A number of people have asked me about predictions they have heard on the internet. They tell me, "Padre Pio said..." or "Father so-and-so said..." or "Did you read X book that predicts...?" In reality, the last line of today's Gospel tells it like it is: "But of that day or hour, no one knows, neither the angels in heaven, nor the Son, but only the Father."

While we need to be observant of the signs of the times, we cannot worry about the end times because 1) no one knows when they will occur, 2) we have no control over the timing or what will happen, and3) we are called to be faithful toGod—worrying never helps.

Apocalyptic literature, which includes the Book of Daniel and the Book of Revelation, as well as certain passages, such as today's

### If you had a week to reconcile relationships, who would you reach out to first?

Without exception, we are all approaching the finish line, whether we will it or not. The inevitability of our limited time is a shared reality. Time and again, we witness beloved friends and family members pass, wishing they had stayed longer. We never have enough of them, for we love them and long to keep loving them. In many cases (perhaps more than we realize), their departure finds us in the midst of other matters and unprepared for their final farewell. But maybe they, who have departed, were ready, though we were not. This unpreparedness makes parting incredibly painfuleven excruciating, especially when we realize that we may have taken them for granted, oblivious to how close death truly was.

Now, with them suddenly gone, we wake up to the aching thought: *Oh, my God, I still had so much love to give them.* But now they're gone. And in reality, the clock ticks for us, too. Time's double-edged countdown moves forward relentlessly. Those we love will one day be gone, and so will we. Are we prepared for their departure—and for our own? Have we truly considered that our journey to eternity could happen at any moment, whether for those we cherish or for ourselves?

This reflection raises a powerful question—one that grows more intense, even a bit unsettling, though I hesitate to say frightening. The question is:

If you only had a week to reconcile relationships, who would you reach out to first?

The truth is, we don't know the day or the hour, so why wait? This truth demands our attention. We must face, live with, and embrace it; both they and we will be gone sooner or later. Our time is precious and finite. God has set a limit on their lives and ours. Being surprised by this limit without preparation would be a tragedy—not in the act of dying but in our lack of readiness for it.

Dying is brief; it's what comes next that calls for serious attention. As the book of Daniel powerfully reminds us, on the day of resurrection, "Many of those who sleep in the dust of the earth shall awake; some shall live forever, others shall be an everlasting horror and disgrace" (Daniel 12:2).



The author of Hebrews affirms that Christ died to forgive the sins of humanity (cf. Heb 10:11-14, 18). Yet, we may have our own need to forgive someone—or to seek forgiveness from someone—before either of us dies. Who might that person be? Perhaps we need to reconcile with ourselves or with God. Let us pause and ask the Holy Spirit to help us discern whom we need to forgive or seek forgiveness from. Once we know, let us also ask for the grace to reach out, simply and sincerely, and say: *Forgive me*.

### St. John Neumann, Bishop of Philadelphia

Levangelization Committee

In just eight years as Bishop of Philadelphia, he increased the number of parochial schools from two to over 100, oversaw the building of 50 new churches, and founded a preparatory seminary. He also wrote two catechisms, a bible history, and several pastoral letters.

He was born in Bohemia in 1811 and could speak eight languages and several Slavic dialects. In 1835, he immigrated to New York after completing his seminary training in Prague, and Bishop John Dubois, in 1836, ordained him into the priesthood. He was then sent on a mission to Western New York and joined the Redemptorists. He later became the Superior of all Redemptorists in the U.S. In 1852, he was named the fourth Bishop of Philadelphia. His entire life as a priest and a bishop was dedicated to the service of others. He preached frequently, heard confessions, and went on many sick calls. He died in 1860, collapsing on the street from exhaustion, and was canonized a saint in 1977 by Pope Paul VI. St. John Neumann is remembered as the patron saint of sick children and immigrants.



While John Neumann and his father thought he'd become a physician, his mother, knowing of her son's true calling, encouraged him to pursue his desire to become a priest. Today, the United States desperately needs more priests, and we, as laypeople, are now called upon to encourage young men we know to consider taking this step to serve God and the Church in our country.

#### **Grow Program Updates**

Children in grade two will begin preparing for the sacrament of Reconciliation in early November; please keep them in your prayers that they may learn to love this beautiful sacrament of mercy.

#### **Mission - Confirmation Preparation**

Our first (for the year) Mission Year-One Workshop took place on November 9, and we'll have another, for those that missed it, on November 17. The themes of identity and belonging are woven throughout our time together, and it is hoped that meaningful discussion can take place between parents and their teens.

Please keep the teens who are preparing for the celebration of Confirmation in your prayers. We know that the message of Jesus was counter-cultural in his day, and it still continues to be! The fact that these teens, and their families, are taking time out of their busy schedules to make faith a priority is a wonderful testimony for our community, and for the Church as a whole.

### Adult Formation Opportunities – Mark your calendar!

We are excited to be offering a ten-session study of "Lectio: Salvation New Life in Christ," with video lectures featuring Dr. Michael Barber. At every Sunday Mass, Catholics confess that Jesus came down from heaven "for us men and for our salvation." But what does "salvation" mean? Scripture scholar and theologian Michael Patrick Barber provides a thorough, deeply Catholic, and deeply biblical, answer. Based on the best-selling book, *Salvation: What Every Catholic Should Know*, this video study program is inspiring, engaging, and is expected to be a great discussion starter!

