

How can I find the good in people I may not like?

Today's Gospel should make us uncomfortable because Jesus challenges us to love those whom we ordinarily would *not* love. He invites us to reflect on how we live out God's commands. If we only do good to those we like, we're missing the point. It is easy to love those whom we like, even if they annoy us at times. We can forgive them. But what about those we dislike? How do we treat them?

Jesus' words cause us to consider how we treat those who oppose our way of thinking—those who are not affiliated with us politically, socially, theologically, culturally, or ideologically. Too often, we view those who are not like us as "the enemy." Perhaps they even view us in the same way. However, when we begin to see those with differing viewpoints as just that—different rather than evil, perhaps dialogue can begin.

How can I see the good in people I may not like?

Let's admit it: We all have people in our lives whom we do not like, and there are people who don't like us. "Liking" is an emotion, and we don't have much control over our emotions. We cannot simply decide to like somebody. However, we *can* decide to find the good in those we may not like. We can decide to love them in spite of "not liking" them.

In our first reading this Sunday, David has an opportunity to kill King Saul, who has led an army of one thousand soldiers out to find David and kill him. (It seems that they **really** do not like each other!) But David, who respects Saul as "God's Anointed," refuses to harm him. He finds the inherent good in Saul.

We are all anointed by God, and God has made it so that there is inherent good in every one of us. We must look beyond our "dislikes" and find the good—even in our enemies. The word "respect" comes from the same root as "spectacles," meaning we respect, or see, the inherent good in everyone. I have inherited my father's dislike for arrogant people. Arrogance really turns me off. So, I really struggle at times to look beyond the arrogance and find the inherent good that God has placed in self-centered people. I pray for them. I try to spend energy and time on them. The better I get to know them, the better I am able to see the good in people I may not like. It is a challenge. It takes effort. I often fail. But I try; Jesus told me to!

Fish Fry Delivery for the Homebound



The last paragraph of the Gospel is especially telling: "Stop judging, and you will not be judged. Stop condemning, and you will not be condemned. Forgive, and you will be forgiven. Give, and gifts will be given to you; a good measure, packed together, shaken down, and overflowing, will be poured into your lap. For the measure with which you measure will in return be measured out to you."



Jubilee of Hope 2025 in the Archdiocese of Detroit (Part 4 of 5)

Some people may wonder why the Holy Father named this Jubilee year one of hope. Hope is a simple word, but it often defies an easy definition. It is both a common expression (like "I hope it doesn't rain tomorrow") and a theological virtue that "we desire, and with steadfast trust await from God, eternal life and the graces to merit it" (CCC 1843).

The words Pope Francis chose for this theme are "Hope Does Not Disappoint." Everyone has hope, but it may be dimmed by sadness, sin, or broken dreams and buried by fear or worry. Some may have little or no hope left and are afraid to trust God again. This year of hope is an opportunity for us to demonstrate our hope and, through our prayers and sacrifices, proclaim this faith to the world around us, which is so hungry for it.

In the words of Pope Francis, "Christian hope fills us with serenity when our hearts are burdened by sin and failure. It makes us dream of a new humanity and gives us courage in our efforts to build a fraternal and peaceful world, even when it seems barely worth the effort. Such is hope, the gift that the Lord bestowed on us in Baptism" (Homily, May 9, 2024).



Welcoming Our New Archbishop


With great joy, we welcome Archbishop-elect Edward J. Weisenburger as the sixth Archbishop of Detroit! Appointed by Pope Francis, he succeeds Archbishop Allen H. Vigneron, who has faithfully served our archdiocese since 2009. Archbishop-elect Weisenburger will be installed on March 18 at the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament.

Archbishop-elect Weisenburger, 64, comes to us from the Diocese of Tucson, Arizona, where he has served as bishop since 2017. Originally from Oklahoma, he was ordained a priest in 1987 and later earned a Licentiate in Canon Law. Over the years, he has served in many leadership roles, including vice chancellor, vicar general, and bishop of Salina, Kansas. His episcopal motto, "Behold the Lamb of God," reflects his deep faith and commitment to guiding the Church. In his message to the faithful of Detroit, he shared, "I am humbled to be called to serve such a noble Church, known for its rich history, vibrant ministries, and dedicated clergy and laity." Archbishop Vigneron also extended a warm welcome, saying, "On behalf of all the people of God in the Archdiocese of Detroit, I extend to Archbishop Weisenburger a heartfelt welcome to his new home."

As we prepare to embrace our new shepherd, let us keep Archbishopelect Weisenburger in our prayers. May the Holy Spirit guide him as he leads our archdiocese into the future, continuing the mission of evangelization and service to Christ.

We also extend our gratitude to Archbishop Vigneron for his years of faithful leadership and ask for God's blessings upon him in his retirement. Let us join together in prayer and celebration as we welcome Archbishop-elect Weisenburger to Detroit!
