

# MUSINGS + MESSAGES

In many ethnic traditions, when you visit someone's home, you are given something to eat—and not just a little snack, but a veritable feast. In a pristine, empty house located within a few minutes of your arrival, there is enough food to feed a small army; that is what happens in today's first reading. The trio that visits Abraham at Mamre is given

"a little food," which consists of a tender choice of steer, rolls, curds, and milk. By the way, a "tender, choice steer" would generally weigh between 800 and 1000 pounds. That's a lot of steak for three people.

In addition, the three men were actually divine beings. Some

commentators, including St.
Augustine, say that it was God
himself appearing as the Trinity.
Notice that whenever the men
speak, they speak as one. They
also offer a prophecy that Sarah
will bear a son. Moreover, Abraham
treats his guests as gods. Even
though the text uses the word
"men," Abraham knew that they

# How can I balance service and presence when offering hospitality?

Partly because my mother was the oldest of ten, and partly because our home had a basement sizable enough for large gatherings, my parents often hosted major family events, including holiday dinners, birthday parties, weddings, baby showers, graduations, and more. My mother was a perfectionist, so most of the events were near perfect. However, when I host a gathering of family or friends, I often find myself so distracted by the details of hospitality (such as appetizers, dinner, drinks, and setup) that I fail to focus on my guests, which is the heart of true hospitality. Wanting things to be "perfect" can prevent me from forming deeper connections with my guests, meaning I need to better balance service and presence in offering hospitality.

This Sunday's Gospel passage from Luke is the familiar story in which Martha and Mary welcome their friend, Jesus, into their home. Martha is distracted by the many tasks of preparing a meal and serving Jesus, while Mary sits at His feet, engaging in conversation with Him. Martha is upset and asks Jesus to tell Mary to help her. However, Jesus replies that Mary has chosen the "better part."

We often contrast Martha and Mary, seeing Martha as the person of action and Mary as "contemplative." However, they are sisters. In scripture, sisters complement each other and stand side-by-side. We are not called to be one or the other, but rather to be both, and we need to balance the two.

Each of our parishes strives to offer an *over*abundance of hospitality to our parishioners and those who come to us. To achieve this goal, we must focus on our guests and establish relationships with them, as Abraham does in our first reading (Genesis 18:1-10a). When engaging with guests, we must set aside all distractions (like cell phones!) and give guests our full attention. As the saying goes, people will not remember what we say or what we wear as much as how we made them feel.



Part of Martha's problem was that she had lost her grounding in God and prayer; Mary was grounded. We need that "grounding" in order to be less anxious about the details of hospitality and more attentive to our guests. At St. Isidore, we have developed three "pillars" of our parish: connect with God, reach others, and build community—one where people feel that they belong, in addition to feeling welcomed. Following these pillars can help us offer overabundant hospitality and make our guests feel important and at home.



were more than just mere mortals. He is deferential, recognizing that something special was occurring that day.

The technical term for God interacting with humans is a "theophany." In this case, God intervenes in Abraham's life to give him the good news that he will be a father. God blessed Abraham because he was the just one mentioned in the Psalm: "Those who do justice will live in the presence of the Lord."

Much like Abraham and Sarah,
Martha and Mary, and a host of other
people, we have a choice. We can
choose to put God first and really
try to see His presence in the world
around us, or we can choose to go it
alone. God will still be there, like the
prodigal father waiting for the son to
return; however, it will be up to us to
make the decision to return.

In your prayers this week, ask the Lord to help you be like Mary so that what was said of her may be said of you: She "has chosen the better part and it will not be taken from her."



# Why Did the Pope Choose the Name Leo XIV?

Can we discern any significance from our new pope's choice of name? There has been much speculation, but he himself said that he felt we were in an age similar to that which Pope Leo XIII faced at the close of the 19th century. Leo XIII was known as the Pope of Labor due to his famous encyclical, Rerum Novarum, in which he articulated the Catholic Church's support for the rights and dignity of the working class in response to the threats posed by the Industrial Revolution and communism. Pope Leo XIV sees a similarity in our age, stemming from our current relationship with technology. He has called for an ethical framework for Al development—the Church's approach to issues emerging in our new Digital Revolution.

By choosing this name, he may also have hoped to avoid following either the "conservative" or "liberal" factions that have emerged since Vatican II. Pope Leo XIII has not been labeled with either of these terms but was respected by all Catholics for his work. Since his election, Pope Leo XIV has repeatedly emphasized that we are all one in Christ, and he wants to heal the divisions in our Church.

