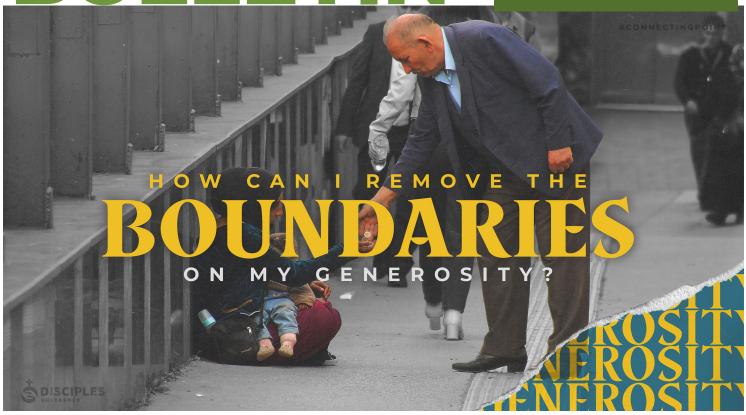

MUSINGS + MESSAGES

In today's readings, two widows, who have very little yet are very generous, become examples of how God uses a small amount to show what can be done—a common message throughout the scriptures. The widow of Zarephath finds that her flour jar and oil jug never run out because of her generosity to

Elijah. Jesus reminds his disciples that the widow's mite is greater in the eyes of God than the money of those who have a lot of surplus.

When we are struggling, the first temptation is to withhold our generosity. We're all familiar with the old adage, "Charity begins at home," which is sometimes used as a pretext for saying "no" when we're asked to give to one cause or another. While we need to be prudent when faced with financial struggles, we also need to remember that some are less well-off than we are. The stories of the two widows should challenge us to

How can I remove the boundaries on my generosity?

This Sunday's readings introduce us to two widows who, despite their poverty, give everything they have to support others. Their actions speak to a deeper richness that goes beyond material wealth—one rooted in their identity and willingness to give.

Whether we realize it or not, we all tend to place boundaries on our generosity. We might give only what we think someone needs or offer items we no longer use rather than providing something new and chosen with care. Sometimes, we hold back, especially if we've formed assumptions—like assuming that someone on the street will misuse the money we offer.

Our giving can even be limited within the church! Understandably, not everyone feels inclined to support operational expenses like new roofs, heating, or staff wages. Yet, for St. Isidore Church to continue reaching out, both locally and globally, it requires resources and dedi-

cated people. Here, your generosity fuels meaningful efforts like the Lenten Journal, our annual Christmas newsletter, and digital tools that connect us with those we might not otherwise reach.

In a time when inflation, rising costs, and higher wages affect everything, when was the last time we reflected on how these changes impact our contributions? Are we giving out of surplus, or are we—like the widows in this Sunday's readings—giving in a way that truly reflects our commitment and trust?

This week, take a moment to consider where you place boundaries on your generosity. Knowing that our support extends beyond ourselves, how might we give more freely to strengthen our community and faith?

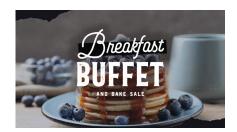

Grow Program Updates

In October, children in grades 1-6 spent time focusing on our patroness, St. Therese of Lisieux. They were amazed to hear about her life and the beautiful example of her "little way" to holiness. Children in grade two will begin preparing for the sacrament of Reconciliation in early November. Please keep them in your prayers that they may learn to love this beautiful sacrament of mercy.

Mission - Confirmation Preparation

Mission Students reflect on the Gospel reading for the upcoming week as part of their formation. For this Sunday, they were given the task of having a conversation with their families to discuss the topic, "How much is a Penny Worth?" by using the following questions and guiding principles:

- How would you describe or define the virtue of "charity?"
- In this gospel story who is most like Jesus?
- Why does Jesus praise the widow's small contribution?
- How we spend our time and our money reveals what is important to us. Looking at how you spend your money says what is important to you.
- In this passage, Jesus highlights how to give generously, trusting in God's providence.

Adult Formation Opportunities - Mark your calendar!

