jesus is calling them (and us) to humble service that is rooted in love—not in honor or recognition. His words weren't just a request from our High Priest and Almighty God, who acts from that position of authority and power, in turn asking for humble followers. No. Whether being born in a stable, washing his disciples' feet, or allowing himself to be nailed to a cross for our sins, Jesus modeled humility and loving actions, without flash or show, time and time again.

Today, I pray that we can all set aside our egos to serve others without craving public recognition. While we aren't going to make the kinds of sacrifices that Jesus did, may we, in our small corners of the world,



bake the cakes and decorate them as loving gifts, freely given, with no strings attached.

Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest

Once again, the Knights of Columbus Council #11957 and the St. Therese of Lisieux Discipleship Formation Staff, will host the Keep Christ in Christmas Poster Contest, sponsored by the K of C. This contest promotes the true spirit of the holiday: the birth of our Savior, Jesus Christ.

The contest is open to children ages 5 through 14, and entries will be organized by age group.

Judging will be based on slogan, artistic merit, and overall impact. All entries will be displayed at a K of C breakfast in December and retained by the Knights.

The winners of each age group will receive a \$25 award from the K of C, and their entry will be entered into the K of C *district* poster contest. District winners will then go on to the state contest, and so on.



All children are encouraged to participate, regardless of artistic ability. As K of C member Paul Candela says, "By engaging the creative talents and imaginations of our young people, we hope they will come to a deeper understanding of the true, spiritual meaning of Christmas."

Here are more ways that going to Adoration may impact you:

4. You get bored sometimes

There are going to be times when Adoration can feel anything but glorious. You get distracted; your mind begins to wander; you can hear someone sniffing next to you. Maybe in the beginning, Adoration was full of wonderful feelings, but in regular Adoration, daily life sets in, and it can feel not-so-special. But that doesn't devalue or take away from the truth of what Adoration is. Our faith is more than feelings, and God will still be working in you. This is the beauty of the Incarnation-God made man, coming into all our stresses, fears, problems-and yes, boredom. Know that even if an hour spent in Adoration is a continual return to Him every few minutes when your mind wanders, you are still giving God the best gift you can-your time and company.

5. But you become excited about going to Adoration

The more time you spend in Adoration discovering that God is a God who loves you and wants to spend time with you, the more you begin to actually want to go. If Adoration once felt like a chore, you might even find yourself becoming excited to go! Adoration is addictive, not just because of the things we can gain for ourselves, but because we were created to adore. As we say at Mass, it is "right and just" that we should give thanks to the Lord! Adoration is imprinted on our hearts, and "our hearts are restless until they find our rest in Him!" (Thanks, St. Augustine!)

6. Grace enters your life

It's amazing how a simple act of committing to even a short time of regular Adoration makes such a huge difference in the rest of your life. You can carry that moment of being in His presence with you long after you've left the church or chapel. His grace sustains you in every moment—especially in moments of temptation, which becomes easier to resist when you spend more time in Adoration. Sometimes, it really is that straightforward.

Worth Noting

As a Catholic educator, it is very important to me to follow the guidelines of the Church and always know my sources. I can't count the times I have read, seen, or heard something that claimed to be "Catholic" and speaking for the Catholic Church, yet it contained erroneous and problematic information. To help you discern the validity of your sources, I am including a statement that was sent to AOD parishes on October 8, 2024:

> The Archdiocese of Detroit is aware that the Michigan Catholic Tribune, a newspaper falsely identifying itself as Catholic, is being mailed to parishioners in some areas of the state. This publication is not endorsed by, nor is it affiliated with the Archdiocese of Detroit. To our knowledge, it does not have the proper authorization required by Canon (Church) law to call itself Catholic:

Since they participate in the mission of the Church, all the Christian faithful have the right to promote or sustain apostolic action even by their own undertakings, according to their own state and condition. Nevertheless, no undertaking is to claim the name Catholic without the consent of competent ecclesiastical authority. (Source: Canon 216, 1983 Code of Canon Law)

The Archdiocese has not shared any mailing information with this organization.

The Archdiocese takes the opportunity to reaffirm its commitment to engaging in appropriate political and electoral activity for Catholic organizations, as directed by the Michigan Catholic Conference (MCC) and the U.S. Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB):

Churches and other 501 (c) (3) institutions that qualify for tax-exempt status under the Internal Revenue Code are not permitted to be involved in partisan politics, including any expressions of preference, support for, or opposition to any specific candidates or political parties.

Estate Planning

Estate planning is something everyone with an estate should do regardless of wealth. If you own a car, home, real estate, checking and savings accounts, investments, life insurance, furniture, and personal possessions, you should plan for your estate. Estate planning is making a plan in advance, naming the people or organizations you want to receive possessions after you die, and taking steps now to make carrying out your plan, instructions stating whom you want to receive something of yours, what you want them to receive, and when they are to receive it, with the least amount paid in taxes, legal fees, and court costs. The plan should also include instructions for your care and financial affairs should you become incapacitated before you die.

A will provides your instructions, but it does not avoid probate. A will only directs how assets titled in your name and without a beneficiary designation or other governing contract will be distributed upon a person's death. Wills can include guardianship of minor children or pets, distribution of property and assets, funeral arrangements, and whom you choose to serve as your executor, the person ensuring your wishes are carried out. The assets must still go through probate court before they can be distributed to your intended beneficiaries. This process may take a few months

to two years or longer. The court system, not your family, controls the process and the timing of distributions to your beneficiaries. Jointly-owned property and assets that let you designate a beneficiary (for example, life insurance, IRAs, 401(k)s, annuities, and certain other accounts) are not controlled by your will and usually will transfer to the surviving owners or beneficiary without probate.

A revocable living trust (combined with a will) is preferred by many families and estate planning professionals. A revocable living trust can avoid probate at death, prevent court control of assets if you become incapacitated during life, organize your assets together in one plan and reduce estate taxes, if you have a large estate. You can name yourself as the trustee and name a co-trustee or successor trustee. Because a trust is revocable, you can change it at any time. Unlike a probate, which will end at some point, a trust can continue long after your death. Assets can stay in your trust, managed by the trustee you selected, until your beneficiaries reach the age you want them to inherit or longer to provide for a loved one with special needs; to protect the assets from beneficiaries' creditors, spouses, and irresponsible spending; or to provide for future generations.

Planning your estate now will help organize your records, correct titles, and designate beneficiaries so your family does not need to look for this documentation after your death. You can put something in place now and change it later, which is exactly the way estate planning should be done. It should not be a one-time event. You should review and update your plan as your family, financial circumstances, and relevant laws change over your lifetime.

Although estate planning may cost some money now, it will save money for your family. Knowing you have a prepared plan in place—one that contains your instructions and will protect your family—will give you and your family peace of mind. Estate planning is one of the most thoughtful and considerate things you can do for your loved ones.
