What gifts do you give to the Christ Child? Probably not gold, frankincense, or myrrh; Jesus does not need any of those things. In fact, Jesus does not need anything from us. However, he does want us to give him our hearts, minds, and souls. This past Advent, we were asked to spend less and give more so that we could love all and thereby worship God more fully. Now, on the Feast of the Epiphany, we are invited to offer ourselves to the Lord and then share the Good News of salvation with the world, as the Magi did. How will you make Christ present this new year? What will you do differently in 2025 to be a light to the nations by sharing your gifts and talents as an act of worship to God? We are stewards of God's grace and mercy. How will we manifest our stewardship this year?

What does it mean to see Christ in the face of others?

The celebration of the Epiphany highlights a profound revelation: Christ came not only for the Jews but for all people, as shown by the visit of the Magi in Matthew 2:1-12. The Magi—outsiders and strangers from distant lands—were led to the Christ child by a star, representing the universal reach of God's love. This moment invites us to see beyond the familiar and recognize the presence of Christ in every person, regardless of background or identity.


It is easy to see the face of Christ in the kind stranger, such as the generous grocery store employee who gives you credit for your recently expired coupon. The real challenge comes when we consider the irritating or threatening stranger-the one who doesn't deserve our kindness. Is it a fellow shopper who gives you a dirty look or recklessly cuts you off in traffic? The "foreigner" who may or may not have a green card? Someone with a different skin color or religion? Perhaps this "stranger" is even a friend or family member who was estranged due to differing political or world views.

What was more important for Christ: rules or relationships?

We are faced with daily opportunities (and challenges) to grow in relational maturity by choosing to recognize Christ in everyone. We are here to help and support one another—even the crabby, irritating strangers who threaten our peace. These difficult encounters can be embraced as training for us to become the best versions of ourselves: the people God created us to be. The best way we can achieve this goal is by setting a good example in our responses and interactions with all strangers.

The Magi were probably not all from the same country, and maybe some had even been enemies. Yet, their journey teaches us that Christ is not restrained by boundaries; He is revealed to all who seek Him. This universal call requires us to look beyond superficial differences and recognize Christ's image in the faces of those we may not initially understand or appreciate.

To see Christ in strangers is to see with the eyes of compassion, freely offering hospitality and love, just as the Magi did by bringing gifts to the child King. In addition, it is to live out this inclusion, opening ourselves to the radical hospitality that Christ demonstrated. If only we could all



take a breath in prayer and seize every opportunity as a gift to share the richness of His grace with others.

As Victor Hugo's line from *Les Misérables* so powerfully captures, "To love another person is to see the face of God." Loving and welcoming the stranger allows us to encounter the divine. Just as the Magi's journey deepened their faith, seeing Christ in those who are different, unfamiliar, and challenging can transform our own hearts and expand our understanding of God's love.




The 2024/2025 Disciples Unleashed Family of Parishes OCIA journey is starting to hit high gear!

DISCIPLESHIP FORMATION

Adult Bible Study Starting Soon!

It isn't too late to register for our first class! If you haven't registered yet, you can still drop in. We'll make arrangements for your book right away.

Starting Jan. 7 and 9, we will be offering a tensession study of "Lectio: Salvation New Life in Christ," with video lectures featuring Dr. Michael Barber. Sessions will be offered with a choice of Tuesday mornings, from 9:30 to 11 AM, and/or Thursday evenings, from 6:30 to 8 PM. Participants can choose whichever session best fits their schedule, even toggling between mornings and evenings, as needed. In class, we'll discuss the fact that Catholics confess that Jesus came down from heaven "for us men and for our salvation" at every Mass, yet we don't always have a clear understanding of what "salvation" really means. In this video-guided study, scripture scholar and theologian Michael Patrick Barber provides a thorough, deeply Catholic, and deeply biblical answer. Based on the best-selling book, *Salvation: What Every Catholic Should Know*, this program is inspiring, engaging, and is expected to be a great discussion starter! Home Blessing

One tradition in the Catholic Church is to bless chalk at the Epiphany Masses and then use the blessed chalk to bless one's home in the New Year. Even if you don't have chalk from church, you can still bless your house.

The home blessing can be done as follows: Using chalk, mark the current year and the initials of the Magi above the outside doorways of your home. Place a cross between each of the letters like this: 20+C+M+B+XX (XX = last two digits of current year). Then, pray the following prayer: May all who come to our home this year rejoice to find Christ living among us, and may we seek and serve Jesus by finding him in everyone we meet. We pray this prayer in the name of Jesus, who is Lord of all people, forever and ever. Amen.

The legendary names of the three Maji are Casper, Melchior, and Balthasar. The initials C+M+B stand for three Latin words: Christus Mansionem Benedicat, which means "May Christ bless this dwelling." If possible, the markings over the doors should be left all year.

Fall Prevention

Marilyn Cito marilyn@stol.church Did you know that one in four older Americans falls every year? Falls are the leading cause of both fatal **and** nonfatal injuries for people aged 65+. Falls can result in hip fractures, broken bones, and head injuries. Even falls without a major injury can cause older adults to become fearful or depressed, making it difficult for them to stay active.

If you are a senior or have an aging parent, grandparent, or friend, helping reduce the risk of falling is a great way to stay healthy and independent for as long as possible. The good news about falls is that most of them can be prevented; the key is knowing where to look. Here are some common factors that can lead to a fall:

- Balance and gait: With age, most people lose some coordination, flexibility, and balance (primarily through inactivity), which makes it easier to fall.
- Vision: In the aging eye, less light reaches the retina, making contrasting edges, tripping hazards, and obstacles harder to see.
- Medications: Some prescription and over-the-counter medicines can cause dizziness, dehydration, or interactions with other medications, which can lead to falls.

- **Environment:** Most seniors have lived in their homes for a long time and have never thought about simple modifications that might keep them safe as they age.
- Chronic conditions: More than 80% of older adults have at least one chronic condition like diabetes, stroke, or arthritis.
 Often, these conditions increase the risk of falling because they result in lost function, inactivity, depression, pain, or multiple medications.

St. Therese of Lisieux will host an 8-week fall prevention workshop series, "A Matter of Balance," presented by AgeWays (formerly Area Agency of Aging 1-b), on Wednesdays from Jan. 22 through Mar. 12 at 1 to 3 PM in Overflow Room 10. This award-winning program is designed to manage falls and increase activity levels. The classes will also cover how to make changes to reduce fall risks at home and how to exercise to increase strength and balance. They are free, but donations will be accepted.