Pope Leo XIII also gave us the prayer to St. Michael (often said at the end of the Mass), which asks St. Michael to defend us in our daily battle against Satan. Now, our work in the Church is to pray that our new pope will bring us into harmony with one another, so that, united as one, we can all fight our true enemy: the devil, the Father of Lies.

#### **Consider Volunteering - Your Help is Greatly Needed!**

As we all know, life is busy! For many of us, our days are filled with responsibilities at home, work, and more. We understand! That's why we prepare lessons, gather materials, and do most or all of the preparation for you! Most of our volunteer roles only require you to read through a lesson before coming to your assigned session to assist in leading children through a portion of the hour-and-fifteen-minute lesson (even shorter on Sundays). Additionally, if you volunteer to work with our Confirmation prep students, you won't need to do anything before assisting with facilitation; simply show up and follow Veronica's lead! Gone are the days of being handed a book and having little guidance!

If you'd like to volunteer for our Sunday programs (Children's Church or Little Lambs), which resume on September 7, please contact Susan at susand@ stol.church. You can give as much of your time as you want for this opportunity: as little as once a month or something greater, if desired. You would be helping at one Mass, so the time commitment is fairly

short, as well. If you like the idea of having Sunday programs that serve children and their families during Mass, **please** consider volunteering. We can only provide these programs if enough people step up.

Help is also needed for our grades 1-6 GROW program and our grades 7 and 8 Mission program, which begin in September and continue into early May. These volunteer positions serve on Monday or Tuesday evenings, about two times per month, for about an hour and a half, including set-up time before the session. These opportunities aren't like the "CCD" that you might remember. If you volunteer, you become part of a team, providing just a portion of the overall learning experience. # **Be Alert to Skin Cancer**

Skin cancers often begin as changes to the skin, including growths that change over time. That's why it's important to be familiar with any growths or moles you have, know the early warning signs of skin cancer, and get checked by a physician. It is estimated that 40-50% of fair-skinned people 65 years or older develop at least one skin cancer during their lifetime. If found and treated early, skin cancer can be cured.

Check your entire body for moles or suspicious spots at least once a month. Start at your head, including your scalp, and work your way down to your feet. Check the backs of your knees, between your fingers and toes, the soles of your feet, and your groin. Checking for suspicious moles should be done on people of all ages, and if you have a lot of moles, your doctor may recommend getting a yearly full-body check.

A simple method to check skin growths or moles on your body is the ABCDEs of melanoma. Get examined by a dermatologist if you have a mole or freckle that looks different from the others or has any of these characteristics:

A is for asymmetry. Asymmetry means that one half of a mole does not "match" the other; normal moles are symmetrical. An excellent way to evaluate this is to draw an imaginary line through the middle of the mole and compare the two halves. If they do not look the same, consult a dermatologist.

**B** is for *border*. If a mole's edges are ragged, blurred, or irregular, have it

checked out. Melanoma lesions often have uneven borders.

**C** is for *color*. A mole that is not the same color throughout (or that has shades of tan, brown, black, blue, white, or red) is suspicious. Normal moles are usually one color, and if one has gotten lighter or darker in color, talk to a dermatologist.

**D** is for *diameter*. A mole is suspicious if its diameter is larger than that of a pencil eraser. If you have one that size or larger, talk to your doctor.

**E** is for *evolving*. If you notice a mole that is evolving, shrinking, growing larger, changing in color, or beginning to itch or bleed, have it examined. Melanomas grow rapidly in height and size.

If you notice a mole or spot with any of the ABCDEs of melanoma, or if it is itchy, tender, red, oozing, scaly, or not healing, consult with your doctor. Likely, part of it will be removed and biopsied. If the mole is cancerous, the entire mole and surrounding tissue will be removed.

Malignant melanoma, when found in late stages, is difficult to treat, so it is essential to find it early. Basal cell carcinoma and squamous cell carcinoma are other types of skin cancers that are highly curable when found and treated early. People who have had skin cancer are at risk of getting it again and should have annual exams.

Sun exposure is the biggest cause of skin cancer, but heredity, environmental hazards, and radiation



treatment may also play a part. While anyone can develop skin cancer, the risk is higher for individuals with fair skin and light-colored eyes, a large number of irregularly shaped moles, a family history of skin cancer, a history of excessive sun exposure or sunburns, or those who live in areas with high altitudes or year-round sunshine.

If you are at risk, limit your exposure to the sun's ultraviolet rays between 10 AM and 4 PM, use sunscreen with an SPF of 30 or higher, wear a hat and sunglasses, and cover up your body. Young infants should be kept out of direct sunlight. Begin using sunscreen on children at six months of age, and then only allow moderate sun exposure. Teach your children about sun protection early, as sun damage occurs with unprotected exposure and accumulates throughout a lifetime.




