On this last Sunday of the Church Year, we hear a conversation between Pilate and Jesus about the nature of kingship. Pilate views kingship from a sociopolitical perspective, whereas Jesus sees kingship as deriving from truth. In other words, those who ascribe to the truth see the logic that makes Jesus king.

However, in the current day, leadership has its challenges. We have presidents and monarchs. We have those who are elected and those who ascend to their position. Regardless of how one becomes the leader of a company or a country, their leadership must stem from the truth. They must lead with honesty and integrity. Their decisions will be scrutinized and analyzed to ensure that they are fair and just. Even those who are good leaders will

### What can I do to help others recognize Jesus as King of the Universe?

In this Sunday's Gospel, while on trial before Pontius Pilate, Jesus acknowledges that he is a king—but that his kingdom is "not of this world."

In some ways, it is challenging to see Jesus as a king. Jesus warned his followers against desiring to be at the top of hierarchies. He himself was a servant, and he taught them to serve others. In this world, power is often wielded harmfully against one's enemies. In that regard, Jesus is an unkingly kind of king. He rode a donkey into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday, parodying a Roman celebration of kingship. He was also crucified and mocked as a "King."

In the preface for this Sunday's feast, Christ's kingdom is described as "a universal kingdom, a kingdom of truth and life, a kingdom of holiness and grace, a kingdom of justice, love, and peace." How can we help others recognize that Jesus Christ (and not any political leader or powerful figure) is king? We do so by living as though we are already members of that kingdom-by being coworkers with our king in building it. We work to challenge injustice, and we are loving and truthful in all that we do. We care for the entire universe and all creation. We do it by putting God's law of love above the laws of earthly "kings" and governments. We put our hope in God—not in any political leader or party. As Christ is King of the Universe, we care for creation, seeing all creatures (and creation itself) as part of our family. One day, all of creation will be renewed.

We point others to Jesus Christ the King by acknowledging that God will have the final word on all things. Every earthly empire will end. Every evil will be swallowed up. We look



forward to that day when the unkingly Christ will welcome into his kingdom those who lived as though that kingdom was already here and those whose lives pointed others to Christ.

often face opposition and criticism. Jesus, who is the way, the truth, and the life, faced opposition during his earthly lifetime and certainly faces it today. Whether or not a person accepts Jesus as King or Lord and Savior, the fact is at some point in history, all will be made manifest. On this Feast of Christ the King, we Christians acknowledge that Jesus is our King and Savior. He rules. May we, his loyal subjects, follow in his path and model our lives on truth and justice.

After asking what the church needed, Rina was given the job of calling parishioners on Wednesdays, Thursdays, and Fridays around their birthdays to ask them if they had any prayer requests. Rina says, "Ever since I have done this, people are so appreciative and they say, this is such a wonderful thing you are doing!"

A lot of times their prayers have been answered. This is very rewarding to me... Absolutely! Wow! It makes me feel wonderful."

I asked Rina what her favorite prayer was, and she replied, "I try to pray the Rosary once a day. I started this about a year ago. I read how important it is, and I am so happy I did start. I feel closer to God and have a sense of peace when doing this."

The interview continued. I asked her what her favorite saint was. "Somehow, I kept hearing things about Padre Pio. I started reading up on him and learned how he had cured so many people."

I asked Rina if she had any final words to share. "Try to get closer to God. It is very important."

Thank you, Rina for taking the time

to make someone feel special on their birthday. Something simple as a phone call reminds us that reaching out to others imitates St. Therese's little way.

### The Inspiring Stories of American Saints

St. Frances Cabrini was a saint who never slowed down. Born in Italy in 1850, she founded the Missionary Sisters of the Sacred Heart at the age of 27.

