MUSINGS + MESSAGES

With the sixth Sunday of Easter, we are reminded that Jesus would be sending us a gift after his physical departure from the earth: The Holy Spirit. Earlier this month, 39 students received the gift of the Spirit in confirmation. Each of us has received the Holy Spirit at our baptism and again at confirmation.

At every Mass, the priest calls down the Holy Spirit upon the gifts of bread and wine, as well as upon the assembly. During matrimony and holy orders, the presider blesses those receiving the sacraments and invites the Holy Spirit to fill their lives and ministry. Those who are forgiven and healed through

penance and anointing of the sick also experience the gift of the Spirit to assist them in their recovery from sin and sickness.

As we anticipate the great feast of Pentecost, we might want to ask ourselves, "How often do I pray to the Holy Spirit and ask the Spirit to

Connecting Point

► Salvation is for all.

At one time, I had a friend who left the Catholic Church to join a different denomination. We were talking one day, and she shared the theme of her pastor's recent sermon involving the "narrow gate" mentioned in scripture (Matthew 7:14). His understanding was that salvation is only available to the few baptized Christians who have followed a particular understanding of scripture and the corresponding rules and practices stemming from that understanding. For him (and now her), the vast, vast majority of all humans—past, present, and future (Catholics included)—will not obtain salvation. As we talked, I kept thinking about the totality of Jesus' message throughout his ministry, as well as today's readings in particular. It seemed that my friend and her minister had fallen victim to the same kind of misinformation that we hear being sorted out in our first reading. I get it—lots of us wonder what we "need to do to get to heaven!" Luckily for us, each reading from today's liturgy provides us with direction and the message that God's love and salvation are open to all.

To begin, in the first reading, we hear that "the apostles and elders, in

agreement with the whole church," decided that becoming an adherent of the Jewish religion, through the act of circumcision, was not needed before becoming Christian. They explained that, while there were, and are, some "necessities" of the faith and a way of life that comes after becoming a believer, there need not be "any burden beyond these (later) necessities." The doors are open. Jesus, and salvation through him, is available to everyone.

Further, as we sing our psalm for the week and hear the proclamation of our second reading, we are exposed to a universality in the words that shouldn't be missed. The theme begins as we hear the psalmist urging, "May all the nations praise you!" and thus echoing Jesus' desire for unity, "that they all may be one," as found in John's gospel. Doubling down on this theme, we hear the description of a city without a temple, "for its temple is the Lord God almighty and the Lamb." This means that faith, through worship in a specific temple, isn't tied to a geographical location. Wherever you are, whenever you want, you can call upon God the Father, Jesus, and even the Holy Spirit. It is this desire for a worldwide, truly

"catholic" church (note the lower-case "C") that we proclaim every week when we recite the Creed! These statements affirm that God's love, mercy, and care for us aren't limited—they're for the whole world.

Finally, we hear again, in the gospel, that Jesus invites everyone to the gift of faith and salvation. He says, "Whoever loves me will keep my word, and my Father will love him, and we will come to him and make our dwelling with him." This freely given invitation to open our hearts to God's presence through the indwelling of the Spirit is one that anyone can take advantage of. It is our limited, human hearts that often build obstacles to Christ's presence. Again, it is good for us to remember that those obstacles aren't coming from God. God loves you and wants to be with you, now and forever. The gift of the Spirit is open and available to **all**.

Let us all remember that God's salvation is for everyone, no matter who they are. As we move through this week, may our focus be on God's gift of the Spirit dwelling within us and his love that deems us all worthy of that presence.