We are excited to be offering a ten-session study of "Lectio: Salvation New Life in Christ," with video lectures featuring Dr. Michael Barber. At every Sunday Mass, Catholics confess that Jesus came down from heaven "for us men and for our salvation." But what does "salvation" mean? Scripture scholar and theologian Michael Patrick Barber provides a thorough, deeply Catholic, and deeply biblical, answer. Based on the best-selling book, Salvation: What Every Catholic Should Know, this video study program is inspiring, engaging, and is expected to be a great discussion starter!

Classes will begin the week of January 7 and 9, 2025, and will continue through mid-March. Sessions will be offered with a choice of Tuesday mornings, from 9:30-11:00 AM, and/or Thursday Evenings, from 6:30-8:00 PM. Participants can choose whichever session best fits their schedule, even toggling between day and evening, as needed. Please know, there will be a small book fee, and registration will be required. More information to follow.

Are You Feeling Anxious?

According to the National Institute of Mental Health, anxiety is the most common mental condition in the United States. That's 40 million adults (18% of the population). Half of people with depression also experience anxiety. Add to that, people who are not normally anxious, but impacted by politics and the election, and we have lots of people who are feeling stressed. So, what can we do to help ourselves stay calm during this time?

The next time you begin to feel anxious, acknowledge you are feeling that way. Pay attention to physical cues like racing thoughts, worrying about what is going to happen, fear, tightness in your chest, or shallow breathing, and identify what is causing it. If you are able, removing yourself from that situation/person, will help.

Make a conscious effort to recognize the negative thoughts that are causing you stress and focus on the present moment. The 5-4-3-2-1 technique is a mindfulness exercise that focuses on the present moment and reduces anxiety. This exercise uses your five senses to disengage from the negativity. It includes: looking at five things you see, touching four things, listening to three things you hear, smelling two things you smell, and tasting one thing. Next time you are feeling anxious, try this exercise.

Breathing can also help with anxiety. Pay attention to your breathing. If you are breathing quickly, slow down and breathe deeply. Sit up straight and take a long breath in through your nose, hold it for the count of three, and slowly exhale while relaxing the muscles in your jaw, shoulders and abdomen. This will also slow your heart rate and lower your blood pressure.

Meditate. Pray. Research has shown praying and practicing meditation can reduce anxiety. Practice daily. If you become distracted, refocus, and continue.

Practice self-care. Do things you enjoy. This is not selfish! Reduce computer/phone usage since anxiety can creep up when scrolling on social media. Limit watching or listening to the news. Listen to music. According to a study in 2015, people with anxiety benefited from listening to music and it also lowered their blood pressure and heart rate.

Physical activity helps ease anxiety. Walking, gentle forms of exercise, stretching and strengthening exercises, such as the classes held at St. Therese, is a great way to exercise and make new friends.

Diet impacts anxiety. Eat a balanced diet, drink enough water, and limit/ avoid alcohol and caffeine. Whole grains, vegetables, and fruits help maintain an even blood sugar which helps with a calmer feeling. Since anxiety may be correlated with lower antioxidant levels, eat beans, fruits, berries, nuts, vegetables and spices, like turmeric and ginger. Additional foods that reduce anxiety

are those high in magnesium (legumes, nuts, seeds and whole grains), zinc (oysters, liver, beef, egg yolks), mega-3 fatty acids (salmon), probiotic foods (pickles, sauerkraut), asparagus, and Vitamin B (avocados and almonds).

Reach out to a family member/friend you can trust to talk about your anxiety, and if your anxiety is being fueled by world events, don't talk about it! If you have no one that you can talk with, consider talking to your priest or a counsellor.

We are all different and different things work for different people. Think about what makes you happy and do it! If you love being with a friend, call them up. If you love being with your kids or grandkids, plan an event with them. If you love being with your dog, take them out for a walk. Consider joining a social group like the Rambling Roses Seniors at St. Therese, or sharing your time and talent by joining a Church Ministry. Think about what you like to do, and do something! Focusing on others will help relieve some of the anxiety you are feeling.

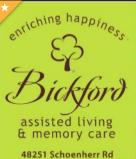
