CONNECTING POINT

When we pray the *Our Father*, we willingly say, "Thy Kingdom come, Thy will be done." Yet so often, when we pray, our focus drifts to what **we** want instead of what God wants **for us** and **from us**.

Years ago, a friend told me: "Pray... but, more importantly, be brave

enough to listen." It is in the silence of our hearts, when we truly listen, that we begin to hear the Lord calling us to something more.

When we pray, we are invited to align our thoughts, wants, and desires with the Lord's will. If our prayer is only *me*-focused (and not

we-focused), then it may not yet be centered on God's will for our life.

This weekend's readings overflow with powerful images of prayer:

 In the first reading from Genesis, Abraham pleads with God not to destroy Sodom and



Prayer works.

Gomorrah, trusting that there must be goodness in some of the inhabitants.

- In Psalm 138, we proclaim with confidence: "Lord, on the day I called for help, you answered me."
- And in today's Gospel from Luke, we are urged to keep asking, seeking, and knocking because our God listens and responds.

This is how prayer works: not as a list of demands, but as a living relationship with the One who loves us. It is in prayer—when we ask, listen, and align ourselves with God's will—that His Kingdom truly comes alive in us.



Evangelical Charity

At our recent Evangelization Committee meeting, someone asked, "Why was *Christian Services* renamed to *Evangelical Charity?*" The short answer is that it was a product of the Archdiocese of Detroit's *Unleash the Gospel* movement, but we still need to look a little deeper. Let's first break the phrase into its two words:

- Evangelical: For each of us, our primary calling is to spread the Gospel (the Good News of our faith).
- Charity: Providing help to people in every form of need.

In other words, the goal was to recognize Catholic services for our poor and marginalized brothers and sisters as a response to Jesus' call, not to be mistaken for humanist philanthropy. For two thousand years, the Church has developed a vast network of charitable programs and been a source of inspiration for many of our current society's philanthropic endeavors. In recent decades, however, there has been a tendency to separate our charitable works from our primary calling—spreading the Good News of Jesus. The name change reminds us that whenever we provide material support to others in need, we should not forget that we are also called to respond to their spiritual needs and be willing to share our faith and dependence on God.

In summary, *Evangelical Charity* emphasizes the need to be a clear witness to Jesus in all of our charitable works.



The celebration of the Felician
Sisters' 150th anniversary of their
arrival in America began for the
parishioners of St. Therese of Lisieux
on the weekend of June 28-29, 2025.
The simple but glorious celebration
was made possible by Msgr. John
Kasza, Pastor, and Christopher
Piebiak, Director of Family Ministry.

It was the weekend on which the feast of Sts. Peter and Paul was celebrated in the liturgy. The 4:30 PM Mass began with an entrance procession of Felician Sisters. Sister Maria Louise Edwards and Sister Felicity Marie Madigan were lectors, while Sister Mary Virginia Nowak and Sister Mary Andrew Budinski presented the Offertory gifts. The Felician presence was definitely felt.

After Mass, friends and parishioners streamed into Sutherland Hall until it was filled to the brim with joy. Christopher Piebiak welcomed the guests. Sister Mary Andrew followed with a brief introduction, highlighting who and what was being celebrated. With a PowerPoint, she introduced Blessed Mary Angela, Father Dambrowski, and the five pioneer sisters. She then gave an overview of

the sisters' arrival and beginnings in Polonia, Wisconsin.

The guests were then invited to enjoy a simple meal of soup and salad, which had a sweet ending with multiple desserts provided by the parish's Bountiful Bakers. During the meal, a video was looped to share more Felician history.

While the gathering was a way to cherish the past, it was also an opportunity to look to the future. After the meal, two more recent ministries were given a focus. Sister Felicity Marie shared the work of the Deo Gratias Ministry in Detroit, and Sister Maria Louise spoke about her work at the southern border with Aguilas de Desierto. Both were well-received and given the opportunity to expand their message after each of the Sunday morning Masses and ensuing interactions with parishioners.

