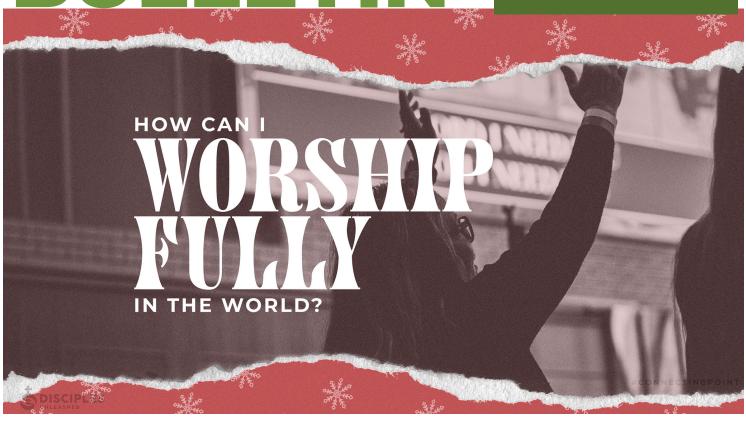

MUSINGS + MESSAGES

On this fourth Sunday of Advent, we near the end of the Advent season. The readings recall how God visits his people. In the passage from Micah, the people of Israel are reminded that the Messiah will come from the least significant of the tribes, Bethlehem. Yet, he will shepherd all of Israel and "be

peace."

This is what the Messiah does; he rules, saves, and is peace for the people. Just as Christ came to do the Father's will, so, too, should we do the will of Christ by following his commands. The second reading is Eucharistic, reminding us that the

sacrifice of the body and blood of Jesus Christ consecrates us to God. In the Gospel, we hear a snippet from the visitation, in which Mary (and the fetal Jesus) visit Elizabeth, bringing the presence of God and evoking a prophetic response. When God visits us in the form of others, what is our response? Do we rejoice

How will I worship fully in the world?

This is a very relevant question for the last week of Advent, which will usher in the incredible feast of Christmas. This Church season calls us to find ways to make the hectic holy because we know the hectic ain't goin' away—even after Christmas is celebrated! So. let us give some serious thought as to how we can continue worshiping our loving God beyond church services.

We Catholics have many rituals and rich symbols that support us on our life journeys and draw us into the heart of God. The Mass is at the center of our worship, during which we receive the Eucharist, the source and summit of our Christian lives.

At the end of every Mass, the congregation is sent forth with the command to "Go and announce the Gospel of the Lord" or "Go in peace, glorifying the Lord by your life." This is how we can worship fully in the world. It *sounds* simple, but that does not mean it is easy. Each one of us goes out into "our world" with our personality, gifts, and talents to share the Good News with others and all of creation.

How we do that is entirely up to each unique person, but I would like to suggest that awareness of God's presence when we go out the church doors is a good practice. It takes discipline and creativity. The familiar words attributed to St. Francis of Assisi come to mind: "Preach the Gospel and, when necessary, use words." That means we can preach the Gospel by praying for others. For instance, when at a red light, perhaps you could whisper a prayer for all the motorists around you, asking God that they have a blessed day. How about adopting the attitude of gratitude? When walking down the street, notice the trees and birds and thank God for all of creation. Keep trying to hone your awareness of God as continual worship.

Another suggestion is to give God glory by your example. A smile, kind word, or kind deed is a good way to practice God's presence and remind others that God cares for them. Thus, with practice and creativity, you may notice that you are responding to God's love with all of your heart, soul, mind, and strength. Is that not worshiping fully?



The Gospel for the fourth Sunday of Advent this year begins with Mary leaving home to help her cousin, Elizabeth: "Mary set out in haste to the hill country..." Each time we leave God's house to enter the temple of God's world, let us imitate Mary, going "in haste" to do so.

During this Advent, let us ask Mary, who brought Jesus into the world, to give us the mindfulness to carry Jesus into "our world" in ways that we cannot even ask for or imagine.

