# CONNECTING POINT

In the Gospel, Jesus reminds us, "From the fullness of the heart the mouth speaks." This powerful truth challenges us to consider how our words affect others. Every word we speak, text, or post has the potential to lift someone up or tear them down. What we say reflects what's in our hearts, and that makes

it important to ask, "What's filling my heart?"

Jesus also warns us, "Why do you notice the splinter in your brother's eye, but do not perceive the wooden beam in your own eye?" This question reminds us to reflect on our own hearts and actions before we speak words of correction or criticism. If we fail to address the "wooden beams" in our own lives, our words may come across as hypocritical or hurtful rather than helpful.

When our hearts are filled with love, gratitude, and kindness, our words

naturally mirror those qualities. We are called to use our words to encourage, comfort, and inspire the people around us. In contrast, when anger, jealousy, or pride take hold of our hearts, negativity unavoidably seeps into our speech. Harsh words can wound deeply, often leaving a greater impact than we realize. Whether spoken directly, shared on social media, or sent in a text message, our words have the power to leave lasting impressions—both positive and negative.

Think about the words we share online. Social media gives us the power to reach many people with just a few clicks. Are we using this power responsibly? Do our posts spread positivity, or do they stir division and hurt? Likewise, in texts

and other electronic messages, it's easy to be careless or impatient, especially when we're stressed, but the impact of our words remains the same.

Jesus invites us to examine our hearts because that's where change begins. If our words have been unkind or thoughtless, it's a chance to ask God to transform our hearts. When we fill ourselves with His love, patience, and mercy, our words will naturally reflect His light.

This week, let's pause before we speak, text, or post. Are my words kind? Do they lift others up?
By being mindful of our words' impact, we can bring more love and encouragement into the world—one word at a time.

What a day for the OCIA (Order of Christian Initiation of Adults) at the Disciples Unleashed Family of Parishes. Today at the 9:30 AM & 9:45 AM Masses (at St. Isidore and St. Therese of Lisieux respectively) we celebrate the Rite of Sending! Our faith community gives a prayerful and loving sendoff to the 11 Catechumens who are heading down to the Cathedral of the Most Blessed Sacrament next Saturday to participate in the Rite of Election marking the beginning of the next leg of their journey to the Sacraments of Initiation; the Period of Purification and Enlightenment.



The Knights have been selling raffle tickets based on the 3-digit daily lottery since December of 2024. ## Managing Your Blood Pressure

In order to maintain good heart health, it is important for you to know your blood pressure measurements. You may ask, "what do blood pressure measurements mean?" Blood pressure is the force of blood pushing against blood vessel walls of our bodies. Blood pressure is written as two numbers. The top (systolic) number is the pressure when the heart beats. The bottom (diastolic) number is the pressure when the heart rests between beats. Normal blood pressure is below 120/80 mmHg.

High blood pressure usually has no signs or symptoms. That's why it is so dangerous. But, it can be managed. Nearly half of the American population over the age of 20 has high blood pressure and don't even know it. Not treating high blood pressure increases the risk of heart attack and stroke. Make sure you get your blood pressure checked regularly and treat it the way your doctor advises.

Nowadays, there are so many ways to monitor your blood pressure. There are manual and automatic blood pressure machines, smart watches and numerous other devices like rings, fitness trackers, and other devices. Long gone are the days, where you had to go to the doctor's office to find out your blood pressure! Make a habit of monitoring your blood pressure regularly, tracking your readings, and sharing them with your healthcare provider.

Blood Pressure Category	Systolic mm Hg (upper number)		Diastolic mm Hg (lower number)
Normal	Less than 120	and	Less than 80
Elevated	120-129	and	Less than 80
High Blood Pressure (Hypertension Stage 1)	130-139	or	80-90
High Blood Pressure (Hypertension Stage 2)	140 or Higher	or	90 or Higher
Hypertensive Crisis (Consult your doctor immediately)	Higher than 180	and/or	Higher than 120

There are risk factors that increase your chances of developing high blood pressure. Some you can control, others you can't. For the ones you can control, make a concentrated effort to keep your blood pressure in check. Risk factors that can be controlled include:

Smoking and exposure to secondhand smoke.
 This includes not only cigarettes, but any nicotine product since they all damage your blood vessels, making high blood pressure more likely. If you

smoke, may a commitment to stop.

- Diabetes. If you are diabetic, make sure you are eating appropriately, watching your weight, and taking your medications.
- Being obese or overweight. Eat wisely. Avoid foods high in sugar and fat. Keep your weight in check.
- High cholesterol. Take measures to eat a healthy diet, like the Mediterranean or DASH diet. If you take cholesterol medications, take them as prescribed.
- Unhealthy diet (high in sodium, low in potassium).
   If you are healthy, you shouldn't eat more than a teaspoon of salt (2300 milligrams of sodium) a day, or if you have a heart condition, not more than 1,500 milligrams of sodium a day.
- Drinking too much alcohol. Women should not drink more than one drink a day, and men not more than two drinks a day.
- Physical inactivity. Try getting at least 30 minutes a day of exercise. This can be divided into 10 minute increments.
- Stress. If you are experiencing stressful situations in your life, find ways to reduce your stress.
   Try deep breathing, practicing mindfulness, meditation, praying, or exercising. If you find you are overextending yourself, learn to say "no".

Although all of these things may seem like a lot of work, managing your blood pressure will help you avoid developing other medical conditions and help keep you healthy. Reach out to family and friends who can support you in your quest to stay healthy. Positive nurturing relationships also help reduce stress. And, ensure you are following up with your physician and following his advice. Pharmacists are also great resources who can help explain your medications, and give you tips on how to manage your condition.

#### Lent - What it is and how to get the most out of it

Lent is the 40 weekdays plus
Saturdays from Ash Wednesday
to Easter observed by the Roman
Catholic, Eastern Catholic, and
some Protestant churches as a
period of penitence and fasting.
Sundays aren't included in the
40-day count because they are
days that we always recognize and
celebrate Christ's sacrifice for our
salvation. Because that's so, you
might even hear Sundays referred
to as "little Easters."

Since Sundays aren't included, in the counting of the days of Lent, you'll see that Lent looks like it lasts 46 days on a calendar. The Church, in its wisdom, asks us to set aside time to slip into the desert with Jesus to retreat, ponder, pray, and take an account of how we have been living our life and focusing on others on any/all of these days.

Stepping into Lent

to mind when you think of LENT? How do you feel about Lent? (it can be more than one descriptor and they can be at odds with each other).

What did you give up for Lent last year?

The purpose of "giving something up" is to make more room for God. What would you give up this year to minimize distractions and have more time for prayer, fasting and almsgiving?

#### Lenten Stations of the Cross



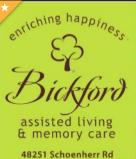
