Today's Gospel reading is the classic vocation scriptural text: "From now on, you will be catching men." But notice who Jesus chooses: Peter, who, by his own admission, is a "sinful man." This is a key point in the Scriptures: God does not choose the qualified; God qualifies those whom he chooses. In other words, God gives us the tools

needed to do our jobs or vocations.

An ancient dictum in sacramental theology is that the efficacy of the sacrament does not depend on the holiness of the minister. In other words, God works through imperfect people to dispense his grace and mercy. As long as the priest, deacon, or bishop intends

to do what the Church intends, the sacrament is valid, even if the minister is not in a perfect state of grace at the time he confects the sacrament. Oftentimes, people ask me, "Father, the priest who married us left the priesthood. Are we still married?" Yes, of course you are. Besides, the ministers of the sacrament of marriage are the

Whose voice do I trust?

Simon Peter's act of trust in Jesus. despite his doubts, teaches us an important lesson about which voices we choose to acknowledge in our own lives. In Luke's Gospel this weekend, Simon had every reason to doubt Jesus' instruction to lower the nets again. He was an experienced fisherman who had already tried and failed all night. He was likely exhausted and discouraged. Yet, instead of listening to the voice of doubt that said, "You're not good enough," or the voice of despair that whispered, "Just give up," he chose to listen to the voice of Jesus. His willingness to obey led to an overwhelming, miraculous catchmore than he ever imagined possible.

Like Simon, we are surrounded by many voices every day. Some voices—those that try to pull us away from God's path—discourage us, saying, "It's too late to change" or "Everyone else is doing it." These voices can be loud and convincing, especially when we feel weary, unworthy, or trapped by past mistakes. However, Jesus calls us to trust Him, even when His direction seems difficult or when we feel unqualified. He speaks to our hearts, telling us, "You've got this," "I have a plan for you," and "You're stronger than you think." His voice reminds us that we are not alone—that He is leading us toward something greater.

In the first reading, the prophet Isaiah also faced a moment of doubt. He encountered the glory of God and felt unworthy, saying, "Woe is me! I am a man of unclean lips." But the voice of the Lord called him beyond his fear, cleansing and strengthening him for his mission. Isaiah did not hesitate when God asked, "Whom shall I send?" Instead, he answered, "Here I am. Send me!" Like Simon,



Isaiah had to silence the voices of inadequacy and fear to respond to God's call.

Jesus calls each of us to trust
Him, even when we feel weak or
uncertain. The world's voices may
try to convince us otherwise, but His
voice is the one that leads to life,
hope, and abundance. May we learn
to recognize and trust the voice of
Jesus in our hearts, knowing that He
will never lead us astray.

couple; the priest or deacon is the witness for the Church. However, if a couple did not intend to fulfill the contract of marriage or entered into it with a canonical impediment of some kind, that may be grounds for

an annulment.

The main point of this week's scripture is that God works with imperfection in order to render it perfect. He works with us to make

us holy and whole, provided that we cooperate with him. Even though we may be sinful, God wants us to be with him for all eternity. Therefore, we can rejoice and say with Isaiah, "Here I am; send me."

Why should you come?




all of whom are part of our Family of Parishes Evangelical Charity team. Another special thanks to Cathy Dyke and the Bountiful Bakers of St.

February is Heart Awareness Month

The perfect gift this Valentine's Day is heart health. Along with Valentine's Day, February marks American Heart Month, a great time to commit to a healthy lifestyle and make small changes that can lead to a lifetime of heart health. Did you know heart disease is the leading cause of death in the U.S., with men comprising more than half of these fatalities? 610,000 Americans die from heart disease every year (one in four deaths). Every 42 seconds, someone has a heart attack, and every minute, someone dies from a heart-diseaserelated event. And heart disease is costly. \$207 billion is spent each year on heart disease, including health care services, medications, and lost productivity.

Obesity contributes to five of the ten leading causes of death in the U.S., including heart disease, type 2 diabetes, cancer, stroke, and kidney disease. Medical conditions and lifestyle choices that put people at higher risk for heart disease include diabetes, being overweight, poor diet, physical inactivity, and excessive alcohol use. Almost 50% of Americans have at least one of three key risk factors for heart disease, namely high blood pressure, high cholesterol, and smoking. But there are things each of us can do to make a positive impact on our heart health.

- Get regular check-ups
- Know your blood pressure and cholesterol numbers.
- Follow your doctor's recommendations for diet and exercise
- Take your medications as prescribed.
- If you smoke, quit now. Smoking harms heart and blood vessels, raises blood pressure, and lowers the amount of oxygen carried by the blood.
- Get at least 30 minutes of moderate physical activity each day (150 minutes weekly). It is also recommended that musclestrengthening activities be included two days each week.
- Eat a heart-healthy diet, including fruits and vegetables, whole-grain foods, and fish.
- Watch your weight. Excess body fat is linked to conditions that increase your risk of heart disease.
- If you have diabetes, control your blood sugar.
- Limit foods high in saturated fats and dietary cholesterol.
- Limit your salt intake to 2300mg of sodium each day.
- If you drink alcoholic beverages, limit them. Women should have no more than one drink per day, and men should have no more than two.
- Have a positive outlook on life.

Johns Hopkins researchers have surmised that people with a positive outlook may have more natural protection from the damaging effects of stress. Prolonged stress can negatively impact the immune system. Improving your worldview will benefit your heart.

▶ A Pastoral Note to Migrants from the Catholic Bishops in Michigan

Dear Brothers and Sisters in Christ,

We, the Roman Catholic Bishops in Michigan, write to offer our continued pastoral and prayerful support for migrant individuals and families who over the course of time have entered the country and today are making a living in this state. Our fraternal closeness to you and other immigrants, refugees, and those seeking humanitarian asylum is rooted in the Gospel of Jesus Christ, where we find "I was thirsty and you gave me drink, a stranger and you welcomed me... Whatever you did for one of these least brothers of mine. you did for me" (Matthew 25:35,40).

We hear and empathize with families across the state who express anxiety and fear over mass deportations and harmful rhetoric that broadly demeans our immigrant brothers and sisters. As shepherds of our flocks, we pledge amid such uncertainty to promote through the Michigan Catholic Conference and in our respective dioceses unyielding support and respect for the human dignity of all migrant people in our midst.

We urge our elected officials to support policies that keep immigrant and undocumented families safe and united, and to protect those who arrived as children. We call on the Michigan congressional delegation to work for a humane immigration system that welcomes refugees and immigrants by providing a fair pathway to citizenship; one that also keeps borders safe and secure from criminal activity, including human trafficking and the smuggling of illegal drugs.

Mindful of the dire conditions from which many travel, oftentimes with children through great difficulty and despair, we encourage you, our migrant brothers and sisters, to be strengthened by our Lord's words "Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you... Do not let your hearts be troubled or afraid" (John 14:27). Never fail to keep your faith and hope in our Lord Jesus Christ, who promises a divine kingdom that we strive to inherit and together call our true home.

With abundant love and trust, we ask Our Lady of Guadalupe to hear the cries of the suffering and offer to her maternal compassion and protection all who seek her heavenly intercession.

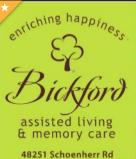