Managing Stress During the Holidays

Although most everyone loves the holiday season, it can also be a time of stress. There never seems to be enough time to get everything done. Decorating, shopping, baking, cooking, wrapping presents, parties, and visiting with families and friends can make this wonderful time of the year overwhelming. Saying "yes" to every request can sometimes result in feeling exhausted. This holiday season, make a commitment to set some boundaries and "savor each moment." Here are a few tips for trying to achieve that:

- Take care of yourself! This means something different to each of us:
 - Spend time alone. Pray.
 Meditate.
 - Enjoy the wonderful church celebrations/activities and Masses. They are beautiful and heartwarming.
 - Get enough sleep.
 - Practice gratitude.
 - Take time to relax and not over extend yourself.
 - Pamper yourself "a little."
 Take a lingering bath, get a manicure or hair done, listen to music, read. Do what YOU enjoy doing!
 - Practice self-control with eating and drinking and plan accordingly when going to parties, family gatherings, and other holiday events.
 - Don't forget to exercise!
- Give yourself permission to say "no." This includes parties, gift giving, baking cookies, or decorating your house. Just because you have always "done

- it that way," doesn't mean you need to keep doing it! Ask yourself if it is "value added" and if it is, then it's fine to continue doing it.
- Ask others to help. I know most of us don't like to ask for help when hosting an event or preparing for the holidays, but maybe you could reconsider? Asking people to bring a dish to pass at a party or inviting family or friends to trim your tree will alleviate some stressful details of the holiday and can be fun! Start a new tradition of baking with your friends or family. It is a great way to pass on those precious family recipes to our loved ones. Make a day of decorating the tree and house with family. Another great tradition!
- Look for opportunities to do holiday preparation a little easier. This might include purchasing part of a holiday meal from a store, ordering groceries or gifts online instead of going to the store and standing in the long lines. Instead of baking all of those desserts for Christmas, consider buying a few fancy ones at the bakery?
- Keep the conversations, light and fun. Take the opportunity to reminisce about "past holidays." This is a great time to share videos/pictures from prior years! Stay clear of politics and stressful events of the year. If people get into disagreements about politically charged discussions, steer the conversation into something "lighter."

- Ask family and friends to
 "refrain" from talking and
 texting on the phone during
 family gatherings. Decorate a
 basket and ask everyone to put
 their phones in the basket. This
 is a great opportunity for them
 to "disconnect" for a few hours,
 be "present in the moment" and
 enjoy their time with their loved
 ones.
- Know your limitations. If something feels like it's "too much," re-evaluate whether you need to continue with that activity. This could include family gatherings, staying out late, shopping, or just "doing too much!" No one will think less of you if you let them know you need to just take a "breather."
- Share the holiday with someone who could use your help or who is alone. This could include calling or visiting someone who is alone or the caregiver of someone, delivering a meal to their home, or dropping off a little gift to them. This also could include spending a couple of hours sitting with a person for a caregiver, so they have some time for themselves.

In the end, it is up to each of us to make the holidays what we want them to be. It is our responsibility to set limitations on ourselves so that we have time to think about the "real meaning" of Christmas and God. It is a wonderful opportunity to reflect and thank God for all of our blessings and to share that spirit with our loved ones.

Consecration to the Holy Family

The Sunday between Christmas and New Year's Day, Dec. 29, is dedicated to the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. On this Sunday, families are asked to consecrate themselves to the Holy Family. To help families live out the joy of Christ, Knights of Columbus Supreme Chaplain Archbishop William Lori has composed a prayer through which families can come together to consecrate themselves under the protection of the Holy Family. In this prayer, we ask for the aid (or intercession) of the perfect son, Jesus Christ, Mary, the perfect mother, and Joseph, a role model for every father. Preparing for the Consecration to the Holy Family is not a single event. It is choosing a way of life for your family. Through this consecration, each participant is consciously choosing to be a beacon of God's love through the Church.

On Saturday, Dec. 28, and Sunday, Dec. 29, the Knights of Columbus will be in the Gathering Space after every Mass, passing out "Family Fully Alive" books and "Consecration to the Holy Family" prayer cards to every family. The books contain meditations, scripture readings, and a family project for each month of the year, which is one way to help you choose a way of life for your family. The prayer cards contain Archbishop Lori's prayer that each family can use to consecrate themselves to the Holy Family. This prayer will be shown on the screens before Mass begins so that you may pray it with your family. Please make sure to get a copy of the book and the prayer card after Mass for your use at home.