DONATIONS NEEDED BY SUN | JUNE 8

Great Conversation Starters from Bishop Sheen

Bishop Sheen was a scholar, educator, author, orator, and evangelist. Pope Pius XI named him Monsignor at the age of 39. Between 1930 and 1950, he gave weekly radio talks called "The Catholic Hour." He was known as "the Face of Catholicism" for 40 years. Many called him the greatest communicator who ever lived! He possessed a captivating, intelligent, yet humorous ability to meet people where they were. His messages are timely and timeless. Here are a few more of his quotes that you might find to be great conversation starters at the dinner table:

- "You must remember to love people and use things, rather than use people and love things."
- "The refusal to take sides on significant moral issues is, in itself, a decision. It is a silent acquiescence to evil. The tragedy of our time is that those who still believe in honesty lack fire and conviction, while those who believe in dishonesty are full of conviction."
- "Never forget that there are only two philosophies to rule your life: the one of the cross, which starts with the fast and ends with the feast; the other of Satan, which starts with the feast and ends with the headache."

► Going to the Emergency Room

Unless you have visited an emergency room before, you probably haven't given much thought to the items you should bring, should you ever need to go. Although we all hope we never need to go to the emergency room, at some point in your life, you or someone you live with or help care for will likely need to go. So, although we may not want to think about it, jotting down this information and keeping it in a handy place is a good idea. Some of the information is a "no-brainer," but other things may not be as obvious. And, of course, if there is a medical emergency where time is of the essence, don't worry about all of these things; just take the essential information.

Unless you require immediate, life-saving treatment, you will undergo a registration and triage process before being seen by a doctor. This involves sharing your personal and medical information, which you will need to bring with you. There are also other important items to bring to the hospital:

- **Health insurance cards and credit cards:** You will be asked about your health insurance. Depending on your plan, you may have a copay or a deductible, which means you might have to pay a certain amount for medical services. Ensure you bring your health insurance information and a credit card to the emergency room. If you can't afford to pay for medical treatment right away, the doctor will treat you and mail you a bill afterward.
- **Photo ID:** The hospital may request your photo identification during registration to avoid health insurance and billing fraud. A driver's license, state ID, or passport will work.
- **Next of kin information:** The hospital will need to contact your family members about your treatment, especially if your life is at risk. You will be asked for this information at registration, but it's a good idea to keep a typed or written list in your wallet for future reference. If you have a Patient Advocate, make sure you have a copy with you or on file at the hospital.
- **List of current prescription medications, over-the-counter medications, and any recreational drugs you might take:** The nurse will ask you about any medications you currently take, including prescription medications, over-the-counter medications, herbal supplements, multivitamins, and recreational drugs. Keep a list of your current meds in your wallet. If you need a medication card to record this information, St. Therese of Lisieux has them available in the medical emergency alcove in the Gathering Space. It is important to have this written down in case you forget, are too sick or excited, or you can't answer when asked. If a friend or relative brings you in, they may not be aware. In an emergent situation, there might not be time to ask. This information is crucial for healthcare providers when ordering treatment. If you are bringing in someone and don't have a list, bring all prescription medication bottles you can find.
- **List of allergies:** Any allergies should be listed on the medication card, as well. These should include medications, latex, foods, environmental factors, or even insects, such as bees. This will help your doctor treat you safely and effectively. This will also help the doctor if you are experiencing an allergic reaction.
- **Personal assistance devices:** If you use any type of device to help you communicate or move around, such as eyeglasses, hearing aids, dentures, a walker, or a cane, bring it with you and ensure that this is documented in your medical record. If you have any medical devices, such as a pacemaker, be sure to inform your healthcare provider.
- **Phone and charger:** Bring your phone and charger so you can keep your family updated on treatments, tests, transfers to rooms, or any other developments.
- **Legal documents:** If you have an advanced health directive, power of attorney, or other documents that may impact your care, bring those so the doctor knows who can make decisions (if you are not able to do that), as well as instructions that direct what type of treatment you want or do not want. This will help the doctors treat you according to your wishes.
- **Additional information:** Bring the name, address, and telephone number of your doctor so that they can be listed in your medical record (in case the physicians need to consult with them). It is also a good idea to bring the name, address, and telephone number of your pharmacy.

Things you should not bring to the emergency room: Cash, jewelry, or anything valuable.

Hopefully, we can all stay healthy and avoid the emergency room, but if we do end up there, we can be prepared.