This meal ended with the local sisters singing their traditional "Blessing of St. Francis." Msgr. John Kasza, who himself was taught by the Felician Sisters, offered remarks and some "untold stories" that were outdone

only by a most beautiful blessing that he offered over the sisters and all who were present.

Both days of the event were a palpable reminder of Pentecost. Guests were gathered in one place with sisters from the neighboring townships. As we all know, life is busy! For many of us, our days are filled with responsibilities at home, work, and more. We understand! That's why we prepare lessons, gather materials, and do most or all of the preparation for you! Most of our volunteer roles only require you to read through a lesson before coming to your assigned session to assist in leading children through a portion of the hour-and-fifteen-minute lesson (even shorter on Sundays). Additionally, if you volunteer to work with our Confirmation prep students, you won't need to do anything before assisting with facilitation; simply show up and follow Veronica's lead! Gone are the days of being handed a book and having little guidance!

If you'd like to volunteer for our Sunday programs (Children's Church or Little Lambs), which resume on September 7, please contact Susan at susand@ stol.church. You can give as much of your time as you want for this opportunity: as little as once a month or something greater, if desired. You would be helping at one Mass, so the time commitment is fairly

short, as well. If you like the idea of having Sunday programs that serve children and their families during Mass, **please** consider volunteering. We can only provide these programs if enough people step up.

Help is also needed for our grades 1-6 GROW program and our grades 7 and 8 Mission program, which begin in September and continue into early May. These volunteer positions serve on Monday or Tuesday evenings, about two times per month, for about an hour and a half, including set-up time before the session. Fraud Victimization

On Thursday, August 7, from 12 to 1:30 PM (following the Rambling Roses meeting), St. Therese of Lisieux will host an educational session for parishioners and the community on ways to protect yourself from the ever-increasing crime of fraud. So, mark your calendars to save the date! Peter Lucido, Macomb County Prosecutor, will present information on the various types of prevalent fraud and scams, as well as strategies for avoiding victimization by these crimes. Incidents of fraud have exploded in recent years, with Americans reporting a record \$10 billion stolen in 2023, according to the Federal Trade Commission (FTC). A report by AARP found that 42 percent of American adults have personally experienced fraud, and most Americans (58%) are worried about these crimes.

Fraud victimization occurs when someone is deceived into giving money, property, or personal information. Fraudsters employ various techniques to deceive victims, including making false promises, impersonating others, or manipulating information. Specific individuals or groups may be more susceptible to fraud, including the elderly, those with limited financial

literacy, and those experiencing hardship. And many times, victims are embarrassed and do not report the scams. According to an AARP survey, 78% of people who were scammed did not report the crime to local law enforcement or the FBI (89%).

Online fraud takes many forms and encompasses both financial and identity theft. Instances include viruses that target computers to gather personal information, email schemes that lure individuals into sending money to fake sources, and "phishing" emails posing as companies and official government agencies to solicit sensitive information and facilitate identity theft. The methods used by perpetrators of online fraud are constantly evolving.

The FTC stated that the most common methods used by fraudsters to contact victims include telephone calls, websites, emails, consumerinitiated contacts, traditional mail, and other means. The most common methods fraudsters use to collect payments, based on reports, are wire transfers, credit cards, gift or reload cards, bank account debits, internet/mobile payments, cash or cash advances, checks, money orders, and telephone bills.

You can take steps to protect yourself by being wary of unsolicited calls, emails, or messages from those requesting information, monitoring your financial accounts regularly.



using strong, unique passwords, enabling two-factor authentication on online accounts, being cautious about investing in unfamiliar or highrisk opportunities, and reporting any suspicious activity to law enforcement or financial institutions. Also, be cautious about your activity on social media; avoid taking quizzes or surveys, downloading free apps from social media, and accepting friend requests from people you don't know. Finally, avoid accessing any sites that require a password when using public Wi-Fi.

It's overwhelming to read about the many different ways each of us could become a victim of fraud and other related crimes. That's why it's essential to become as knowledgeable as possible about scams and ways to avoid them.