Classes will begin the week of January 7 and 9, 2025, and will continue through mid-March. Sessions will be offered with a choice of Tuesday mornings, from 9:30-11:00 AM, and/or Thursday Evenings, from 6:30-8:00 PM. Participants can choose whichever session best fits their schedule, even toggling between day and evening, as needed. Please know, there will be small book fee, and registration will be required. ### Dedication of the Basilicas of Sts. Peter and Paul - November 18, 2024

The whole Church celebrates the dedication of the two great Roman basilicas of St. Peter at the Vatican and of St. Paul-Outside-the-Walls. The Basilica of St. Peter stands on the site of the tomb of the Prince of the Apostles, where Nero's Circus stood. It was here that St. Peter was executed. Recent excavations have shown that the present basilica which, in the seventeenth century replaced the ancient Constantinian basilica, was built over the tomb of St. Peter, just as the previous basilica. It was consecrated by Urban VIII on November 18, 1626. St. Paul-Outside-the-Walls, situated at the other end of the city on the Ostian Way, is built near the place St. Paul was martyred. It was almost completely destroyed by fire in 1823 and was rebuilt in sumptuous fashion by Gregory XVI and Pius IX and consecrated by the latter on December 10, 1854. The celebration of the anniversary of these two dedications has been kept, nevertheless, on November 18. (CatholicCulture.org)

### How to Be Grateful at Thanksgiving While Grieving

Have you experienced a loss in the last year or two, and are still having a hard time feeling happy or even grateful? Wondering how you are going to get through the holidays because you just don't feel like celebrating? The holidays are hard for a lot of different reasons, but being with people who are happy and excited about the holidays might be something you are not sure you want to participate in this year. You might even think, "why should I be grateful when I have lost so much?"

Thanksgiving can be stressful for people who have lost a loved one, since the holidays may evoke feelings of sorrow, anger, and loss. When gathered around the Thanksgiving table, it's evident we have lost someone and the role they played in our family, be it a mother, father, spouse, or child.

So what can we do to help the people we love that are grieving the loss of their loved one? First of all, be gentle with those that are grieving. Everyone grieves differently and being there for them is one of the best things you can do. On Thanksgiving, consider acknowledging the loss of the of the loved one when saying grace before the meal, recite a poem in remembrance, cook a favorite dish, or place a picture of the deceased person on the table. Ask family members to share their favorite stories or memories of their loved one. You'll be surprised, sometimes those stories lead to laughter and joy.

If having the "traditional" Thanksgiving dinner is just too much for you to bear, do something different. Go out to a restaurant or a friend's house. Consider volunteering at a shelter, soup kitchen, hospital, nursing home, or even at an animal shelter. Not sure you want to do that? Make a donation to one of those places in your loved one's name.

Be kind to yourself. Remember you are adjusting to a "new life" without your loved one, which includes adjusting to the holiday season. Acknowledge the fact that this year, normal traditions will be different and you will need to decide which ones to keep, change, or eliminate. Accept your feelings. You might be angry your loved one is gone, feel guilty they are not here to enjoy the holidays, or just feel lonely and sad. Plan ahead and anticipate there might be triggers that cause sadness. Know your physical and emotional limitations and accept support from others. Surround yourself with comforting people that will help you

through this "new world" without your loved one.

Keep in mind, we don't need to choose between grief and gratitude during the Thanksgiving holiday. We can grieve the loss of our loved one AND be thankful for God and the blessings in our life. Grief is an individual journey and there is no time limit or set course. There will be good days and bad days. There will be times when you think you are getting better, then all of a sudden (maybe even a year or two after losing your loved one), you backslide and feel sad or teary again. We need to be patient with ourselves.

On Sunday, November 24, from 1:00 PM - 3:00 PM in the Social Hall, St. Therese of Lisieux will host a grief workshop called, "Hope for the Holidays" facilitated by Heidi Boccomino, LMSW and St. Therese of Lisieux Health Ministry Member. We hope you will join us for a healing experience.

### "Our"CIA – Monthly Update: A Warm & Joyous Welcome!

Disciples Unleashed parishioners who regularly attend Sunday Mass at either 9:30AM or 9:45AM are likely to be quite familiar with the OCIA process since these are the Masses that host the Rites of the Catechumens and Candidates each year. For the rest of us, OCIA is probably just another entry in the "alphabet soup" of our busy daily lives.

Over the coming months, we will use the bulletin to keep the faith journeys of our brothers and sisters in the OCIA process at the forefront of the thoughts and prayers of our entire Disciples Unleashed Family of Parishes community.

Today, at St. Isidore and St. Therese of Lisieux, a Rite of Acceptance & Welcome is being celebrated for 16 adults and 4 children who will either Become Catholic or complete their Catholic Sacraments at the next Easter Vigil. The significance of this Rite is perhaps best summed up in the opening prayer of the Rite of Acceptance of the Catechumens:

"My brothers and sisters, this is truly a day of joy! As we do each Sunday, today we gather in the presence of the Holy Spirit, as we give thanks and praise to God for the gift of Jesus Christ, the anointed one, to whom we offer our love, our honor, our thanks, our entire lives.

Today, we will welcome new inquirers into the catechumenate. Over the coming year, they will prepare for their initiation into the Christian faith by baptism, confirmation, and Eucharist.

You are very important in this rite, for it is the entire Church – those in this community as well as the entire Body of Christ that is beyond the walls of this place – that accepts these inquirers as persons who intend to become members."

Please keep our OCIA travelers in your prayers today, and throughout the duration of their journey; giving glory, praise and thanksgiving always to our God for the wonderous gift of His Church – alive and growing in grace!