She took the name of Frances Xavier after being inspired by that great Jesuit missionary. In 1889, Pope Leo XIII told her to go to America and work there among Italian immigrants. Within a year in New York, she opened a Catholic school and founded an orphanage. Her fundraising skills soon enabled her to open her first Catholic hospital, Columbus Hospital. She got doctors to agree to donate their services and later built other Columbus hospitals in Denver, Los Angeles, Philadelphia, Seattle, New Orleans, and Chicago. She also sailed to Brazil and Argentina to expand the work of her community there. She worked tirelessly and was constantly on the move. St. Cabrini never saw obstacles as barriers but as opportunities for God's grace to work through her. She became a U.S. citizen in 1909 and died in 1917,



having founded 67 convents with 1500 missionary sisters. In 1946, she was the first American citizen to be canonized as a saint.

Pope Pius XII said she achieved all this through a vibrant faith, divine love, and constant prayers that closely united her with God. May we each achieve sainthood by following her example of uniting our hearts with God and never ceasing to listen to and act on his call.

Our society provides them with countless distractions every day, and the fact that they are taking the time out of their busy schedules to make faith a priority is a wonderful testimony for our community and the Church as a whole.

### Adult Formation Opportunities – Mark your calendar!

We are excited to be offering a ten-session study of "Lectio: Salvation New Life in Christ," with video lectures featuring Dr. Michael Barber. At every Sunday Mass, Catholics confess that Jesus came down from heaven "for us men and for our salvation." But what does "salvation" mean? Scripture scholar and theologian Michael Patrick Barber provides a thorough, deeply Catholic, and deeply biblical answer. ### Health and Nutrition Strategies for the Holiday Season

Can you believe the holiday season is fast approaching? I don't know if it is just me, but it seems odd that Christmas advertisements and decorations appear the day after Halloween. Although I realize this is done to maximize holiday season retail. this is all the more reason to slow down. *be present in the* moment, and enjoy each day and each season to the fullest. Take time to pray each day and to practice gratitude for all of your blessings. Participating in Eucharistic Adoration at St. Therese on Thursdays is a good opportunity to pray, meditate, talk with God, and be quiet. Taking time from the "busyness" of our everyday lives will calm your mind and give you a sense of peace. Take time to enjoy each day with the people you love, and make a conscious effort to take care of your mental and physical health.

Taking care of your physical health during the holiday season can be a challenge. Not only does the cold weather deter us from walking outside and partaking in other activities, but we also tend to snuggle in our houses and not exercise as we do in nice weather. Make a conscious effort to maintain some type of exercise in the cold months, be it working out at a gym, participating in the St. Therese Stretch and Strength classes, walking at a mall or store, or just stretching or exercising at home. During the holiday season, it's hard to resist all of our favorite foods and treats at friend and family gatherings, but if you follow some tips, you will enjoy healthy nutrition and maintain your weight:

- Eat breakfast: Studies show people who eat breakfast take in fewer calories during the day.
- Plate it: Putting food on a plate rather than grazing at a holiday party helps you be more mindful of what and how much you eat.
- **Portion control:** Grab a smaller plate to help you resist the temptation to eat more than you need.
- Try new foods and drinks: Many "new" foods and snacks are available that are healthier than our old "standbys." Get in the habit of reading labels before you buy food, and choose them wisely.
- Drink lots of water and avoid caloric drinks.
- Start with veggies: Eat a few healthy vegetables first to curb your appetite.
- **Choose proteins:** Nuts, low-fat dairy, legumes, and lean meat in healthy portions will help you feel full.
- Skip it: If you don't love it, don't eat it!
- Slow down: It takes your brain time to receive the signal that you are full, so slow down and enjoy each bite.

- Wait before eating "seconds:" If you wait 10 minutes, you'll feel fuller, and the temptation for seconds will pass.
- **Focus on a few bites:** The first bites are the most satisfying, so enjoy and savor them without thinking you need to eat everything on your plate.
- Be a little brave: Experiment with new flavors and seasonings; you might find some new healthy traditions.
- Share your good health and
  eating habits with others: If
  you are trying to eat better and
  maintain a healthier lifestyle,
  chances are your family and
  friends are also trying to do the
  same. If you are preparing dinner
  or hosting a party, put some
  time and effort into selecting
  and preparing "healthier" foods.
  This includes more protein and
  less carbohydrates and fat. Avoid
  fried foods, substitute sweets
  and desserts with fruit, and avoid
  foods loaded with calories.
