As we embark on a new Church year, the readings sound similar to what we have been hearing for the past few weeks. In today's passage from Luke's Gospel, we listen to another piece of apocalyptic literature which challenges us to "be vigilant at all times and pray." This is good advice as we begin a new year. Too often we become complacent and we sometimes grow slack in our duty as Christians. But at the start of the Advent season, it is important for us to be open to hearing the voice of the Lord which means being vigilant and observant of the world around us.

What do we see happening? What is God trying to tell us? What signs and signals is the Lord sending to us? Often times, these are subtle but have great importance for

### How can I spend less to please God?

Thessalonians 3:12-13: "and may the Lord make you increase and abound in love for one another and for all, just as we have for you, so as to strengthen your hearts, to be blameless in holiness before God...."

As we enter the holiday season of Christmas parties, shopping, and gift-giving, we begin the wonderful cycle of retail discounts. These shopping blowout sales provide benefits for retailers and consumers alike. Retailers enjoy revenue boosts, while consumers find deals on products that might be considered beyond their budget. We have all seen news stories of people lining up for days to wait for Black Friday deals. These stories always include unfortunate videos of people stampeding over each other to obtain these markeddown gifts; they reflect not only a consumer-driven culture but also raise deep questions regarding the value we place on material goods and the pressures to chase the deal. The increased focus on deals fosters a sense of urgency that can lead us away from the real reason for the season and toward impulsive purchases that may cause financial stress.

In today's readings, we find an alternate call to urgently strengthen our love and commitment to God and each other. St. Paul, in our second reading, prays for an increase in love among the community, urging people to grow in holiness as they prepare for the coming of Christ. Jesus' message in the Gospel reminds us that life can be full of distractions, anxieties, and temptations that cloud our focus on what truly matters. Jesus urges us to stay awake, be vigilant in faith, and keep our hearts oriented toward God; after all, life on earth is temporary. Our true and permanent home is in the kingdom of God. These passages offer us a time to reflect on where our urgency is in life, encouraging us to increase and abound in love for all.

Our first Advent Connecting Point asks, "How can I 'spend less' to please God?" It challenges us to spend less on ourselves so that we might increase for God and others. What does it mean to "spend less?" It doesn't just refer to financial spending. Spending less means making conscious choices to limit what we invest in material things. our comforts, and even our own selfinterests so we can make space for God and others. Spending less frees us to grow in love and use our time and resources for things that bring us closer to God and help us



love others more generously. When we are centered on God, we are less likely to be overwhelmed by anxiety or caught up in marketing distractions.

Advent is a perfect time to reflect on how we spend our resources, energy, and hearts. As we prepare to celebrate Christ's arrival, we are invited to focus not on what we can gain but on what we can give! Jesus came not to be served but to *serve*, teaching us that love often means making sacrifices, putting others before ourselves, and spending less on our wants so we can give more to others.



#### Adult Bible Study

If you were intimidated by our recent study of the book of Revelation, this user-friendly bible study might be for you! If you struggle to find words when the person knocking at your door asks if you are "saved," this study might be for you! If you want a study, where you can learn what the Church has to say about, essentially, the most important topic for all Christians, this study is, most definitely, for you!

Starting January 7 and 9, 2025, we will be offering a ten-session study of "Lectio: Salvation New Life in Christ," with video lectures featuring Dr. Michael Barber. Sessions will be offered with a choice of Tuesday mornings, from 9:30-11:00 AM, and/ or Thursday Evenings, from 6:30-8:00 PM. Participants can choose whichever session best fits their schedule, even toggling between day and evening, as needed.

In class, we'll discuss the fact that Catholics confess that Jesus came down from heaven "for us men and for our salvation" at every Mass, yet we don't always have a clear understanding of what "salvation" really means. In this video guided study, scripture scholar and theologian Michael Patrick Barber provides a thorough, deeply Catholic, and deeply biblical, answer. Based on the best-selling book, Salvation: What Every Catholic Should Know, this program is inspiring, engaging, and is expected to be a great discussion starter!

#### **Advent Wreath Prayers**

The tradition of lighting candles on an Advent Wreath is one that goes back centuries. Just like an Advent calendar, this tradition is a great way to make the days of waiting, before Christmas, more meaningful. There's no need to buy anything expensive. Any four (or five) candles will do! You have a head start if you have three purple candles and one pink, but you could use all white candles, tying purple and pink ribbons around their bases instead. If you don't have ribbon, you could place each base on a square of colored paper, use acrylic paint to paint a stripe around the lower portion of the candle, or get creative in marking the colors of advent on them in another way. The, optional, fifth candle is placed in the center of the arrangement. It is a special candle that you'll light on Christmas morning. Many families use a white candle that they keep white, but you can use something

else, as well. Have fun with it! Then, once you have the candles, place them around a plain, green wreath, with the Christmas candle in the center. If you don't have a wreath, consider placing them in a row, in the order of purple, purple, pink, and purple, with some evergreen or pine branches from your yard at the base. Honestly, you can get as simple, or as elaborate as you'd like. This tradition can end up providing you with a lovely centerpiece for your Christmas table, AND with a deeper celebration of the season.

This week, consider adding the Advent Wreath tradition to your meal prayer at dinner each night. If that's too much, maybe just on Sunday. Whatever works for you is a step toward deeper meaning. Here's how... While you light the first, purple, candle you could pray using these words:

Heavenly Father, Help me (us) to take time this week to focus on the fact that Christmas isn't about more presents; it's about God's presence. Help me (us) to spend less on the things that don't last, and to give more of myself (ourselves), using what I (we) save to love others, especially the hungry, the lonely, and the hurting. This Advent, help me (us) live out my (our) faith more fully. (Follow with meal prayer, if fitting.) –Amen!






